Thanks to all the staff and pupils who made this camp a worthwhile experience.




Summing up the Maths Department 2003

Some of her stuff she knows is really amazing!


All out they are really nice people and they have been around a lot longer than us younger generation

Students were served with a delightful buffet dinner at 8 o'clock, which went down well with some of the boys from the 1st XV.


As the music played and the night progressed, it was all leading up to one final special event. The announcement of the King and Belle of the Ball for 2003.

Thank you all for supporting the sports programme. I look forward to 2004.

















Cross Country

Counties Manukau Championships




Another highlight came when the team was placed 2nd in the Special Olympics Basketball Tournament at Unitec. It was a great year. Congratulations to all team members.



Winner of the classic catch award... Hayden Heriwini for a one handed stunner plucked out of thin air like the Puke Pirates lawn bowls win.






Junior A Netball Team














1st XV RUGBY TEAM


Girls 1st XV Rugby.




Junior Girls Touch Team

Already it has been a year since the Prefects were sitting in Senior Prize-giving for 2002, and hearing their names after... "And the Prefects for 2003 are..."



And now a quote from the Prefects, a few words of wisdom that describe the Student Executive for 2003:










7th Form Camp


















The Academic Institute:

Due to the increased number of high quality applicants this year, the Academic Institute was increased to three classes at Year 9. There have also been two classes of Year 10 students in the programme which has allowed for both co-operation and competition between the classes at this level.

Lance King has continued to run the School Success course early in Term One for the Year 9's and their parents. This meant that students were able to identify their own personal learning style and received an excellent introduction on how to handle issues such as time management and revision.

All students in the programme sat Australian Maths, Science and English exams and there were some excellent results this year. 
