
As the school moves towards its Golden Jubilee in March 2004 I would like to acknowledge the staff, students and trustees of the school who all work so hard to ensure the schools success.


responsibilities. We welcome back Ngaire Cole as Staff Representative.

The Gymnasium links to the old Gym and features; Foyer area, a Fitness Centre, three classrooms, kitchen facilities, large changing facilities and stadium seats.






















## In 2003 we welcomed to Papakura...








## International Students Day:

## Trees for Survival




Papakura High has been involved with the Rotary sponsored, Trees for Survival Programme, for three years now. It is a programme run through many schools in Auckland and allows students real "hands on experience of planting and caring for native trees".

Through the year they have pricked out hundreds of native tree seedlings into old milk cartons, plastic planter bags and root trainers. These are then cared for in the schools horticulture unit. When the plants have reached maturity they are planted into their final growing positions on an erosion prone property. This year the selected property was in Patumahoe.

The students were taken out for a day to experience the realities of real life Horticulture. Support was given from the Auckland Regional Council and The Papakura Rotary Club. The support of Graeme Hall from Rotary is greatly appreciated; he is a key motivator and organiser of this programme.


## Art Department





## The Foundation Studies






This is the fifth year this course has run at this school and I am pleased to report that it goes from strength to strength.
