Ki te whānau o te kura, tenā koutou kātoa Dear parents, caregivers and friends of Papakura High School

While we had all hoped that it would be a Covid-free year in 2021 this hasn't been the case. However, the brief move into Alert Level 3 was a good reminder that we cannot afford to be complacent and need to keep following the advice of our health authorities. As a school



we continue to prepare for the worst eventuality of a longer lockdown but of course we hope that it never has to happen. I would like to reassure everyone that it is safe to be at school and that we will always take the necessary precautions as advised by the Ministry of Education.

Great news with regard to our 2020 NCEA results. While our Level 1 results were just over 1% down from 2019, our Level 2 and 3 results were excellent. 76% of students achieved Level 2 and 78% achieved Level 3. The national average for Level 3 is 72% so our students significantly outperformed the national result. Our UE results and merit and excellence endorsements were also the highest they have been for many years. This shows that our students are setting their sights higher and believing that they can achieve. We are expecting to see these results improve further in 2021. Special thanks should also go to the staff for going above and beyond during a difficult year to ensure our students achieve.

This year we have 917 students on our roll. This is significant growth from last year and we are excited to see our numbers grow so quickly.

Thank you for showing confidence in us to educate your rangatahi.

This year we will be having a big focus on improving attendance. It continues to be a barrier for our students getting the most out of school.

In more positive news, we have signed up to a partnership with Deejays to supply our students with free hot meals every day as part of the government's Ka Ora, Ka Ako - Food in Schools programme. We expect to start this in the second half of March. We are very excited by the menu provided and the opportunity for each student to have a nutritious lunch. Deejays will be offering employment opportunities to members of our community to assist with the delivery of this programme. We will advise further when these jobs are advertised.

We are pleased to announce that Polyfest will be taking place again this year after having been cancelled for the last two years. It will be on a smaller scale but we will be entering the usual cultural groups. We look forward to our whānau support of these groups as in previous years and I look forward to meeting many of you during our evening rehearsals.

There are so many positive things to report that I can't list them all here but I would like to thank the Papakura High community for the warm welcome that I have received. If I haven't met you yet I look forward to doing so. Please introduce yourself to me if you see me around.

Student Achievement - NCEA Results



In 2020, PHS had the highest NCEA achievement results for many years. Despite the Covid-19 pandemic, 58% of our Year 11s, 75% of our Year 12s and 78% of our Year 13s achieved an NCEA certificate for their level. The Year 13 figure is well above the national average for all schools and the other year levels are above average for other similar schools. We also achieved more merit and excellence endorsements than ever.

NZQA defines endorsement as follows: "Certificate endorsement - For an NCEA certificate to be endorsed with Excellence a student must gain 50 credits at Excellence at the level of the certificate or above. So, if a student has 50 Level 1 credits at Excellence they may have their Level 1 certificate endorsed with Excellence. Likewise, if a student gains 50 credits at Merit (or Merit and Excellence) at Level 1 their NCEA Level 1 certificate may be endorsed with Merit. Endorsement awards show on the Record of Achievement."

On Monday 1 March Auckland once again went into Covid Alert Level 3 which meant the majority of our students were unable to attend school physically for a minimum of one week and online teaching and learning was rolled out. As most staff had already had experience of this last year, teachers were able to react very quickly to the news that students were to be learning from home.

In order to enable as many of our students as possible to learn from home, we offered chromebooks and hard packs to whānau so that students had both options available to them.

On 1 March we handed out just over 100 chromebooks and on 2 March over 60, along with over 70 packs of written work.





Services Academy







This year our Services Academy is back, bigger and better than ever, with two Platoons. Platoon 1 is for students in Year 11 and Platoon 2 is for those in Year 12, a total of 43 students.

The students in Platoon 1 were understandably quite nervous in their first week as they didn't really know what to expect. However, the students in Platoon 2 helped them out as they knew what to expect and soon had the newbies settling in and learning how to drill.

All students in the Academy have the same values based on the Army 3CI values: Commitment, Comradeship, Courage and Integrity.

As well as drills and PT (physical training) students work on gaining their NCEA Level 1 and 2 credits. The Services Academy camp that was supposed to have been at the start of March had to be postponed due to the Covid-19 Level 3 lockdown, but has now been rescheduled for the end of March. Students and staff are greatly looking to this so fingers crossed it can go ahead.

Chromebook Scholarships





Fred Graham ONZM






Fred was a teacher at Papakura High School from 1969 - 1980 but is probably better known for his work as a world-renowned carver and sculptor.

He has had an illustrious career as a sculptor with works exhibited around the world. In 2018 he was made an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit for his services to Māori Art and he received the Arts Foundation Icon Award. On Friday 12 March, we were honoured to welcome Anahila Kanongata'a-Suisuiki who visited us.



Free Measles vaccinations



FREE measles clinics now running In the community! Get immunized!

Are you aged 15-30? Do you have whanau who are within this age range? We've got a FREE measles clinic for whānau in South Auckland at the Whānau Ora Community Clinic.

These clinics are being set up because a large number of people aged 15-30 missed out on getting fully immunised when they were children. This means they are at risk of catching and spreading measles. People can just turn up to the clinics, there is no need to book an appointment or to bring anything. For people who are not sure if they've been immunised, staff at the community clinics can check their immunisation status. If their immunisation status is uncertain, the vaccine can be given again. It's safe, quick, free and very effective. Young people in our rohe can also get immunised against measles at their family doctor or at a participating pharmacy for FREE.
