The evening also






Mr Braunton's 'slug' dance raised a few eyebrows, matched only by Mr Jardine's Irish Jigdancing.

The Year 10 Art option was so popular, that another class was created and our senior classes have been working studiously on completing excellent art work for their NCEA in areas.




The repertoire has been a mixture of light classical and traditional tunes and it is hoped that more students will be joining in the future!!!

The Dance Department has been moving and grooving along. Year 11 Dance have been improving steadily. They performed a twist on the Café Evening with a "Night at the Café".


Year 12 Dance starred at the Jubilee with "Dance Crazes" - a look at dance in the past 50 years and performed a capoeira choreography at the Café Evening.


The culmination of the Dance students' efforts was witnessed at "Momentum",








### MENINGOCOCCAL IMMUNISATION

Although the weather was disappointing, the students enjoyed the camp and the camaraderie between them was awesome.




