2001 BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT

Three yearly Board of Trustee elections were held in April. We were gratified to have nineteen names put forward for election - an outstanding response from our parents which reflects the strong interest that our community has in the education of its young people. We welcomed newly elected members Louise Mathieson and Jim Powell, Staff Representative Mere Ngawati and Student Representative Samuelu Aati. During the year we co-opted Julie Wilson, Harold So'e, John Taylor and Richard Lumsden.

With regret we farewelled retiring Board Members Myra Smith, Pepe Alefaio and Jim Frear. I would like to particularly acknowledge the Board's gratitude to Mr Frear who was an extremely knowledgeable and hardworking Board member for ten years and Board Chair for six years.

There have also been changes in the Senior Management team. The Board appointed Mrs Jan Cosslett to the position of Director of Personnel, and Mr Doug Rosie to the new position of Associate Principal.

Earlier this year we received the exciting news that the school has been granted \$700,000 by the Ministry towards the building of a new Gymnasium. The Board has had plans drawn up, and work will start during the Christmas Holidays. The new Gymnasium will take the form of a new wing to the existing gymnasium, which will be upgraded. The Board has allocated another \$400,000 which will allow us to complete stage one by the middle of next year. We are seeking additional funding locally which will enable us to complete stages two and three within two years. The Board also has plans underway for the future construction of an Arts Suite to be built on to the existing school hall. With the completion of both projects, we will have two 'state of the art' facilities which will be wonderful assets for both the school and the community.

In 2004 the school will be celebrating our 50th Jubilee. Early next year we will be forming a Jubilee Committee to start planning for this important milestone. We invite all past pupils,

staff and former Board Members who would like to contribute to the organization of the Jubilee celebrations to contact us.

With the incoming Government introducing legislation to abolish Direct Resourcing, or Bulk Funding, we have lost a lot of the financial flexibility that we have enjoyed during the past five years. This decision has made it necessary for us to review our spending in some areas, and has resulted in the Board being a lot more circumspect with regard to school budgets and expenditure.

Delivery of the curriculum remains the most important focus for the Board. Along with several other Auckland schools, we have recently become part of a literacy study on the reading standards of new entrants. As a result of this study, we have appointed a full time reading teacher who will complement our existing programme designed to raise literacy standards in the junior school.

Best wishes to all staff and students who are leaving us this year. Thank you for the contribution you have made to the school during your time with us. Congratulations to those students who have achieved success in both academic and sporting pursuits.

As we look forward to 2002, the Board is confident that the school is in good heart, and endeavouring to meet the challenges of providing an excellent educational environment for both present and future students,







INTERMEDIATE BOYS TENNIS






GIRLS 1St XV RUGBY - Ten Mins Till Death


There were dancers, that bedazzled the audience with their range of creative choreographs. Despite difficulties with microphones,



With a turnout of approximately 150 people, the production was greatly appreciated. We all hope they can come again next year and expect a bigger attendance.



Arts Cafe Evening










Academic Institute Magazine Report




1st XI Girls Cricket






