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

The day I found out I was Student Rep was a great day. I was fifth form and had just experienced the passing of a close friend. For me student rep was a great achievement, something I will never forget.



PAPAKURA HIGH SCHOOL GYMNASIUM

The school has watched on excitedly this year as the new gym has emerged alongside the old. A Ministry of Education one off grant at the end of the year 2000 provided the initial funding which along with a significant contribution from the Board and a range of charitable grants, allowed a truly impressive and comprehensive recreation centre design to be developed. The Papakura Council and Papakura Rugby Club have also contributed fund to ensure that community use of facilities in conjunction with the Mansell Field is possible.

The new facility is highly innovative in

that it includes three classroom spaces in which Health and senior Physical Education will be taught. These classrooms have moveable end walls which allows the whole of the space to combine with a kitchen facility to allow use for larger functions, meetings and assemblies.

The new Year 9 Sports Academy class will also be based in one of these rooms. An adjacent Fitness centre with attached office is also a feature, along with a roomy Faculty office for the Physical Education Staff, which features state of the art sound and computer facilities. Four large changing rooms along with a community storage room

and referees room will be available for outdoor community users of the Mansell Field.

The internal gym space is significantly larger than the previous gym and features international size Basketball and Volleyball courts along with four Badminton courts. Space is available for Bleachers to run down one side of the gym.

The gym will be completed in November and Papakura High will be proud to boast possibly the best sports and recreation facilities of any state secondary school in South Auckland.






Another strength in 2002 was the great participation of our Intermediate boys. These guys "kicked butt" in almost every



"We came, we saw...we may take part next year...maybe."






Next morning it was "Clean up time". We had our last rounds of activities, the water-hole being the main event, and for some, it was cleaning.








XA Students have had a busy year in 2002

MAORI ACHIEVEMENT INITIATIVE

Papakura High School has been very fortunate this year to be involved in a Research Project headed by Professor Russell Bishop from Waikato University, which focuses on raising the achievement levels of Maori students in mainstream secondary schools.

What makes this initiative stand out from the plethora of government driven educational initiatives is that it recognises the effect of socio-economic factors, the breakdown of the family unit and regional transience on the achievement levels of Maori students. However, unlike many of the other initiatives, it accepts that teachers have minimal control over the aforementioned conditions.

Hence the initiative specifically targets the relationships that exist within the classroom itself, namely those between teachers and students and students themselves. After all this is the one environment over which teachers do have some control!

The initiative involves four staff and two junior classes, which are predominantly made up of Maori students. The focus is to build strong and effective relationships with our students and amongst our students through the use of cooperative learning strategies and effective teaching practices.

Both classes contain students who had previously been severe truants and were often non-engaged in their lessons. Those students are now attending school on a regular basis and are showing much more progress in terms of their academic results and their learning in general. Students who had previously shown to have an interest in doing well at school have continued to do so under this initiative and in some cases have thrived in this environment.

It must be said that we are only three terms into the year, and are still very much in a trial phase. However, we are pleased with the way the initiative is progressing.

Although it is not officially part of the initiative, we also have 20 staff here at Papakura High School attending a Maori language course run by Te Wananga o Aotearoa. The course consists of a 3 hour lesson every Monday night for the entire year as well as three compulsory Marae stays during the year. Those staff involved have enjoyed using the language in their classes and have expressed that many of their students really appreciate the effort they are making.

We acknowledge that improving the academic success of our Maori students will not happen over night. However, the staff at Papakura are committed to making a difference in this area and will continue to be open to new ideas and initiatives if they will go some way towards raising the level of achievement of their students.

Ms Matthews, Mr Saville and Year 11 Drama must be congratulated for their enthusiastic, entertaining and thought provoking performance.





DEBATING 2002


The year 2002 will go down as one of the golden years for debating at Papakura High.



The homework centre has been a great place to study after school, with lots of resources for the students; books, access to internet and the new resource boxes available.










It has been a privilege to be involved with the Peer Sexuality Support Team at Papakura High School in 2002. We only hope next year will be as successful for new teams it has been for us.

PAPAKURA HIGH SCHOOL ACADEMIC INSTITUTE

This year we have two Academic Institute classes at Year 9 and two at Year 10, so the programme continues to grow. A pleasing development has also been the number of students working hard to gain a place in the programme.

The Year 9 classes began the year with School Success programme run by Lance King and, in preparation for their NCEA Geography exam, the Year 10's had the Exam Confidence course in Term 3. The classes also took part in the Australian Maths, Science and English competitions and achieved pleasing results.



STUDIES IN COMPUTING

The Computing course for 2002 is very challenging for all students. The end of the year will see students who have successfully completed three qualifications. The detail for these courses is listed below.

International Computing Driving Licence

Papakura High School has offered Computing students the opportunity to complete the International Computer Driving Licence (ICDL) during 2002. The Computing learning Area was licensed to deliver the course by the New Zealand Computer Society for the current year.

Through its subsidiary, Computing New Zealand Ltd, the New Zealand Computer Society (NZCS) has brought the International Computer Driving Licence (ICDL) to New Zealand. Already over a million Europeans hold the licence and it has become THE standard worldwide. The ICDL, which originated in Finland, is unique in that it is independent of any and all computer companies. There is no vested commercial interest. It is issued in New Zealand only by a professional body: the NZ Computer Society.

Once a person has an ICDL it can be used worldwide to prove that person's competence and help get a well-paid job. In European countries as many as 50% of job advertisements involving the use of a computer specifically ask for the ICDL. If you haven't got it your job prospects are halved! As the ICDL takes hold in New Zealand the same will almost certainly apply.

The learning process involves acquiring seven competencies (each being a module). These are: Basic concepts of

Information Technology, Using the computer and managing files, Word processing, Spreadsheets, Databases/filing systems, Presentation and drawing, Information network services

Each of these modules can be learned and tested separately, several at a time, or all at one go. The learning/testing process is entirely flexible but only when all seven modules have been passed, and competence thus demonstrated, is the licence issued.

ARIES TECHNOLOGY COMPUTER LITERACY

Aries Computer Literacy is an introduction to computer and operating hardware and software. The Computer Literacy curriculum helps students to

Windows 2000, MacOS, UNIX and Linux basics.

Eye-catching graphics, integrated audio narration, a user-friendly interface, and up-to-date technical information help beginners enter the exciting world of computer literacy.

At the end of a unit the student undertakes an on-line test which assesses the learning and assigns a percentage score which is recording for final certification by the school in association with Aries technology Limited.

NATIONAL CERTIFICATE OF COMPUTING LEVEL 2/3

Computers have become a necessary tool in many industries. This qualification provides the flexibility for industry to specify knowledge and skills from their own environment, while still retaining a core of intermediate level computing competencies.

Unit standards form the basis of this course which is additional to the above qualifications.

This qualification aims to enhance readiness for further study in computing and related fields at the National Diploma level, as well as for initial employment using computers.



quickly establish a comfort level that promotes rapid and thorough learning.

The topics covered include a wide-ranging investigation of all physical aspects of a computer system for example: System Unit, Microprocessor basics, Storage units Buses, video adapters, sound cards, modems, Operating system basics, Windows 98 operating system, Windows NT,

Computing at Papakura High School is an exciting and internationally recognised course of skills-based employment related learning.


SPORT DEVELOPMENT 2003



If we won one game I was going to shout the team KFC, needless to say I ended up eating alone. Good luck next year.



1ST XI GIRLS CRICKET






COUNTIES MANUKAU - CROSS COUNTRY

games and we lost one by 2 points which gave us more motivation to actually go back to win next year. The day was all about having fun and it didn't really matter if we lost or won because we tried our best.



JUNIOR A NETBALL




JUNIOR B - GIRLS NETBALL

As much as some of this was true in the beginning, the wheels of the mighty machine did unfortunately begin to fall off as the season went on.





1ST XI BOYS SOCCER



at it and with one foul stroke finished the year on a high with the local derby against Rosehill, in my opinion, going our way.








SENIOR GIRLS SOFTBALL






SENIOR GIRLS TENNIS



SENIOR GIRLS VOLLEYBALL

MORE PAPAKURA HIGH SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

MY HIGHLIGHTS OF TRAVELLING TO JAPAN

The first thing I noticed when I arrived in Japan was the humidity. The air was so stuffy, it took a while to get used to it. My host family was very caring and made sure I was healthy for the day's activities. I lived on the top floor of a 15 story high apartment building. The view was amazing. I could see all over Chiaba, which was around 1 hour train ride away from Tokyo. Instead of sleeping on the traditional Tatame mat, I had my own room and bed. My family had also made me some traditional Japanese foods, like Tempura, and took me out to different restaurants that they thought I would enjoy. I had to wake up at 6.40 every morning to catch the train.

My first day was surprising. We were welcomed by around 1,000 Japanese students and had to make a speech in both English and Japanese on the front stage. There were so many smiley faces welcoming us at every corner we turned around the school. They only have two buildings, but they are 5 stories high. They had many subjects and after school clubs such as the Judo and Kendo Club. I didn't return home until around 6.00pm everyday.

During our stay, the school took us on three day trips. We went to Bosou No Mura (a traditional Japanese Village), Asakusan (a place for shopping and seeing shrines) and the best place of all...Disneyland!!!

There we went on around 25 rides and a couple of them we went on again and again and again. Their grounds were so clean, there were people working everywhere picking up little specks of rubbish.

We stayed there for over 12 hours and didn't return home until around 1.00am in the morning. Disneyland was my biggest highlight of being in Japan. There are many different things to do and many more things to see. I can't wait to visit Japan again.

MY IMPRESSIONS OF JAPAN

The three main highlights of my stay in Japan were the daily life together with my host family, the first day of school and the trip to Disneyland.

When I arrived in Japan the first thing that hit me was the enormous amount of humidity. When I left the airport there were people and cars everywhere, but the amazing thing was, with so many people there was no rubbish at all anywhere. Japan is probably one of the busiest countries in the world but also the cleanest.

My host family's house was small and 2 storeys high. My room was traditional Japanese room compared to the rest of the house. With special mats on the floor and windows covered with paper and wooden beams. But the food that we ate everyday was traditional Japanese. We ate rice everyday together with fish and soya sauce, sometimes tempura and tofu.

In the weekends we had to wake up at 6.00am and sometimes continue sleeping on our train to go to see some places close to home. With these weekends I went to see with my host family some traditional temples, and the famous Daibutsu, which is a big statue of Daibutsu, who believes in Buddha, and sits praying with his legs crossed.

You can even go inside the statue, which I did as well.

School started at 8.40am with home room time, like tutor time, for five minutes, then we had four periods lasting 50 minutes each then our only lunch time of 45 minutes, and to finish another two, 50 minute periods plus home room of 15 minutes. In the last home room, the children have to clean up their classroom. School finished normally at 3.15pm, but especially for us we had clubs after school time 5.00pm. Clubs included, Judo, Kendo, Tea Ceremony and a Flower arrangement club.

Then we had one special class trip to Disneyland on Thursday 3rd October. At first I thought it was only for young children aged 9 and under and their parents and grandparents, but Disneyland is for anybody. It was fun on every ride especially Space Mountain and Big Thunder Mountain, which both closely resembled roller coasters here. 





The students on the course have the opportunity to exhibit and sell their work they have created on the course at the Papakura Art Gallery, this is always a successful event and a unique opportunity for the students.


