Pemberton and Joshua Scorrar.

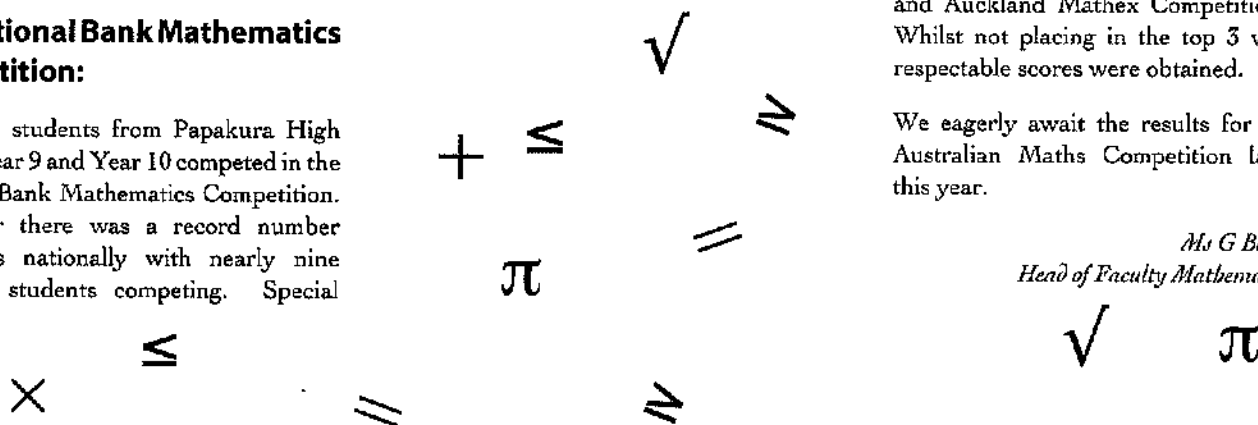
## Mathex Competitions:

That makes this world up today

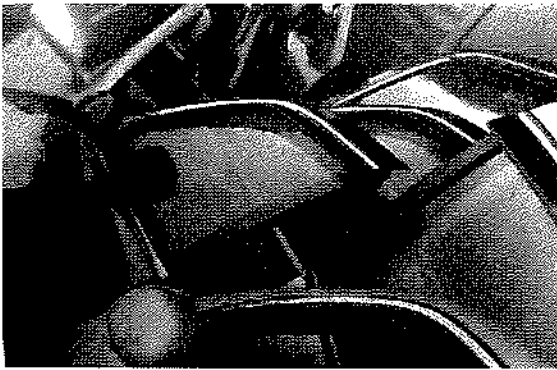
I know that you are waiting

Students were served with a delightful buffet dinner at 8 o'clock, which went down well with some of the boys from the 1st XV.

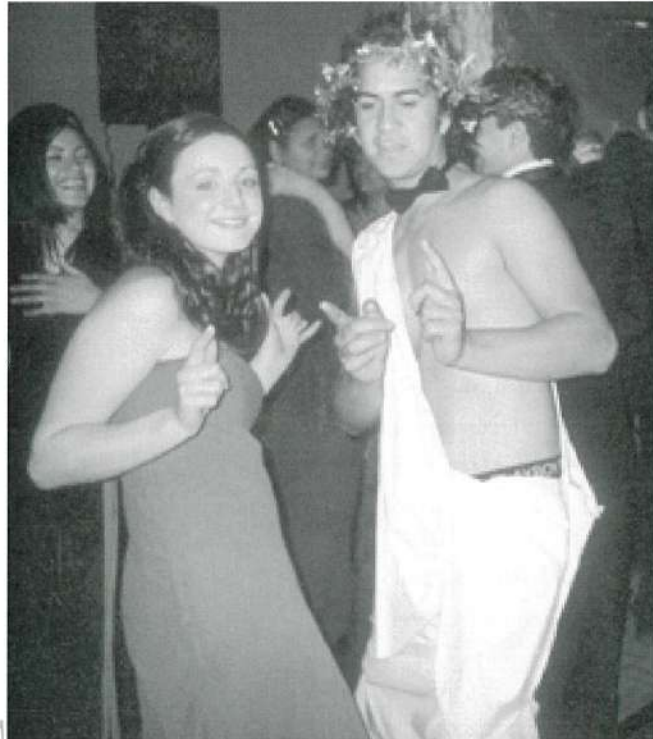
As the music played and the night progressed, it was all leading up to one final special event. The announcement of the King and Belle of the Ball for 2003.

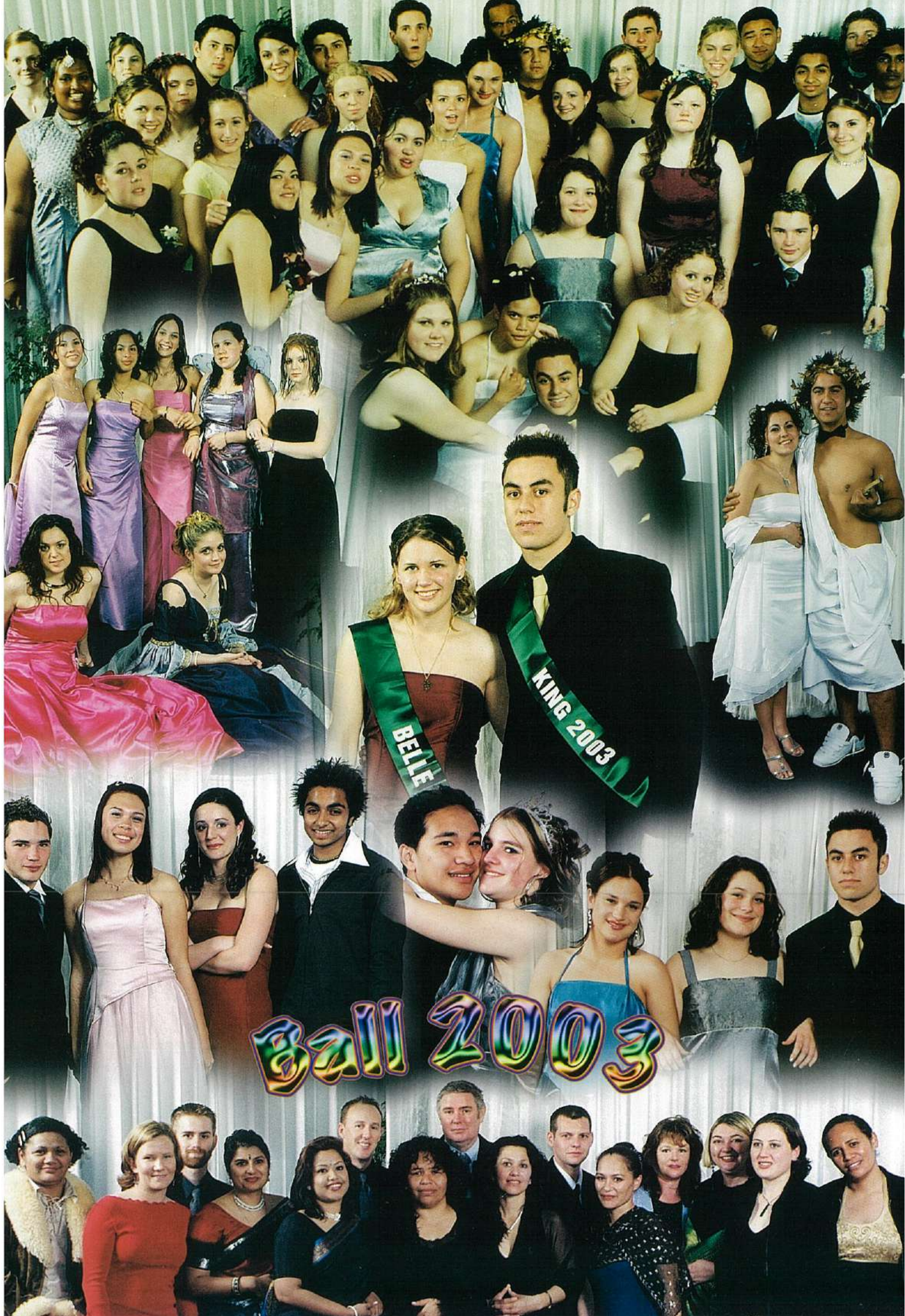

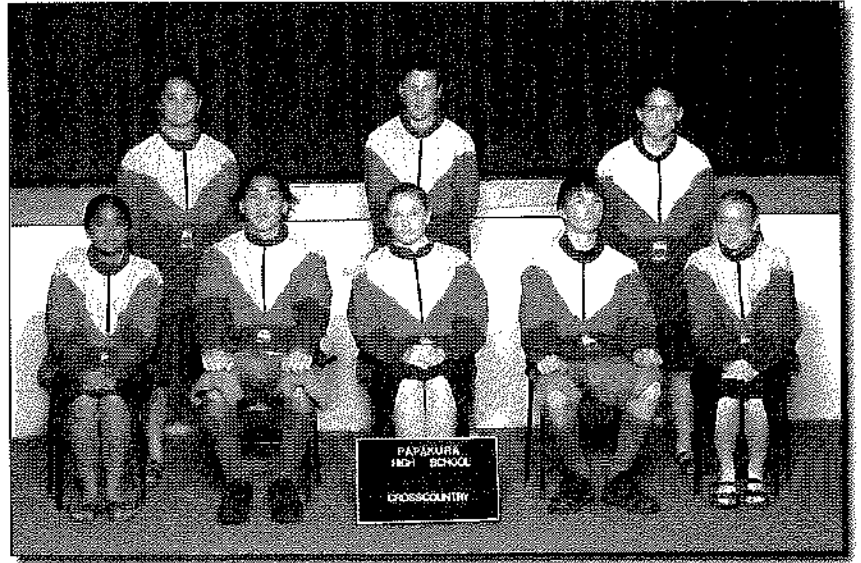

## Counties Manukau Championships

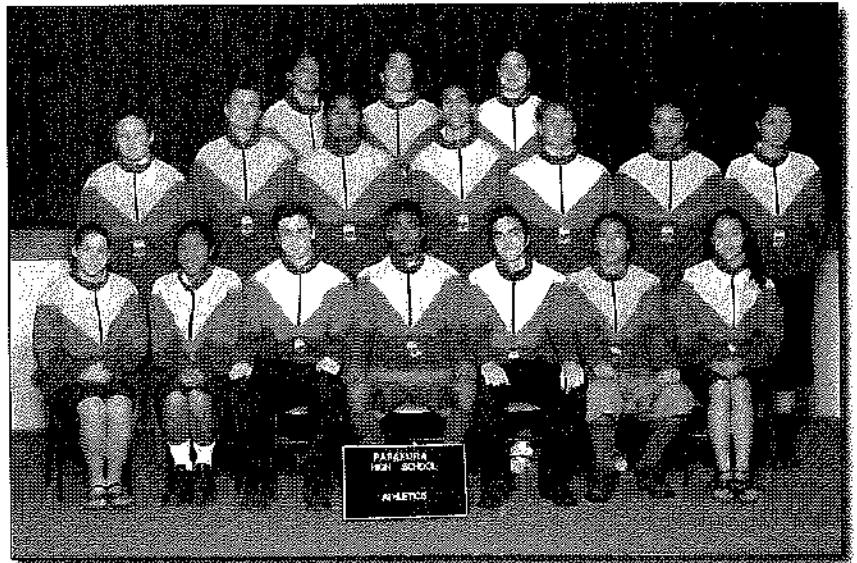

Looking forward to the next round in Term 4.

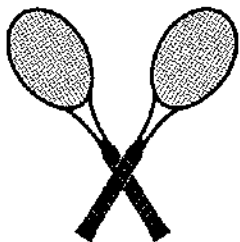

Winner of the classic catch award... Hayden Heriwini for a one handed stunner plucked out of thin air like the Puke Pirates lawn bowls win.

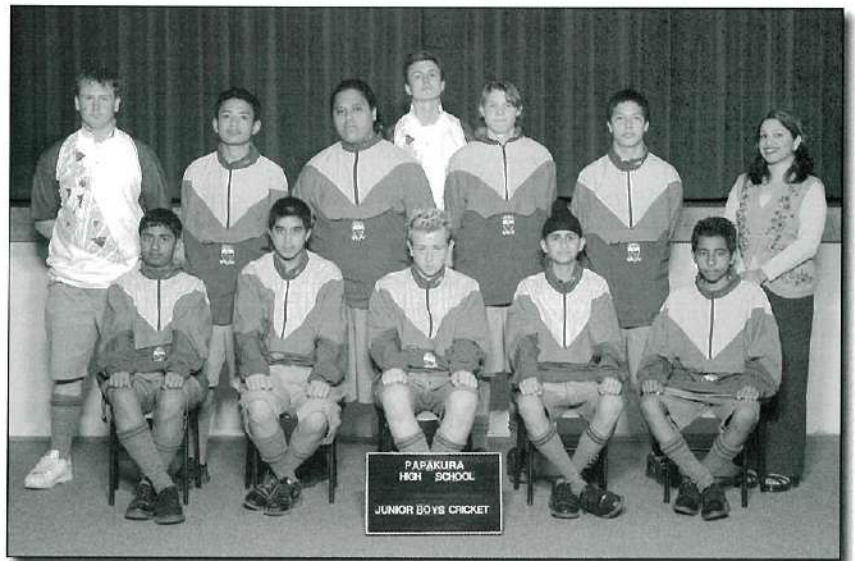

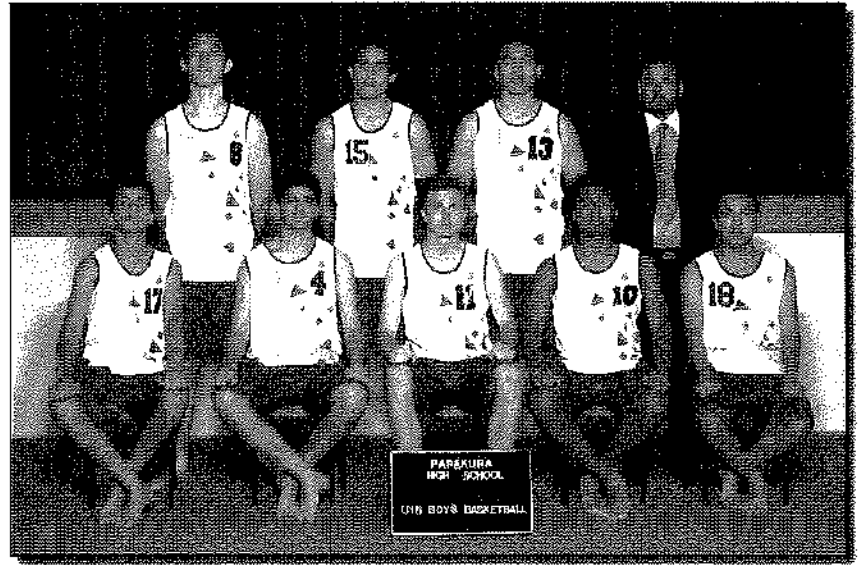
## Under 16 Boys Basketball:

Thank-you boys, from a very proud coach. Well done!

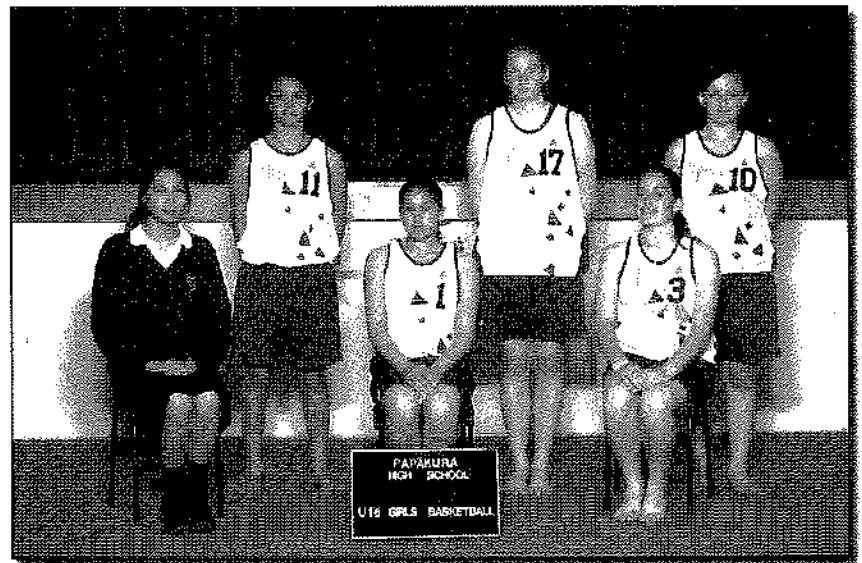

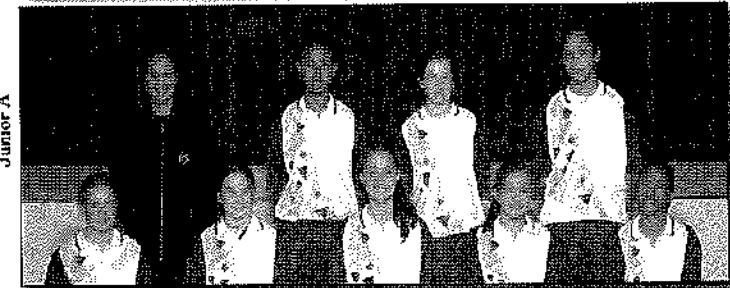


## Junior A Netball Team

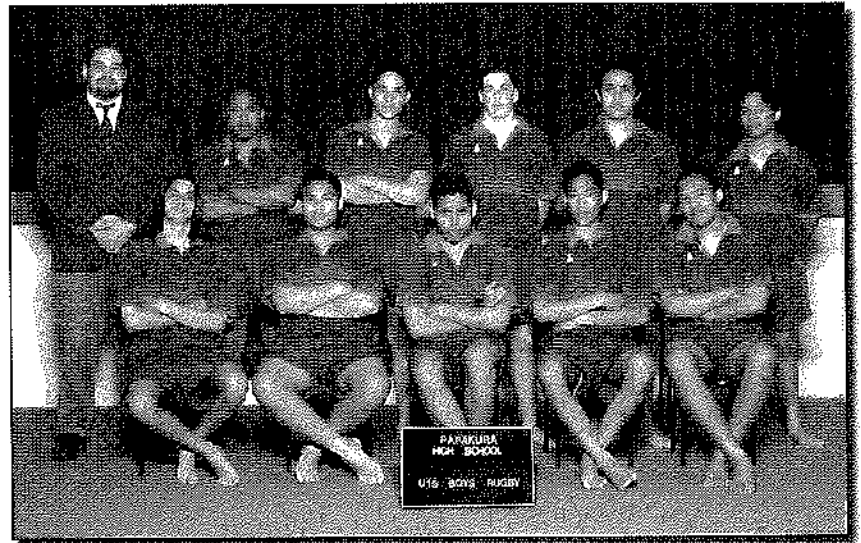


## Under 15 Boys Rugby.

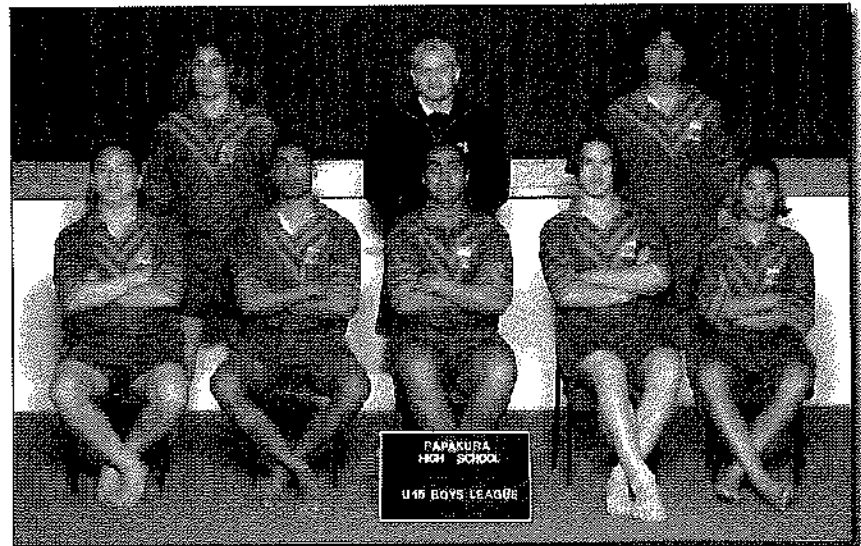
## Boys Rugby League.

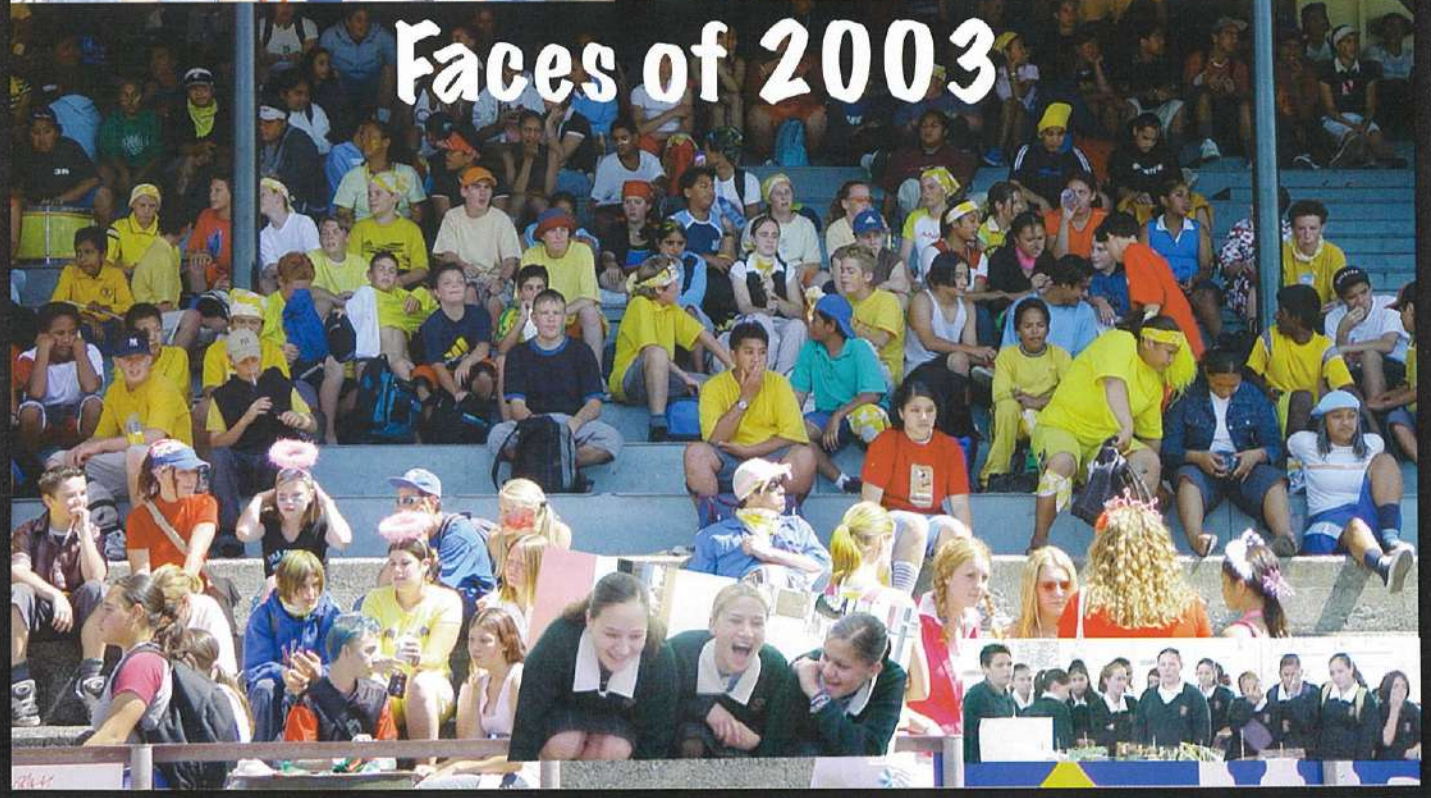

But be among Giants yourself"*

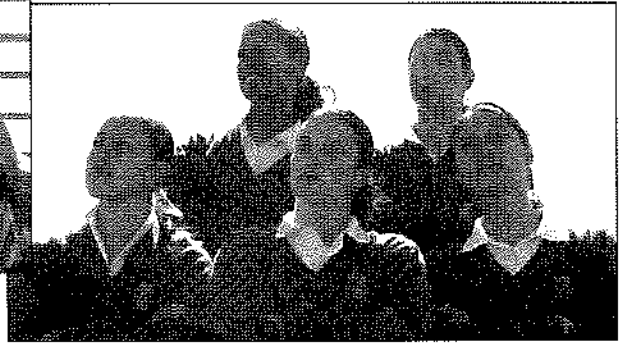


## 7th Form Camp

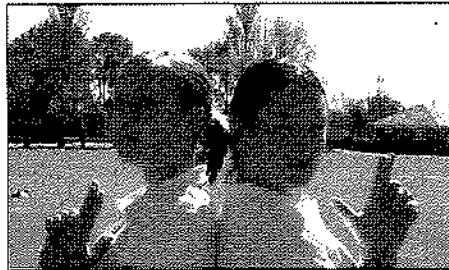
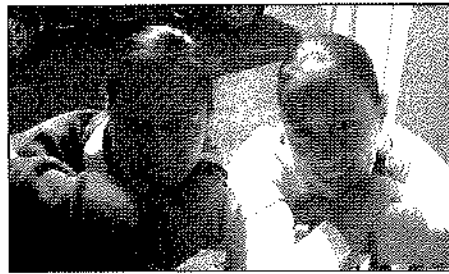

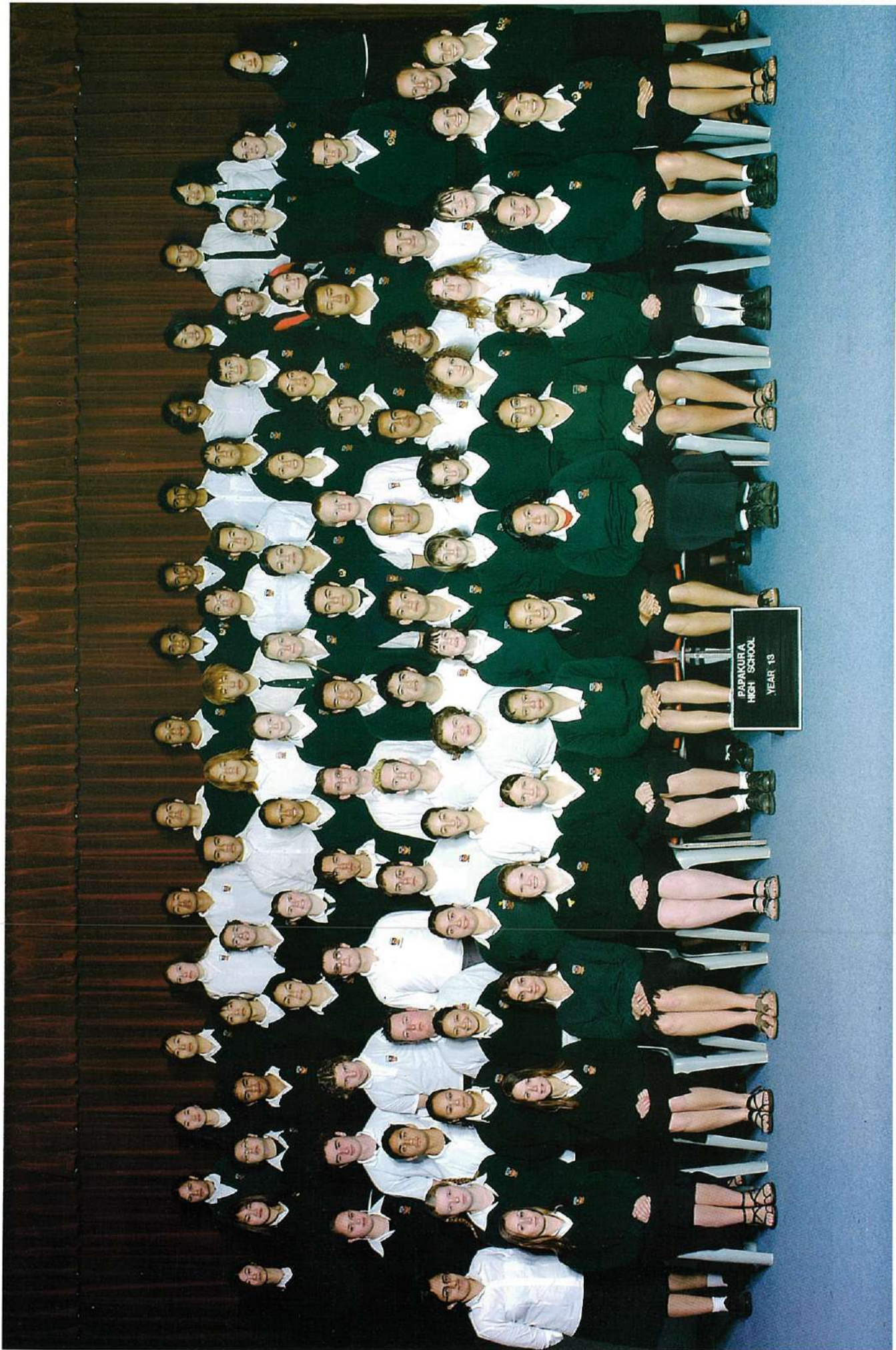

## The Academic Institute:

Due to the increased number of high quality applicants this year, the Academic Institute was increased to three classes at Year 9. There have also been two classes of Year 10 students in the programme which has allowed for both co-operation and competition between the classes at this level.

Lance King has continued to run the School Success course early in Term One for the Year 9's and their parents. This meant that students were able to identify their own personal learning style and received an excellent introduction on how to handle issues such as time management and revision.

All students in the programme sat Australian Maths, Science and English exams and there were some excellent results this year. The Year 10 students had the opportunity to visit Waikato University and were able to gain an insight into the courses offered. It was also an experience of University lifestyle.

Forty-six Year 10 Academic Institute students studied for and sat NCEA Level 1 Geography. Forty-five pupils obtained at least 12 or more credits out of a possible 24. Thirty-three pupils gained 21-24 credits. Overall a credible 98% success rate. Congratulations to all those students who attempted the course one year earlier than usual.

Next year, it is planned to extend the programme to Year 11 students. This means each Year 10 class in the programme will stay together as a tutor group and receive instruction in English, Maths and Science within the same class grouping.

There will also be at least three extension activities throughout the year culminating in an academic study camp prior to external assessment.

Thank you to all those parents and care-givers who continue to support this most successful programme.

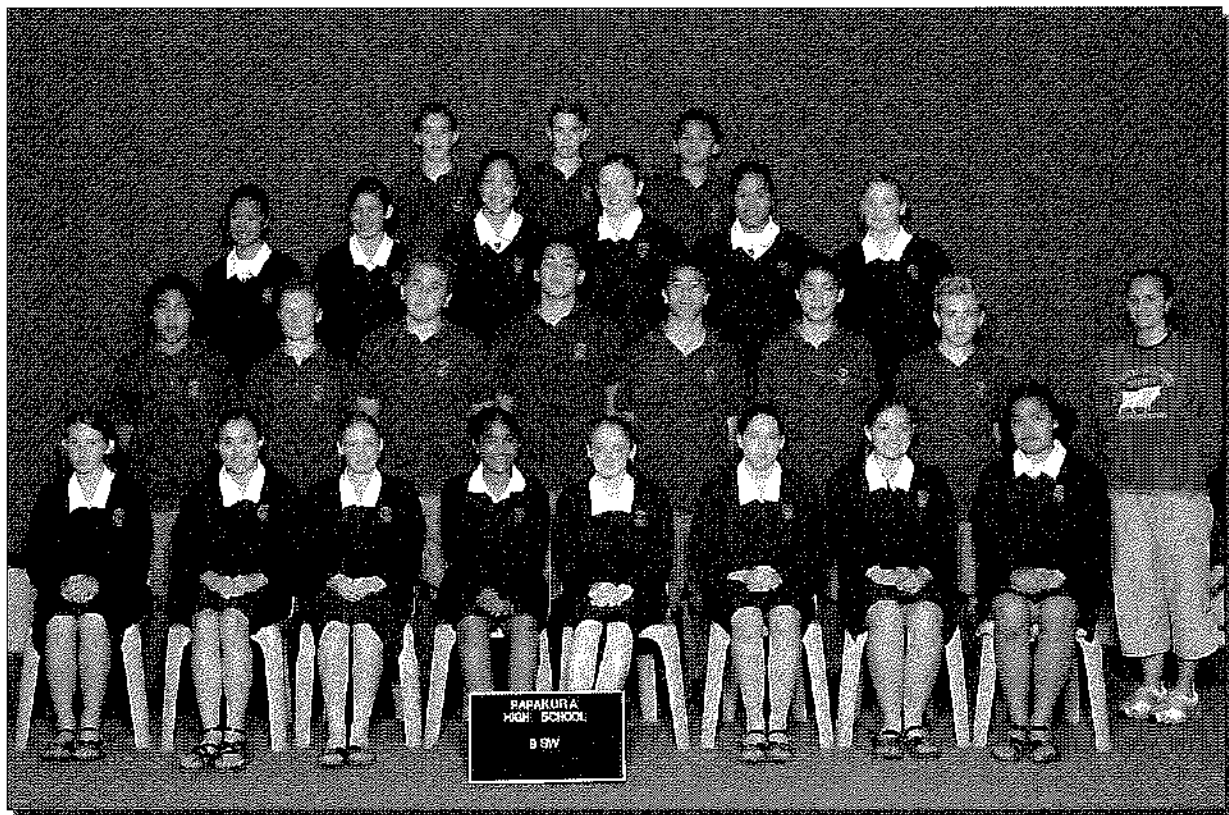
# The Sports Academy

## My Cousin's House

We would run across the fresh cut grass of the park next door, hearing the cries

and laughter of children getting louder as we got closer to the playground. Everyone would run across the bark sending dust hovering in the air as they ran to the flying fox, so they could fly down to the other end of the playground first.

We would take their dog Boswell for walks along the beach and chase him into the surf made up of ice cubes crashing on the golden silky sand, ending up covered from head to paw with sand stuck to his fur.

We went and visited my cousin's house yesterday since we hadn't visited them for a couple of years, I didn't like the sick feeling that I have in my stomach all day.

I ran across the dry dead grass of their backyard to a lonely stump sticking out of the ground at the back of their yard. An axe had killed the oak tree that was full of memories of our beloved tree hut. Only the rusted nails were left scattered over the dead patchy grass that once held up the planks of wood onto the tree.

The wood around the pool was now rotten with holes looming where you least expected it, with darkness living underneath. The pool looked cold and lonely, the water was a deep green which made you wonder if there was anything on

the bottom under the murky water. It was not inviting at all.

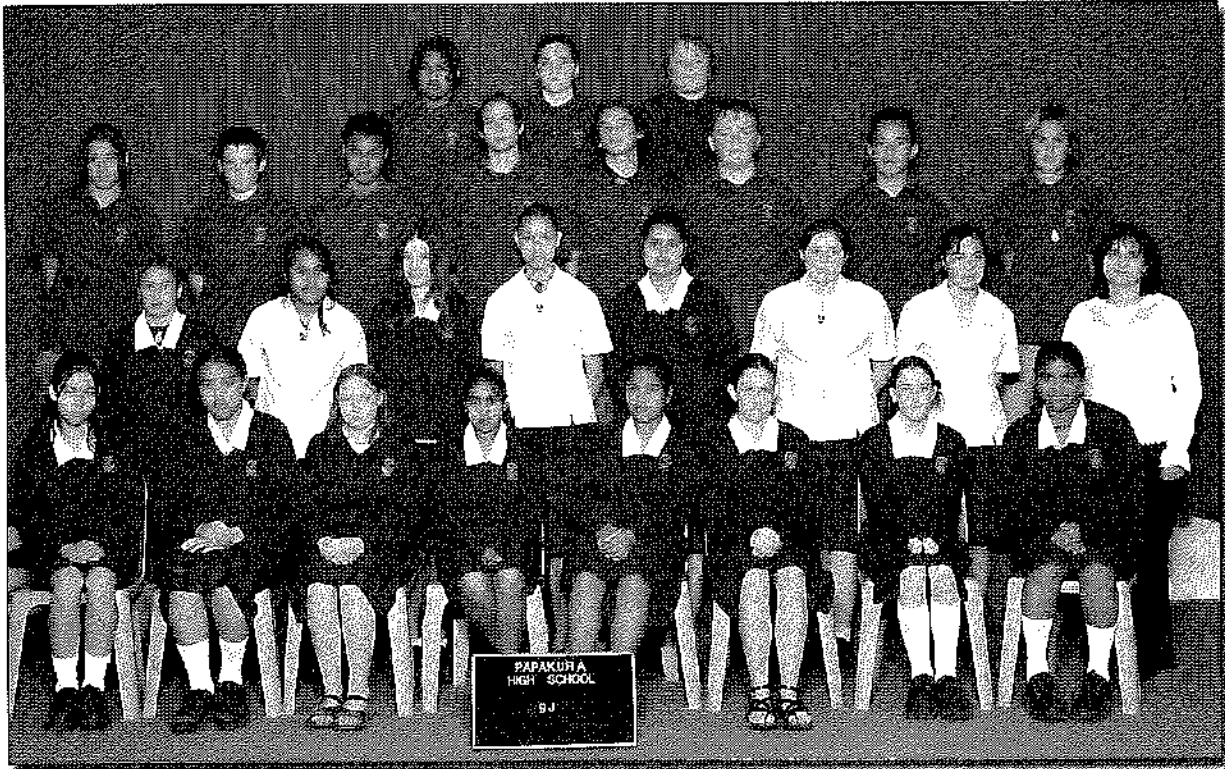
The chairs that we once sat in when we were little, that surrounded the dining table, were no longer small so our feet didn't dangle towards the ground and we could clearly see across the table. The pancakes which we remembered being delicious, tasted like a glue mixture gone wrong, I then started to appreciate my mum's cooking over my Auntie's.

The playground was desolate of life, the flying fox wire had been cut leaving the triangle we used to all sit on and fly down the wire, left dead on the ground. All the paint was chipped off the metal bars and people had tagged all the wood. The colour of the bark had faded and plants were sneaking up towards sunlight in patches.

Boswell, the dog we adored, had died and they have a new dog now. We took their new dog, a little Jack Russell jumping all over the place like a ball out of control down to the beach. No matter how hard we tried it would not go into the water.

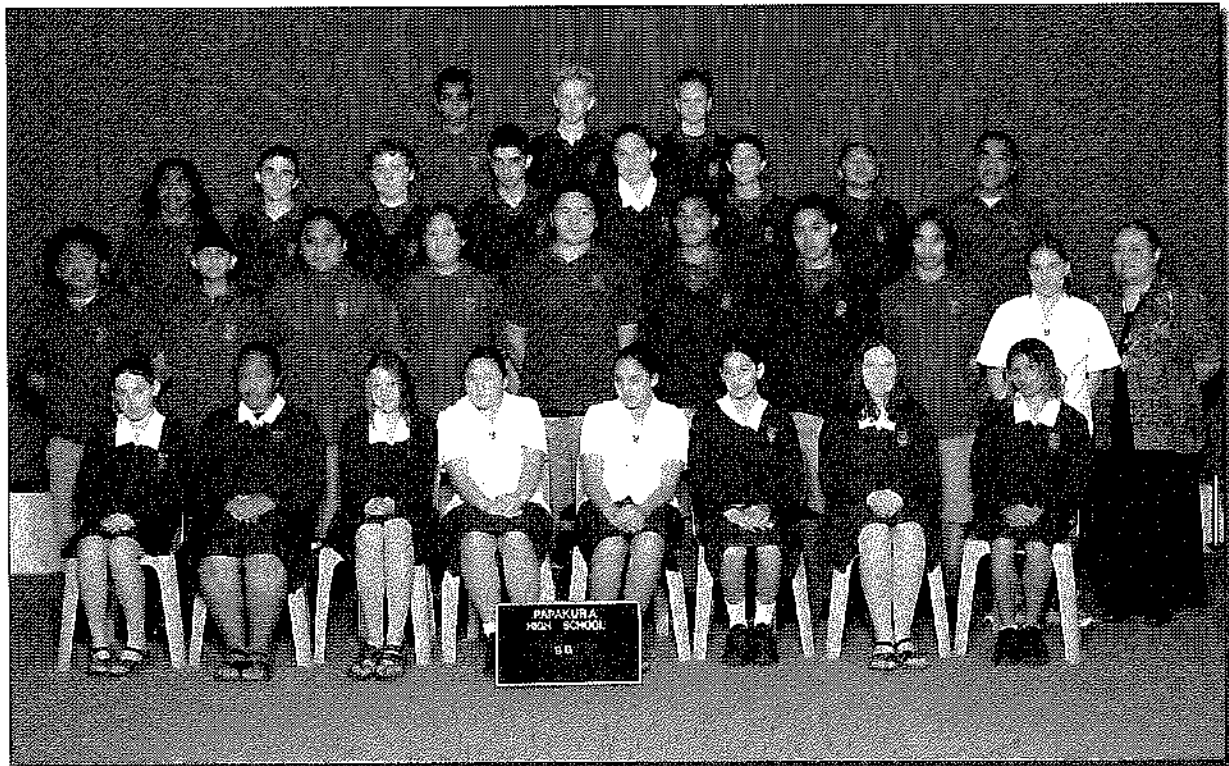
As I sit on the sand dune, I look out to sea remembering the great times I had when I was little and missing then so much.
