Clive Caine (Learning Support)

We received an update report from the Education Review Office team (ERO) who have been keeping a close eye on the school over the last few years. This report was produced for the benefit of the new board, but has some great positive comments that we want to share with our community.

The ERO team have noted significant progress and development in a number of areas:

- a sustained focus on creating a settled, orderly, positive, supportive school culture that values and celebrates students' diverse backgrounds, including Maori success as Maori and Pacific learners.
- positive signs of improvement in student attendance and students' progress towards achieving their NCEA qualifications in 2019
- increased student access to targeted support services, community resources and digital technologies to promote engagement in learning.
- enhanced community relationships and perceptions that have particularly contributed to Year 9 roll growth from a wide range of local contributing schools
- developed the Year 10 Te Tohu Rangatira programme that has lifted expectations for positive learning behaviours, attendance, and key competencies
- Continued to strengthen the whanau structure, and promoted student leadership through tuakana teina strategies

We look forward to the ERO team coming back to the school later this term, to show them the continued progress we have been making to improve student achievement outcomes.

We would like to thank the outgoing board members for their valuable contribution over the past three years to the great progress that is being made by the school. Our thanks go to Daniel Newman, Peter Goldsmith, Aaron Davidson, Jerome Mika, Rev James Matamua and student Micah Savea, for their enthusiasm and support for Papakura High School. 
