

It is a pleasure to look back on the 2004 school year and highlight the key events and successes. During the last three years we have seen the gradual implementation of NCEA Levels 1, 2 and 3. Whilst this has been an enormous workload for teachers and curriculum managers, this new qualification structure has provided some excellent results for students and a real commitment to continual academic achievement.

In particular 10 TX and 10 TY gained excellent passes at Level 1 Geography and the Level 1 results in Art and Music were also very good. Many of our students studying for Level 3 Computing, achieved this qualification early in the school year.

Yet again our Girls Touch Rugby Team are national champions and I applaud the energy and commitment of our Sports Co-ordinator Mrs Rangihuna, who has helped to ensure this ongoing success.

This year one of our students, Chris Rakete has gained a First Foundation Scholarship to be supported throughout university study and employment at a local manufacturer. This is the fifth year running that one of our students has received this award and we are very proud of the recipient. We have just been notified that Charlotte Poletti is also a recipient of the award for 2003, in conjunction with NZ Dairy. Congratulations to both of these fine young adults.

In March the school was proud to reach its 50th year. A very hardworking Jubilee Committee organised a very successful weekend, including a church service, sports events, photos, a formal dinner and a most successful social evening at Ardmore Kennels which more than 1000 exstudents and staff attended.

So many people helped to make the event successful, but special thanks go to Ms Julie Wilson. She was the chair of the committee who were excellent organisers and raised \$16,000 which has been donated to the school to assist with the new Video Conference Centre.

In August the school hosted an Arts Café Evening once again. This year there was an Italian theme and our senior hospitality students provided a delicious meal of minestrone soup, tiramisu and biscotti, not to mention the delicious espresso coffee. The Visual Arts students prepared a backdrop of ancient Rome and the Performing Arts students entertained the audience with dance and drama performances, as well as musical recitals. The XA Speech Contest held in this month was also a great success.

In September we were privileged to host The Great School Connection at our school. This event celebrated 10 years of Telecom's commitment to schools and made use of our recently installed Video Conferencing Nework to link with ten other secondary schools around the country. In addition we linked up with the Beehive and hosted both Doug Howlett and Ben Lummis at school, as their performances were part of this special event.

As we move towards the completion of the school year, I would like to acknowledge the staff, students and trustees of the school who all work so hard to ensure the school's success and high profile. Papakura High continues to be an energetic educational institution which meets the needs of a wide-ranging, diverse community and which encourages the very best from all of its students. I am proud to work with such talented and able educators and special young people.

Since arriving in New Zealand in January this year, I have learned to love this beautiful country. The scenery is stunning and the people are amazingly friendly.



### Lesley Wilson



### Elspeth McGregor



### Emily Shepherd





Mrs Milly James retired from teaching at the end of Term 2 this year.





# SAMOAN CULTURAL GROUP, 2004






# Cook Island Cultural Group

"We onlee giff yoo a hiding, begosh we luff yoo. Yoo undashtand?" And how many times, after getting a hiding, have we, the unlucky new generation of New Zealand-born Samoans, heard that one famous line before. That line, that everyone in your neighbourhood hears evey day, as well as all the swearing that goes along with it?

The Samoan culture. What can you say about it? I mean, everything is so strict. Everything that you learn from your parents, were taught to them by their parents, and the parents before them, and so on. It's really amazing, how long all these customs have been passed down, generation to generation, by word of mouth and nothing of it has changed in any part.

Since the moment we took our first step, to the very first word that we uttered, the family had already sunk their teeth into us. Fore-telling our future and our choice of profession. But we also started learning from early on how to act, how to respect our elders, how to respect each other, to listen and to obey. All these things were taught, all by word of mouth, and the same stories a million times over. "When I was your age, back in the Islands.." on and on it went, and at the end of

every story was always a lesson about life and the consequences of stepping out of line, as well as the pressures of being a Samoan teenager.

The one thing that a lot of the girls and I don't get, is the difference on how we get treated. All the boys in our families get more freedom than we do! Why is it that guys and girls are treated differently in a Samoan family? This question popped into my head one Sunday afternoon, after to'ona'i with the family - the first time in ages that all the guys actually turned up. Growing up with three older brothers and a younger one, I was under a lot of male influence, and being the only girl sux big time! I can also say that there is a whole lot of unfairness going on, when it comes down to the precious discipline.

Discipline; according to the Samoans it is the way to show you love your children. Hard discipline No pain, no gain. No pain and you will do it again. Hard discipline is used to teach respect, to show right from wrong, to support the culture and to show its importance.

If discipline isn't bad enough, then being over-protective is just as bad.

There is never a time when I can walk out of the house.... unaccompanied by one of the annoying gruesome foursome. Volleyball training is at the Otara Rec. and Michael has to take me to training. He not only drops me off, he has to walk me into the gym and arrives 20 minutes early to pick me up, in case I get lost in the carpark, walking from the Rec. to the car.

School finishes at 3:15pm. Jonathan's been waiting since 3:00pm and when I get to the car five minutes after the bell, I get questioned like a suspect on murder trial, and I get lectures that I've already heard about a million times. And not to forget that I was only five minutes late, five minutes late. Now that's overprotection - but in New Zealand, for God's sake. Lighten up.

At the end of the day, that's just the way it is and I'm not saying that it's right, but I'm also not saying that it's wrong. I guess it's the way it just has to be. No matter how much I hate it, life without the discipline and the overprotective parents and brotherswouldn't be the same. Besides, I wouldn't give anything up, because at my house, it's like living in a reality show like "The Osbourne's" and that is definitely a different story.

### International! Overseas Students






# **TENNIS**


# Manukau Swimming Team







All and all I would like to thank our coach, Amos Ale, for believing in us and being the only person who was dedicated to our team.




This year was a successful year. Not only did the girls get on well as a team, but the aim was to have fun and try and improve on our game where and when we could.







Best of luck to all the members of the Junior B Netball Team for the next year. Well done - you should be proud of what you have achieved!



So as far as a coaches' perspective goes, what an awesome team to have been associated with.




# Basketball Under 14 Boys

We had a talented team with some excellent skills and some of the players were dedicated enough to turn up to training every week. The best part though, was getting to know each other and learning how to come together as a team.


Special thanks to Frederick Uiese and Kii for all the time you put into the team. Through your dedication we have learnt a lot and have gained more experience in a game that we all love to play.



Following is a shortened report from the committee's secretary.






### The Great School Connection
