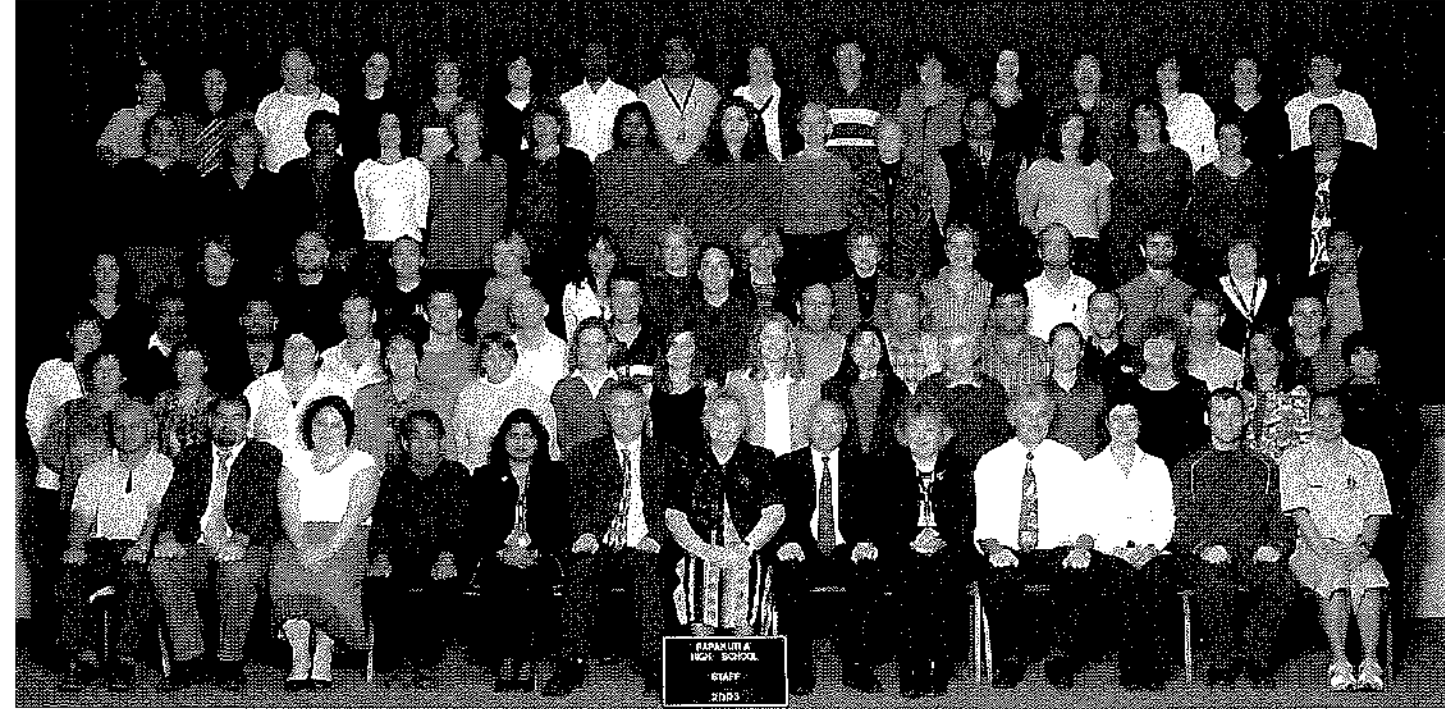

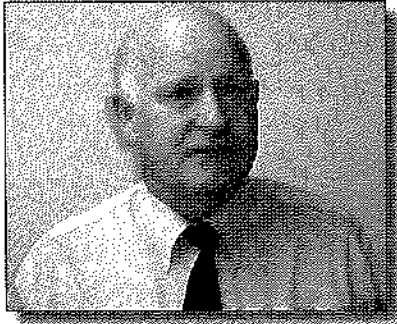
As the school moves towards its Golden Jubilee in March 2004 I would like to acknowledge the staff, students and trustees of the school who all work so hard to ensure the school's success.

I would just like to congratulate Destiny Te Wao in gaining the new position as Student Rep for next year, and wish her the best of luck.

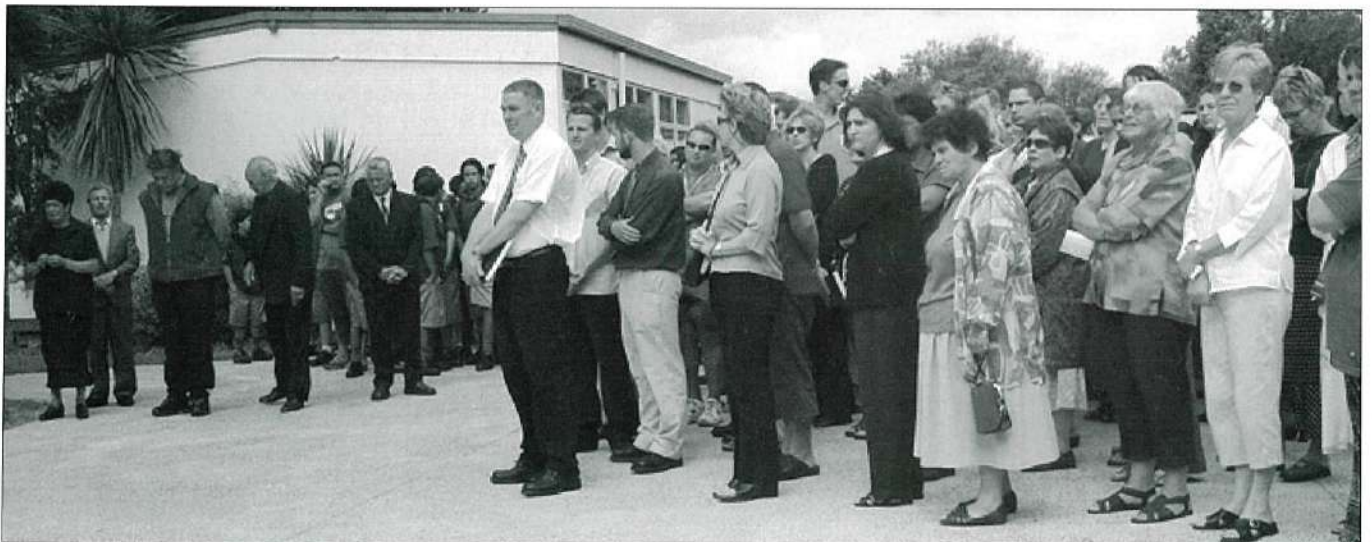

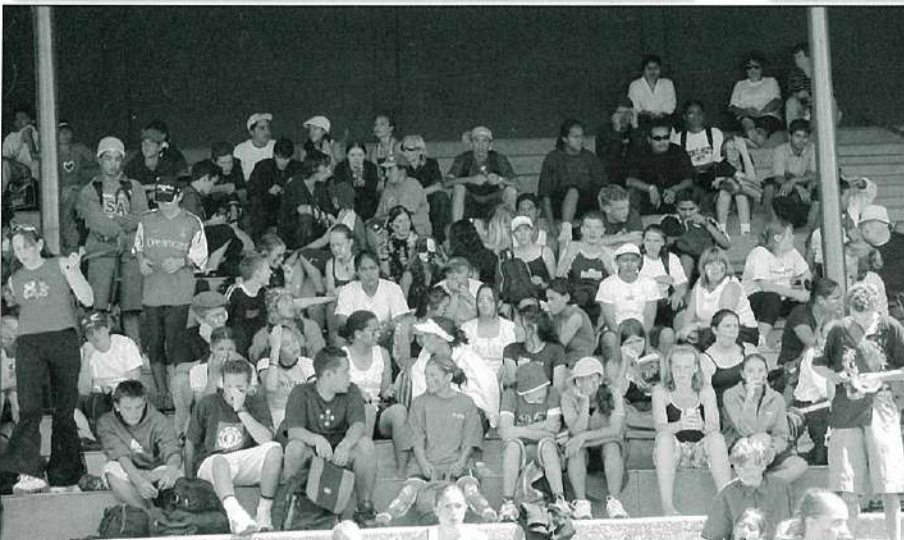


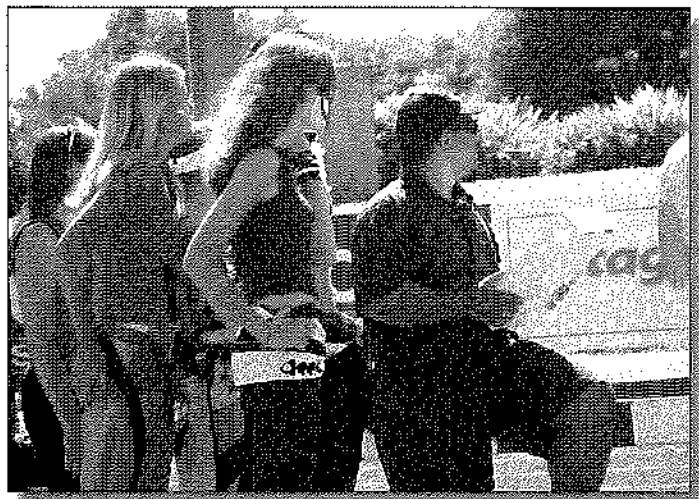
BLEDISLOE

Trees for Survival

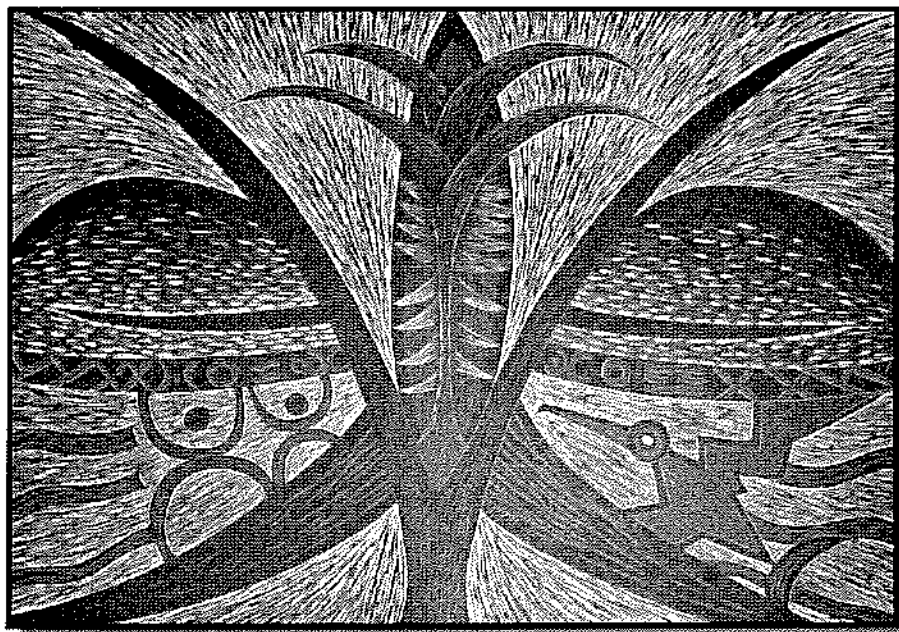


Papakura High has been involved with the Rotary sponsored, Trees for Survival Programme, for three years now. It is a programme run through many schools in Auckland and allows students real "hands on experience of planting and caring for native trees".

This year the class involved was the Year 10 Horticulture class. Through the year they have pricked out hundreds of native tree seedlings into old milk cartons, plastic planter bags and root trainers. These are then cared for in the schools horticulture unit. When the plants have reached maturity they are planted into their final growing positions on an erosion prone property. This year the selected property was in Patumahoe.

The students were taken out for a day to experience the realities of real life Horticulture. Support was given from the Auckland Regional Council and The Papakura Rotary Club. The support of Graeme Hall from Rotary is greatly appreciated; he is a key motivator and organiser of this programme.

A fine day dawned and the students approached the task with tremendous enthusiasm. This awesome attitude allowed the day to progress smoothly. Finishing early, the students were treated to an excellent barbecue for lunch which went down a treat.

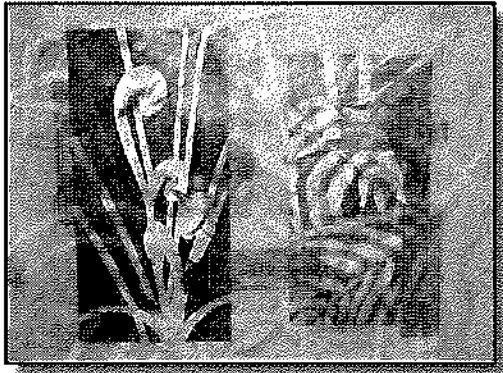
the Music department also contributed with many highly tuned items.

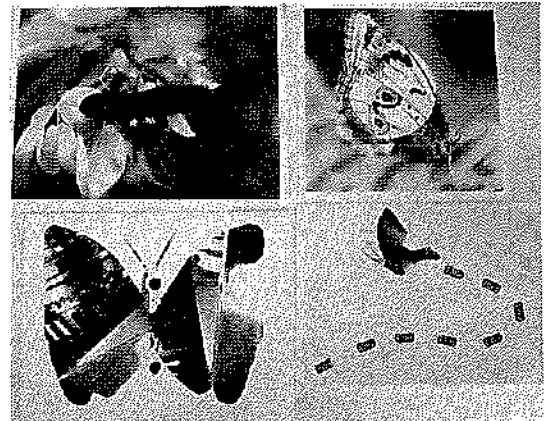
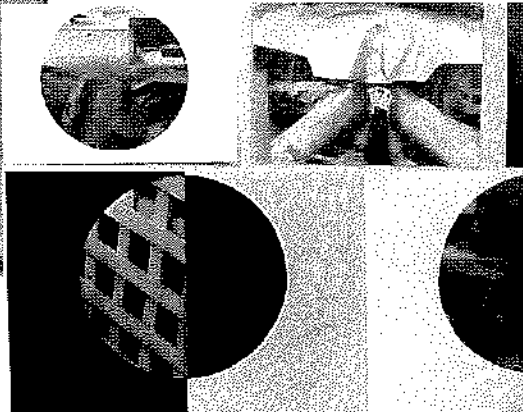
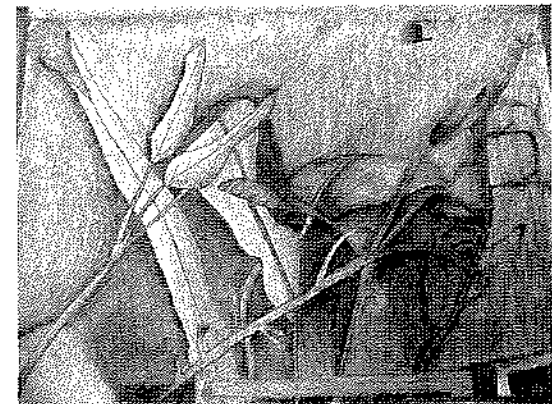
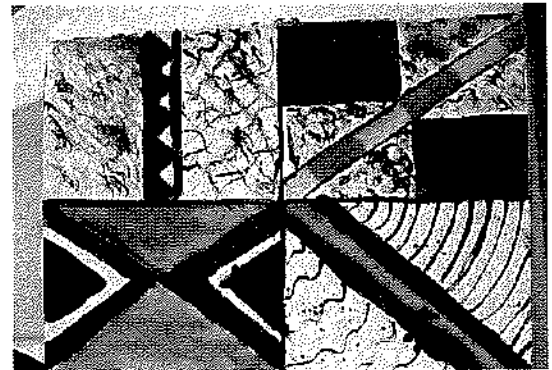
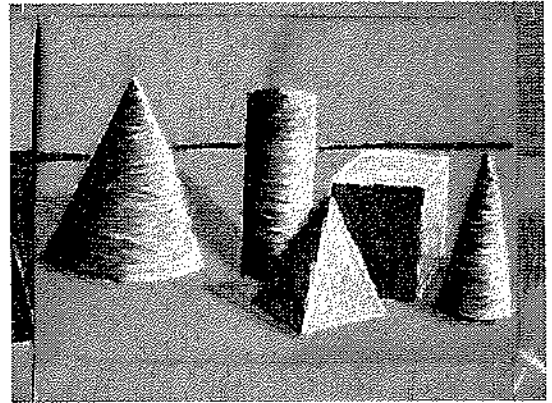
Art Department

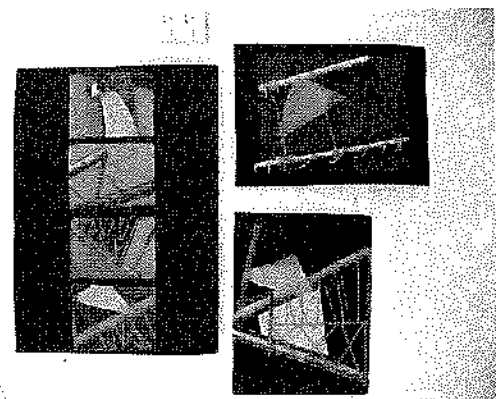
The Foundation Studies

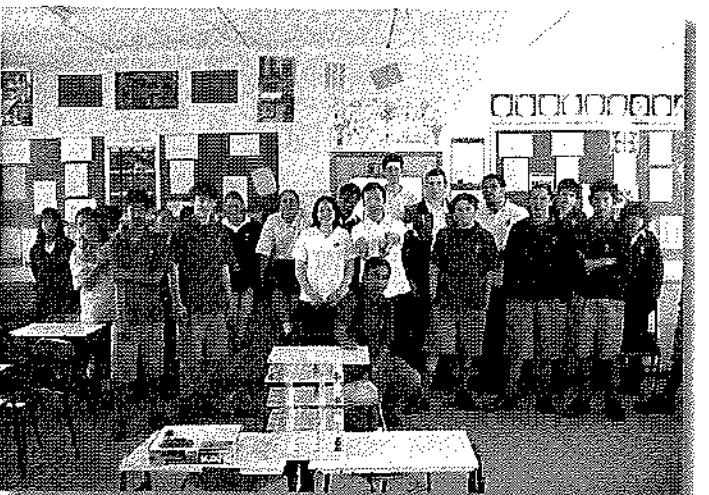
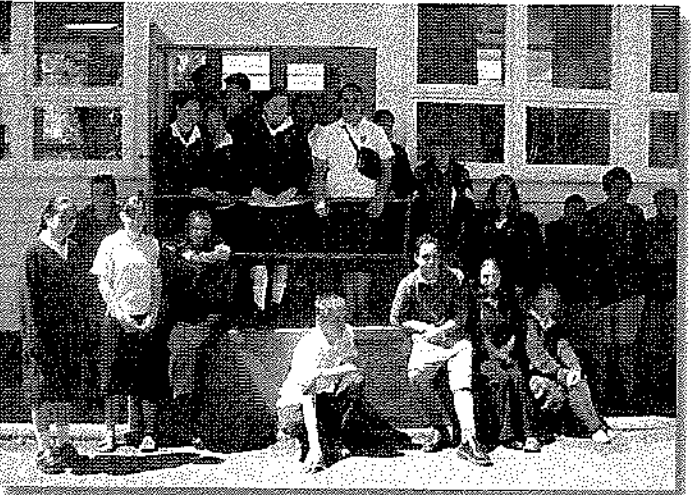

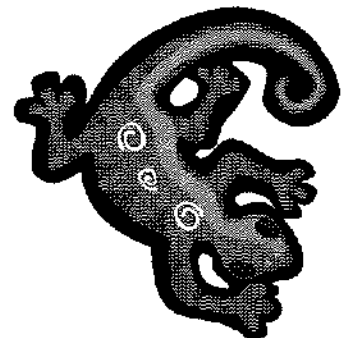
