PRINCIPAL'S ADDRESS

This year saw the celebration of the school's fortieth anniversary which provided an opportunity to reflect on the many accomplishments of our school community. Throughout the Jubilee weekend it was exciting to witness the large numbers of former pupils, staff and Board members sharing in the many fond memories that Papakura High School had provided. Certainly the organising committee can be congratulated for their outstanding efforts in providing an excellent programme which attracted people from throughout New Zealand and overseas.

It is clearly evident that during the last four decades our school has continued to build on the very sound principles and philosophies laid by the foundation Principal, Mr Arch Campbell. It is my belief that Papakura High School continues to grow and to develop an environment conducive to a strong well-balanced education suited to the changing needs of our community.

The curriculum offered to students this year was a consolidation of the initiatives made in 1993 based on the seven essential learning areas identified in the new National Curriculum framework. In Mathematics and Science there has already been extensive staff professional development in preparing teachers for new curriculum directions. English and other subjects will steadily come on stream over the next few years. By early next year our aim is that Papakura High School will be an "accredited" provider. It will be fascinating to see the changes that will occur within senior school programmes. Students will have the opportunity to do conventional and "non-conventional" (vocation based) courses under the National Certificate framework and the old demarcations between institutions will become blurred in the so-called "seamless" system.

As a result of our involvement last year with a Ministry of Education contract exploring ways to promote student achievement, this year we have picked up on a variety of strategies to assist our students. For example the introduction of free Homework Diaries each term, the employment of a Community Aid Officer, the development of an "Enhance" programme, the extension of the hours of the School Library, have all helped to focus on better student performance.

The Board of Trustees have been very supportive in new initiatives and this year we have been able to expand and develop existing facilities. A new business centre housing 12 "486" computers was established in the Commerce Department. A brand new Transition suite was provided, catering for a wide variety of needs. School/Industry links, Link courses, specialised guidance and student training programmes are facilitated in this new attractive setting. Recently an extension to our XA Unit

catering for an additional 9 students with special needs has been completed. This means that we can now cater for approximately 48 students with special needs, many of whom are mainstreamed where possible. Looking ahead to 1995, plans are already underway for the conversion and extension of the existing Audio-Visual Theatre to a Performing Arts/Drama Suite. In addition it is hoped that a new computer suite with an additional 31 "486" computers will be in place. This will mean that there will be over 140 computers housed in the school, offering a wide range of software packages for use in a variety of curriculum areas.

An "enrolment scheme" was also adopted by the Board of Trustees and Îratified by the Ministry of Education the year. This safeguards the school from a risk of overcrowding. With an increasing retention rate in the senior school and numbers of Form 3 enrolments for next year indicating positive demand, the school looks well placed. As I write this foreword the Education Review Office has just completed an "Assurance Audit" and very favourable and pleasing comments were made on the direction and progress of our school.

Students continue to excel in academic, sporting and cultural pursuits. Once again this magazine reflects a large sample of the many achievements of individuals and groups. One of the strengths of our school is the large range of activities that staff willingly offer and it is pleasing to see a significant number of students responding to these opportunities. Having visited a number of schools overseas this year I could not help but think how fortunate we are to live in New Zealand and send our children to our schools.

Finally, I wish to thank all members of our school community, staff, parents and students, for their efforts and support this year.

My best wishes extend to those who are leaving and may you all enjoy some peace and relaxation over the holiday period.

REPORT FROM THE CHAIRPERSON

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The 1994 teaching year draws to a close. Us"oldies" wonder where the months disappeared to - you young people probably feel that the Christmas holidays can't come soon enough.

As a slight break in tradition there have been a few changes in Board personnel over the past year. Unfortunately, work commitments led to the resignation of our Works Committee chairman, Kevin Hanley. His position as an elected parent representative was filled by previously co-opted member, Winifred Guy. Two further co-options- of John Taylor and Ron Arnet - were made in June. The student representative for 1993, Katriona Holehan-Duncan, was farewelled by the Board at it's April Meeting. Katriona was certainly one of the most effective student representatives that we have had on the Board. She served the Board well, acting as a liaison between it and you, her fellow pupils. Sadly, this year's elected student representative, Vesta-Anne Gribben, left school during the year, so did not complete her term.

Earlier in the year the Board farewelled Mr Robinson and Mr Davis - two long-serving members of the Science Department staff. Mr Robinson took early retirement, because of ill health, and it was very pleasing to see him back for the Colenso Society Annual Dinner, looking very much better. We made the appointments of Head of Science (Mr Francis, who comes to us from Colenso College in Napier) and Assistant Head of English (Ms Smith, from Pukekohe High School).

With respect to Works, achievements for 1994 include the recent opening of the new XA Unit, the upgrade of the C Wing Science laboratories, the conversion of the Old Pavilion to a Transition Room, the partitioning off of the

Community Education Office in the library and the modification of the Senior Common Room to provide a quiet study facility for the seniors. We were delighted at the recent news that our application to the Ministry for a Grant in the Financial Assistance Scheme to set up a Drama Suite has been successful, and work on this will go ahead over the holiday period. The Board very gratefully acknowledges the magnificent contribution of \$11,000 from the Past Pupils' Association. These funds, resulting from the extremely successful 40th Jubilee celebrations, will go towards this major project, for which we have been awarded over \$70,000.

The School has recently had a visit from the Education Review Office, members of which undertook an Assurance Audit to ensure that the Board was meeting its requirements about its management of Administration, Curriculum, Student Support, Maori Education, Personnel, Finance, Assets and Attached Units. The report from this team was very positive. For this, I am very appreciative of the hard work put in by all staff, both teaching and support, the Senior Management team (Messrs. Brewin and Gall, Mrs Appleby and Miss Smytheman) and my fellow Board members.

My congratulations to one and all for a good year. Prizegiving has highlighted the outstanding successes of students in all fields of endeavour. Best wishes go to those students and staff who are leaving. May you be successful in your future years and make the most of all the opportunities that were provided for you here at Papakura High School.

Hi, I'm Prissy Kamarga and I arrived here from Bandung in Indonesia in January to spend a year in New Zealand as an AFS student. I'm pleased I came to Papakura High. Highlights have been being in Man of La Mancha, maori club,art(a new experience), cooking and many other things.

My school in Bandung is very different-it's much smaller, about 300 between 15 and 18. We have thirteen different subjects, mostly academic, nothing practical like cooking or art. 
Lunchtime club meetings and Wednesday afternoons were well attended with up to forty students meeting in the new pavilion.



In 1993 there were 30 fourth form music students, 15 School Cert. Music students, 5 sixth form students and suddenly in 1994 140 fourth form music students, 33 School Cert. students and 3 bursary students, plus all the other extra curricular music programmes that have developed.

The Music department is now stretched to the limit to accommodate the influx of music students and the Board of Trustees has provided extra percussion equipment, several keyboards and a computer system to assist the expansion of the programme.



SPORTS CO-ORDINATOR'S REPORT

1994 has seen continued growth in participation in sport at Papakura High School.

Summer kicked off with early success to our mixed dragon boat team who were second in the Auckland Secondary Schools Championship.(same as 1993!)

Large numbers of students both boys and girls showed interest in cricket so a Friday night interhouse competition was run over 8 weeks with the Freyberg boys being the evential winner. Two girls teams were entered into the Saturday Auckland Schools Competition, and the 1st xi did extremely well to win it.

Tennis again fielded 6 teams in all age divisions and was well represented at all the major interschool tournaments. Softball fielded Junior boys and girls teams, both placing highly in their sections. Senior girls Volley ball was again represented at the counties competition.

Winter sport saw a record number of boys wanting to play rugby with 7 teams being fielded on Saturday. Motivation and commitment was much improved this season with all grades still going strong at the end. It was disappointing that so many other counties schools did not field teams or ended up withdrawing them during the season.

Girls Hockey again fielded 2 teams, with the 1st team once more winning their competition. The boys team is rebuilding with young players and a new enthusiastic coach.

Netball was back up to 6 teams and under Miss Bree's dynamic leadership results improved dramatically on last year. Girls soccer fielded 2 strong teams with the 1st xi coming out top in counties for the season. Boys soccer also fielded two teams with the junior team enjoying more success than the senior, which shows promise for next year.

The Fencing club continued to produce champion competitors with Gwyn Lewis being the outstanding performer for the year.

The gymnastics team although weakened by the loss of Fiona Pulman continued to represent the school with distinction at competitions for Tumbling, trampolining and Gymnastics.

Badmington and squash were both involved in local competitions and our growing squad of junior multisports continued their success by bringing home the national junior duathlon title for the second year running.

A wrestling team represented the school for the first

time and won a number of medals. A small group of girls made it to the national aerobics champs and a rather social group of senior lawn bowlers once more won the counties title.

Our strong special Olympics team continued to win medals and represent the school with distinction throughout the year, and after a year in recess, boys basketball was once again active in both the junior and senior boys competitions.

ÎTerm 3 has seen a host of summer sports teams up and running again. These include boys Touch, Junior Girls and Boys Softball, Tennis at all levels, two Girls Cricket teams and two boys cricket teams, and junior girls volleyball.

The students of the school have shown that given the opportunities they do wish to be involved in sport. The school is also fortunate that it has so many staff prepared to give up their time to coach and manage so many teams. With the continued support of the Board and the Principal, and with the obvious benefits of our full time sports coordinator Mr Adrian Fisher, the growth and success of sport at Papakura High School will undoubtedly continue, as will the many benefits that this brings to the pupils and to the school.
