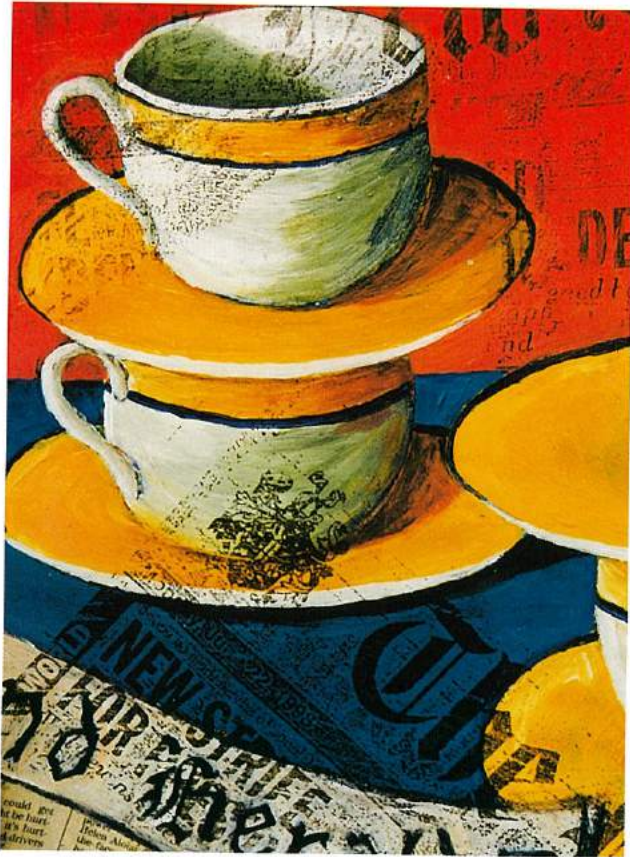

MR N H THORNTON

12 December 1918 - 12 September 1998

With regret we note the death earlier this year of Papakura High School's second principal Mr Neville Henry Thornton.

Mr Thornton was educated at Otahuhu College, then Auckland Teachers' Training College and Auckland University.

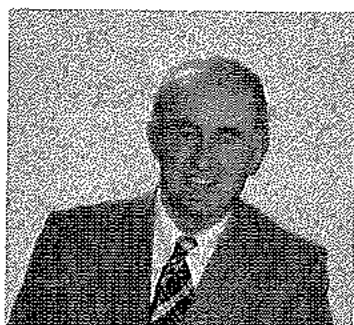
His early career in education involved being appointed sole teacher-in-charge at Whangamarino School but he could not take up this position as he was serving in the infantry and tank units of the army in Egypt and Italy during World War Two.

Upon returning to New Zealand he taught first at Otahuhu College, then at Mt Roskill Grammar School before being appointed Principal of Rotorua Boys' High School. This appointment lasted three years from 1960, then he took up the principalship of Papakura High School.

The changes Mr Thornton noticed during his career involved the attitude of pupils to education and to learning in general.

His special interests at the school were to foster the development of all pupils and to encourage their participation in sport. School Houses were established and inter-house rivalry provided new inspiration. He encouraged Maori pupils to accept the challenge of education and arranged for the building of the first Maori Studies Centre. He developed the remedial reading programme by drawing on voluntary tutors from the community.

But perhaps his most enduring contribution to the school's development was a physical one - the enhancement of the site, by a judicious tree-planting programme. The success of this labour of love, usually undertaken during school holiday breaks, is visible in the mature trees which have given Papakura High School "a touch of magic".



33 YEARS AT PAPAKURA HIGH SCHOOL

Not three (as I'd originally intended), not one (as I would have liked partway through my first year when the opportunity for travel the following year arose), but just over 33 years (and 4 principals) later I have ceased to be a staff member at Papakura High School.

Why did I stay so long? I stayed so long because of the opportunities and challenges which came my

way as I progressed from being a junior teacher to Deputy Principal (with a variety of responsibilities and positions along the way), because of the friendly, caring staff and students, and because I found my job (or, perhaps more correctly, jobs) fulfilling, satisfying, rewarding and enjoyable.

Of course I saw many changes during those 33 years. The gymnasium was officially opened during my first year, and at that time the Library was in L1 (the reason the wing was called "L"), there was no W wing, no Pavilion, no Wharenui, no Experience or XA Unit, no Drama or Guidance Suite. The school had been built on land which was the original farm of the Willis family, and the old farmhouse still stood on the grounds. The canteen was at the side of the Hall, and the Principal's office, along with those of other Senior staff, was behind the school office in space now occupied by Mrs Lees, Mrs Brown and student reception.

Boys and girls had separate lunch areas and, in many cases, separate classes, - boys in Technical classes, girls in Commercial or Homecraft classes, with only the Professional classes mixed, although before long the non-Professional classes were grouped together as General, and 3rd formers (Year 9 students - there were no vertical forms) were either "Pros" or "Gens" in 3 Pro a - e or 3 Gen 1 - 8 (fully streamed).

The uniform was different too - predominantly grey, as the boys wore grey shorts and shirts, the girls grey tunics. All wore green blazers, however, and those were also the days of headwear - green caps for the boys, green berets for the girls. The boys' uniform remained relatively unchanged for a long time, but I remember many years

ago modelling for the Uniform Committee the green and white check dress which became the girls' summer uniform!

Full school assemblies were held regularly and there was a Papakura High School song book which all students were required to take to assembly for school singing.

No Japanese was taught when I began (although Papakura High School was among the first schools to offer Japanese, in the early 1970's) I taught Latin, French and English at first, later substituting German for English, and later still teaching Japanese and more recently, a little ESOL through involvement with the International Students' programme. Over the years it has been particularly gratifying to see a number of students use their language skills in their careers and, in some cases, have access to careers because of those skills.

Intensives were already operating when I joined the staff - a special programme for junior students at the end of the year focusing on new places, new experiences and new challenges. I have fond memories of the Bay of Islands, Tongariro National Park, Marlborough Sounds, Coromandel Peninsula, Urewera National Park, Kaimanawa Forest Park, Whirinaki Forest Park - exploring, tramping, surviving! Then there were Senior camps at Raglan and Okui and, later, the opportunity for all students to enjoy the school camp at Waharau. I am sure there will be very many students and staff who, like me, have had a new and exciting dimension added to their lives through Papakura High School's strong Outdoor Education tradition and the many wonderful experiences it affords.

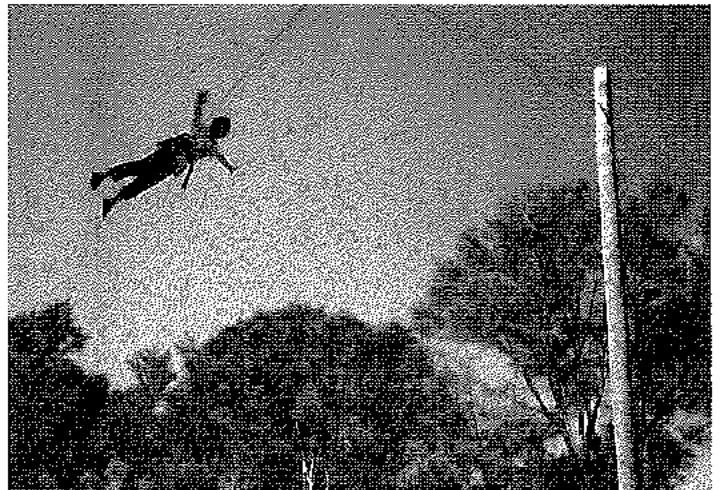
Papakura High School students have also had, for as long as I remember, the opportunity to be involved in a wide variety of Clubs, Societies and other activities offered by staff. I remember assisting with a number of Drama and Musical shows, and have special memories of my long association with the Colenso Society, as well as of time spent at Whatapaka with Reo Awhina students. There were also school trips - to New Caledonia and Japan.

Then there have been sports - for me, involvement with a number of netball teams, badminton teams, and once, a hockey team. Local competitions, and trips away. I recall an overnight trip to what was then Waipu District High School - we were on our way home when we were aware of a car speeding along behind the buses - one of the staff had been left behind! Athletic Sports too, and the Staff vs Students Relay. I doubt that there would now be the awe that once accompanied one students' remark to me - "Gee, you can motor, Miss!" - that was some years ago.

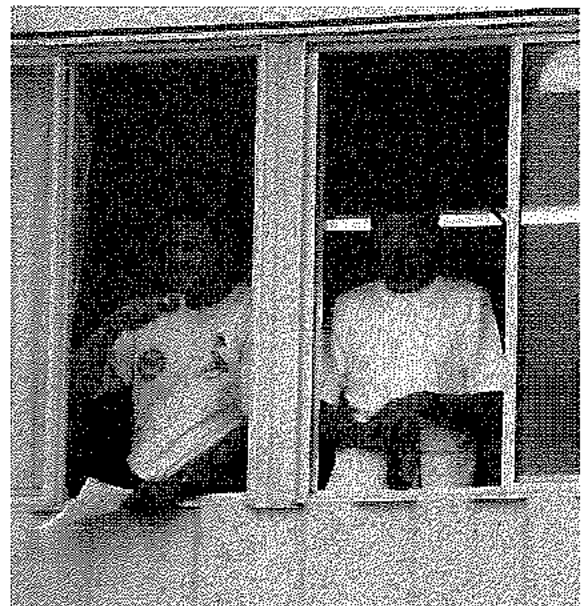
I wonder how many reports I have written and/or signed over the years - several thousands, certainly. I have taught the parents of some current students, and even some of the staff, although I'm sure it wasn't me who said to Mr Boston (as recorded in the 1971 School Magazine),

"Derek, you never take any notes in class, you just sit there with a stupid grin on your face. Look at him - he's still grinning."! However, I do remember writing on his report that he was 'cheerful', while Miss Sabbage I remember as a conscientious and excellent student.

I estimate that I travelled up and down the motorway between my home and school perhaps 1100 - 1200 times (actually, that's not quite right as some of those trips would have been before the motorway was constructed!) but now it's time for me to travel in other directions, both literally and figuratively. However I shall always be grateful for the tremendous impact Papakura High School has had on my life, and for the many wonderful opportunities and experiences it has given me. I encourage you all to make the most of the opportunities it offers you too - there are great rewards and exciting new horizons to be discovered. My very best wishes to you all.



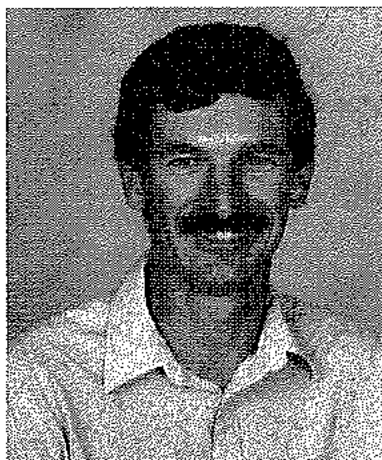
Miss Smytheman tackles the High Ropes course at Waharau

DEREK BOSTON

In 1967 I walked through the Alpha Street gates to Papakura High School as a third former... 31 years later I'm leaving. I take up a position as Head of Social Science Faculty at Mount Maunganui College starting in Term 1 1999. Though I have occasionally been criticised for remaining in the same school for so long, I have never regretted my decision to stay here.



Our school is a vibrant place with lots happening all the time. It is in a constant state of change as we all strive to do things better. There are always new opportunities and challenges presenting themselves, and I have always maintained that provided I contribute in a positive way to the life of the school, then I would remain here. The impressive welcome was conducted by a number of Papakura High School students along with Mr Stirling and Mr Pratt. This was followed by a welcome from Mrs Appleby and lunch in the Pavilion.

Prior to coming to Papakura High School I taught at Edgewater College and was Head of Science for the past ten years.

This year saw the resurgence of the Bledisloe House spirit in both the sporting and academic events.

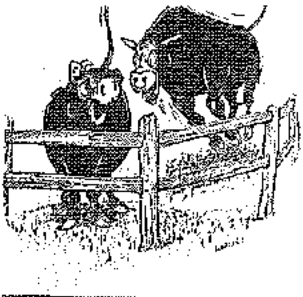

The whole team showed a great improvement in their skills as the season progressed and competed well over the whole season.

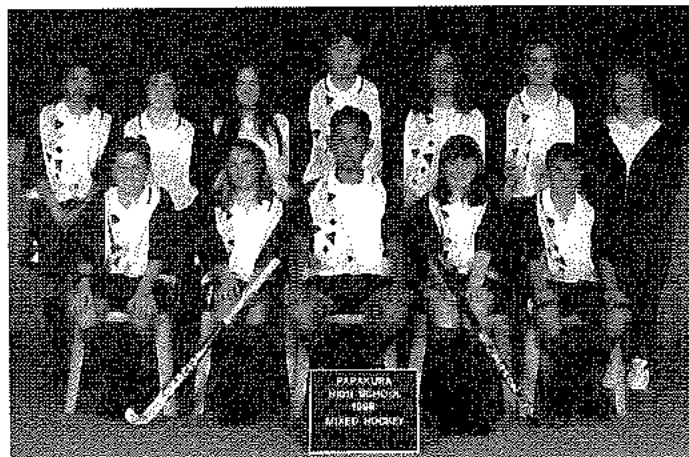

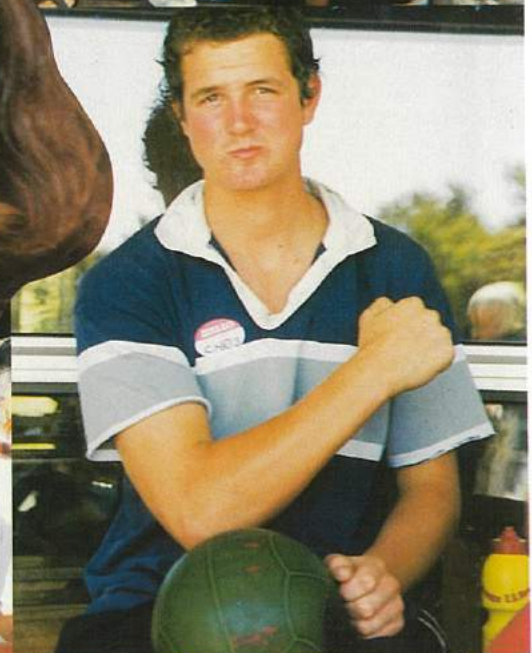
The boys completed another successful season. The team was made up mostly of senior students who played for the team last year. This enabled the team to continue it's development in it's attacking style of play and team passing.

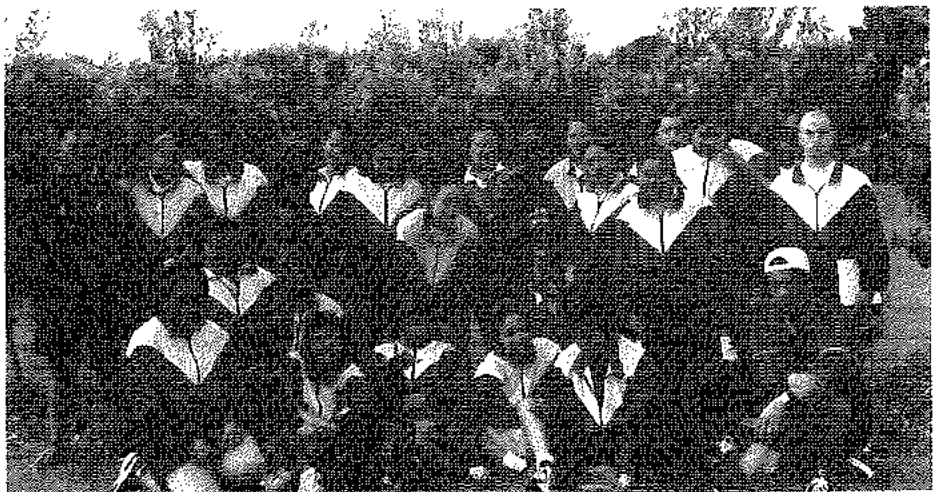
SENIOR GIRLS RUGBY LEAGUE

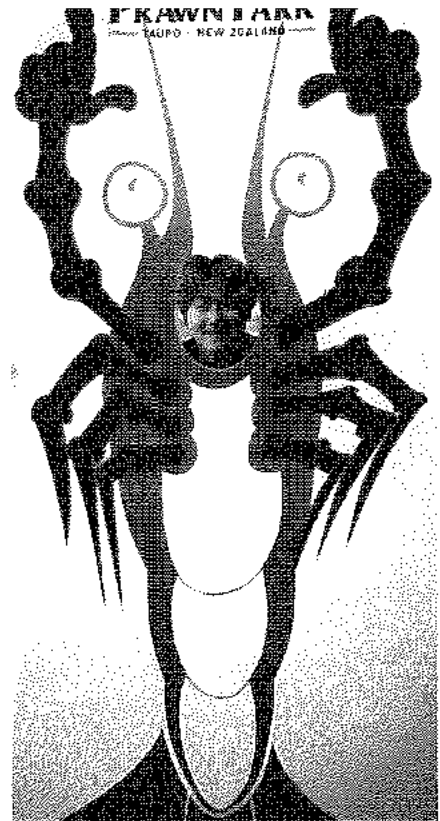
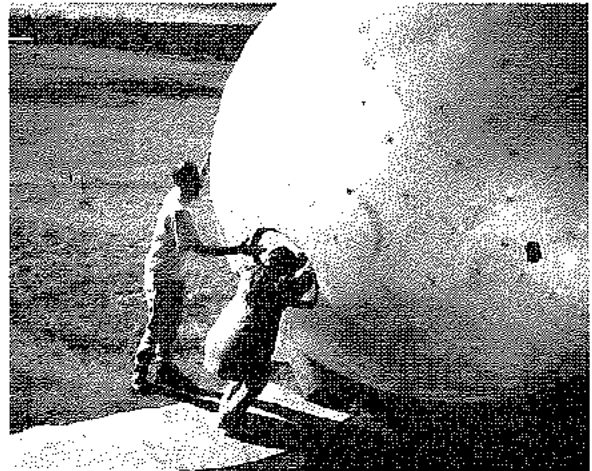
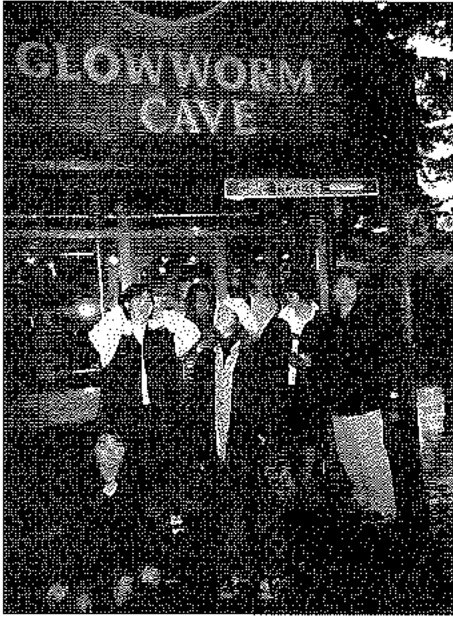
spiders. A snowflight halfway up Ruapehu and soaking in the thermal pools were also memorable.

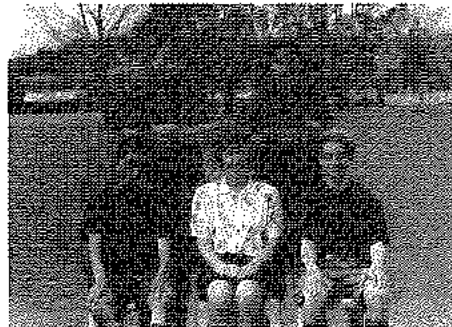
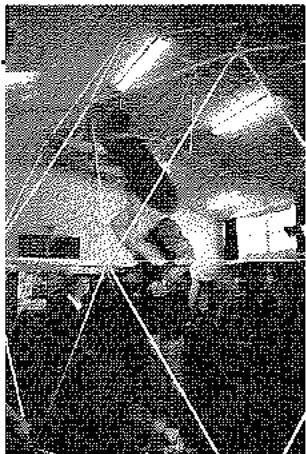

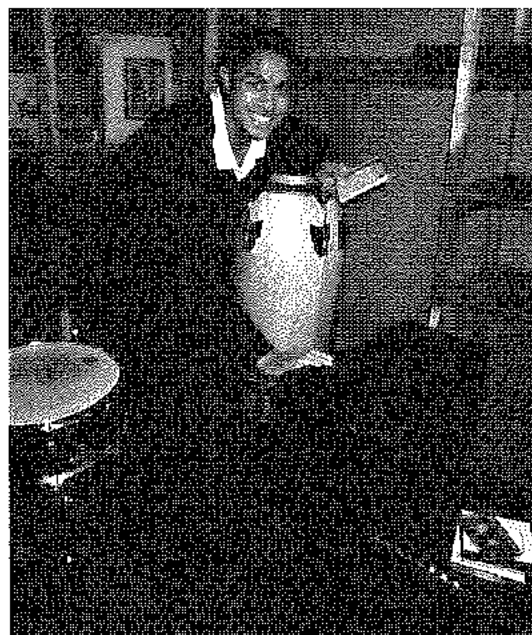
MUSIC
