In 1995 for example, we have witnessed the completion of a new Drama Suite, the provision of an additional Computer Suite and the establishment of an International Student Centre. A special thanks to Dr. Lewis for her longstanding association with our school. Her support, guidance, leadership, and wisdom has ensured the continuation of very sound Board practices. I am pleased to report that the new Board, under the Chairmanship of Mr K Kelly, has made a very positive and smooth start in developing school directions and supporting new initiatives.

While there have been some difficulties in appointing staff in a few specialist areas where there are national teacher shortages, I look forward to the prospect of a more stable and settled year in 1996. All schools nationwide will operate on four terms next year and it remains to be seen whether this restructure will have significant, tangible benefits or otherwise.

On a personal note I wish to extend my sincere appreciation for the wonderful support offered during my absence through illness in Term III.

REPORT FROM CHAIRPERSON BOARD OF TRUSTEES

This present Board has been in office for under a year. The ten members have already molded themselves into a team with the purpose of governing the school to the best of our ability.

As Chairperson of the new Board I would like to pay tribute to the previous Chairperson Dr Maureen Lewis. She excelled as a student at Papakura High School in both the academic and sporting fields. Dr Lewis served on both the Board of Governors and Board of Trustees. Eight years of service and dedication, a record to be proud of. On behalf of the Board and parents I thank her and wish her every enjoyment in her new found leisure time.

This year has seen the Board being faced with many discussions that will affect the future of the school. We have agreed to Direct Resourcing of the School Bus Transport. This will give flexibility within the school to arrange bus transport to the best advantage. The question of Central or Direct Resourcing of teachers' salaries has yet to be decided. The Board has made available all the information it has received to staff. Members of the Board have listened to teaching staffs' concerns, attended open forums and a question and answer time with the Minister of Education. A review of the Charter is under way. The school community will be consulted to listen to their views and incorporate them in the revised Charter.

The Technical block has finally had approval for some \$425,000 to be spent on its upgrade. The Board is awaiting the New Technology Curriculum brief so we can appoint an architect who can design the new block so that it meets the new curricular criteria.

Staffing has been relatively stable. Mr Brewin, as you aware, had a serious accident in September. The position of Principal was taken over by Mr Gall.

The student representative on the Board is Melanie Beauchamp. Melanie has presented the Board each month with a full and comprehensive report on subjects of student concerns and involvement. Her contribution has been extremely valuable and the Board have acted on many of her suggestions.

As the school year draws to a close I would like to thank both staff and students for the part they have individually and collectively played in making this school what it is. To those of you who are leaving us farewell and good luck. To those of you who are staying I hope you will make the best of the opportunities that will open before you. Whilst everyone will try to help, only you have the key to your success and future life style.



Staff and students were saddened by the death of Miriam Milne on the 26th of May 1995.

Miriam was deeply loved by those who knew her and her warmth and vibrant personality will be missed by us all.

Mim was born on the 7th of February 1977, a beautiful Aquarian, and first born daughter of Tony and Janet. She was one of three children and many staff and students knew her brother Jacob and sister Rebecca, both of whom attended Papakura High School.

Her first years were spent at Ararimu and the rest to Ararimu Primary School until 1987 when the family shifted to Clevedon then she attended Clevedon School. Mim's leadership and caring qualities were already clearly evident and she became a house leader.

Her interests were always extensive; she played the piano, sang, rode her horse Gibby, wrote, and loved animals, and the outdoors especially the beach. She spent her summers and holidays with her family at Opoutere and became a keen surfer as she grew older.

She came to P.H.S. in 1990 and was always involved in school activities. She had the gift of relating to people, no matter what their age and of listening and caring as well as having the most wonderful fun.

She was chosen to go to Bolivia on an AFS student exchange in 1993 after her fifth form year and she spent a year in Trinidad, a small town near a tributary of the Amazon.

She returned in 1994, a fluent Spanish speaker and with a wealth of amazing experiences in South America - trekking the Andes for 4 days, seeing pink fish, water dolphins in the jungle, singing in front of 3000 people and enjoying the Bolivian way of life - parties and fiestas and celebrations and lots of friends.

She wanted to go to training college to become a teacher working with handicapped children.

House captain in 1994, she became a Prefect this year and was very proud and delighted with the achievements she made - dragonboat team, ball committee and she was to have the lead in "Joseph" as well as being a wonderful friend to so many.

Family links with the school - C D Milne - her Grandfather was a foundation teacher of the school and became HOD of Science. Her father and Uncles Peter and John all went to Papakura High School, and her mother Janet taught at P.H.S. for several years until 1993.

Her remarkably full but tragically short life was celebrated in the Eulogy, written and read so movingly by Glen Rowsell at the funeral service. Both our sense of loss and our joy at having known and loved Miriam, is captured in these memories.

A Personal Tribute to Miriam Milne

NO NO NO LIFE

WHY SHOULD A DOG, A HORSE, A RAT HAVE LIFE

AND THOU NO BREATH AT ALL? THOU'RT COME NO MORE

NEVER, NEVER, NEVER, NEVER NEVER.

(King Lear Shakespeare)

I am honoured to speak on this occasion to pay tribute to a very special young woman and I thank Janet and her family for the invitation to be part of this service.

My name is Glenn Rowsell and I am Dean of Form 7 at Papakura High. I know I speak for all the staff at PHS and for all of Miriam's teachers throughout the years when I say that she was one of those very rare young people who make me glad that I am a teacher and her untimely death has affected us all terribly.

Miriam had this wonderful gift of always making me feel good about teaching, about myself and about life whenever we met and I will always cherish my many memories of her lovely smile, those huge sparkling eyes, her positiveness and enthusiasm for everything she did and her impish sense of fun that made it impossible not to love her dearly.

I wish to share with you today three of my many memories of Miriam that I think show what a special person she was, and why I grieve her passing and why I will miss her so much.

My first memory is from last year when Mim was in my 7th form English class. I was going to say I taught Miriam English but I suspect that is too loose a use of that word! She had an innate gift for writing and reading English but last year was a little unsettled and unsure of just what she wanted out of school and like many young people her age was finding it rather hard to focus on academic work. To put it plainly, punctual attendance at my class was not always a top priority for Mim, and when others in the class started to follow her leadership, I decided it was time to make a stand. No more Mr Nice Guy, so I laid the law down to them in my sternest tones, with frequent glances at Miriam to ensure that she, in particular, got the message that any more lateness to my class would provoke my wrath and the perpetrator could expect to suffer the consequences. Next day I rushed to class hoping to catch them out only to find them all there, ready to work. All that is except Miriam. 5 minutes passed and still no sign of her although the rest of the class gleefully informed me she was at school and was on her way to class. I was working myself into a decently vicious frame of mind and I would really make an example of this chronic late-comer when she finally arrived.

Sure enough, 8 minutes after the bell the door to my room was flung open and there stood Miriam. bold as brass with that huge grin, that twinkle in her eye and in her favourite DADA stance. n MR Rowsell I'm here" she announced proudly and all my vicious intentions melted to nothing All I could blurt out was "Miriam it's lovely to see you", and I meant it. I always found it impossible to stay angry with Miriam and she was a real treat to have in the classroom.

My other two memories of Mim concern "Joseph" in which Miriam was to sing the lead role and for which she was working so hard. Miriam's voice was interesting and had huge potential to develop but to be honest she won the role hands down because of her dynamic stage presence, that indefinable quality that sets outstanding performers apart from merely competent ones. Miriam had this quality in abundance and I was really excited by what she had shown David Naylor, Sharon Lofroth and all the Joseph cast in rehearsals because I know she would have been an absolute knockout good narrator in the show.

Anyhow, earlier this year I had had afternoon tea with Janet at the farm and had been entranced by a CD that she was playing. It was called "A Woman's Heart" and I had borrowed the CD from Janet, taken it home to copy, and then returned it to Janet. When Mim was given the part of the Narrator I promised her a tape of Joseph so she could learn the songs, but in my haste to give her the music I accidentally copied over the Woman's Heart tape I had made earlier. But I must not have rewound it properly before putting on the Joseph music for Mim because when Mim came to play it she heard this entrancing Irish music and mentioned to Janet later that she loved it and played it to her. Janet of course recognised it and realised what had happened and so the music had come full circle and returned home and I know this story is one that Janet cherishes.

My last memory is of Miriam's final rehearsal last Thursday night. We had rehearsed from 6 - 9 and Miriam had sung her heart out and looked so happy doing what she loved to do. She had worked very hard to learn the difficult part and everything that night was coming right. Her singing and her leadership of the group was superb and at the end of the night as we were leaving I said to her "Miriam you were awesome" They are the truest words I have spoken. Miriam you were awesome and I consider it a real privilege to have known you and you have enriched my life and the lives of all those who have taught you, worked with you and sung with you through your all too brief life.

Miriam loved reading and writing poetry and last year when we studied TS Eliot Miriam really enjoyed the work. As my final tribute to Miriam I would like to read one of her favourite extracts from *Ash Wednesday* and I hope it offers the same comfort to you all as it has to me these last few days.



EXCHANGE STUDENTS



This led on to the Auckland region finals. The teams lined up as follows.


- Lane 1 - Rosehill


An answering cry came – it was the chief in his prime. His silver hair was now ebony black his features defiant and full of vigour.


1995 1st RUGBY XV.


BADMINTON 1995






