The Board of Trustees will be starting the process of recruiting a new principal for our school very shortly. This will be a very exciting time for our school. I have every confidence that there will be a strong field of applicants for the role, and that the successful candidate will work very closely with the school's leadership team, the whole staff and the Board of Trustees to build on the school's progress and move the school forward for the next phase of its development.



As I still have a number of months before I leave, can I assure you all that the next few months are very focused on the achievement of our NCEA students in particular, and that this message to you is not yet goodbye!

On Wednesday 29 July the Papakura High School Code Club was launched.

What is Code Club

Code club started in Aotearoa in 2014 and is part of a global drive to empower students to learn how to code. Just like we have different languages around the world, a computer editor can interpret different programming languages used to code games, apps and websites. For example we have a language called Java as one of the most popular programming languages, used for building video games and mobile apps. The Python programming language is pretty much used for coding a multitude of software applications from web apps to data analysis.

The Python coding language is one of the main languages we will be using in our coding club. Python is often regarded as the easiest programming language to learn.

The aim at Papakura High is to provide every student the opportunity to reach their potential by encouraging students to combine their imaginations with an understanding of coding to

come up with authentic projects that may lead to an invention or solve a problem/s through coding. These problem solving skills are highly desirable when students continue on their pathways, whether it is tertiary studies, university or in employment.

The highlight for the code club was how passionate the girls were and felt empowered they were able to address the participants and visitors in a professional manner. Era, Johara, Tahitia and Tara were our girl ambassadors. Women are underrepresented and this is a great career for those who want to take up a career in Technology.

Skills shortage - The immigration NZ website states I.T. is on the long term skills shortage list. We simply need skilled I.T. professionals in NZ and there is not too much competition to get into the workforce.

We were fortunate enough to have Micheal Tengrove present who is the founder of the organisation at the Code Club launch. We had teachers and parents as well as teachers from nearby Schools. The Code Club welcomes all students from 13-18 and volunteers from the community.
