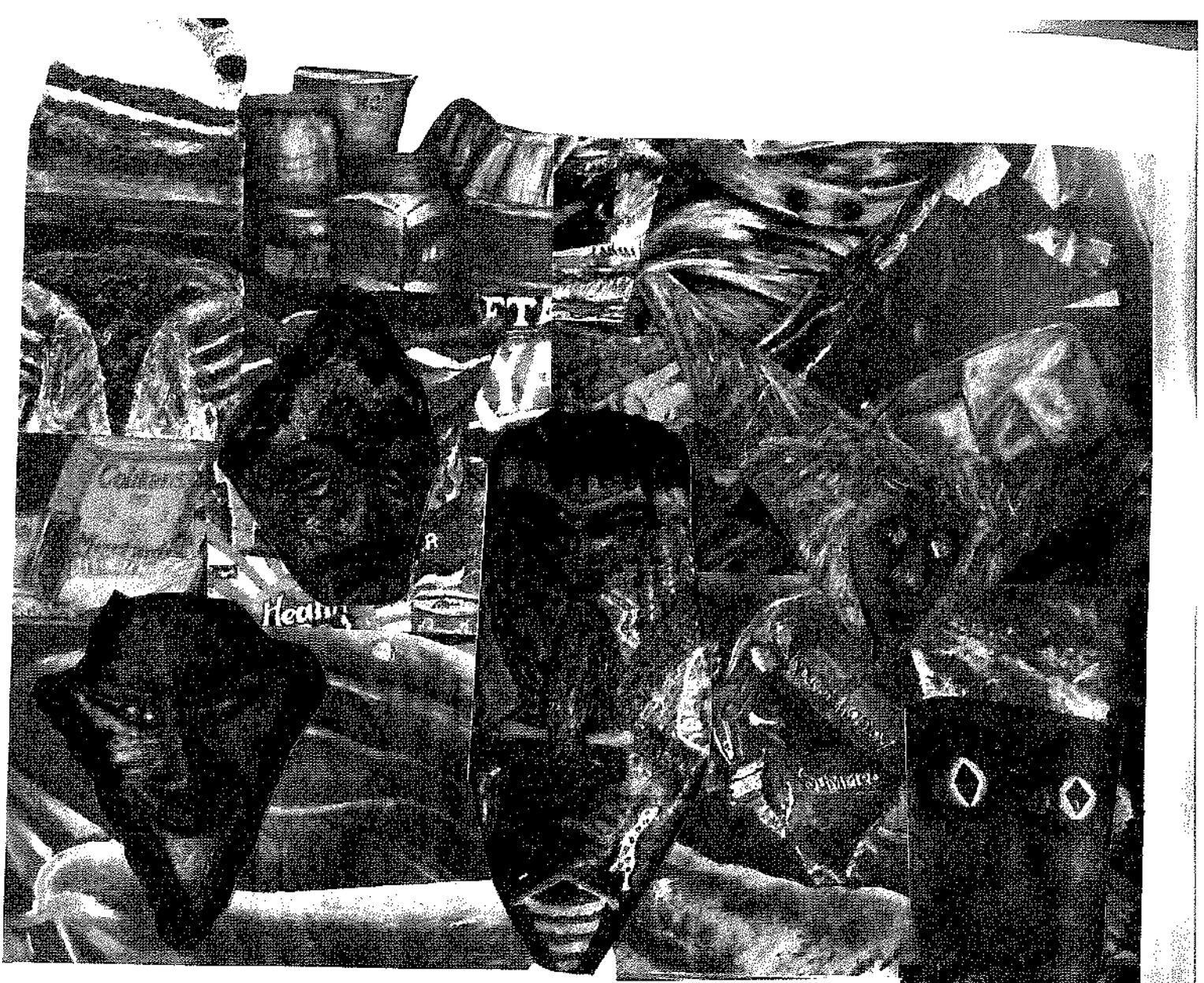

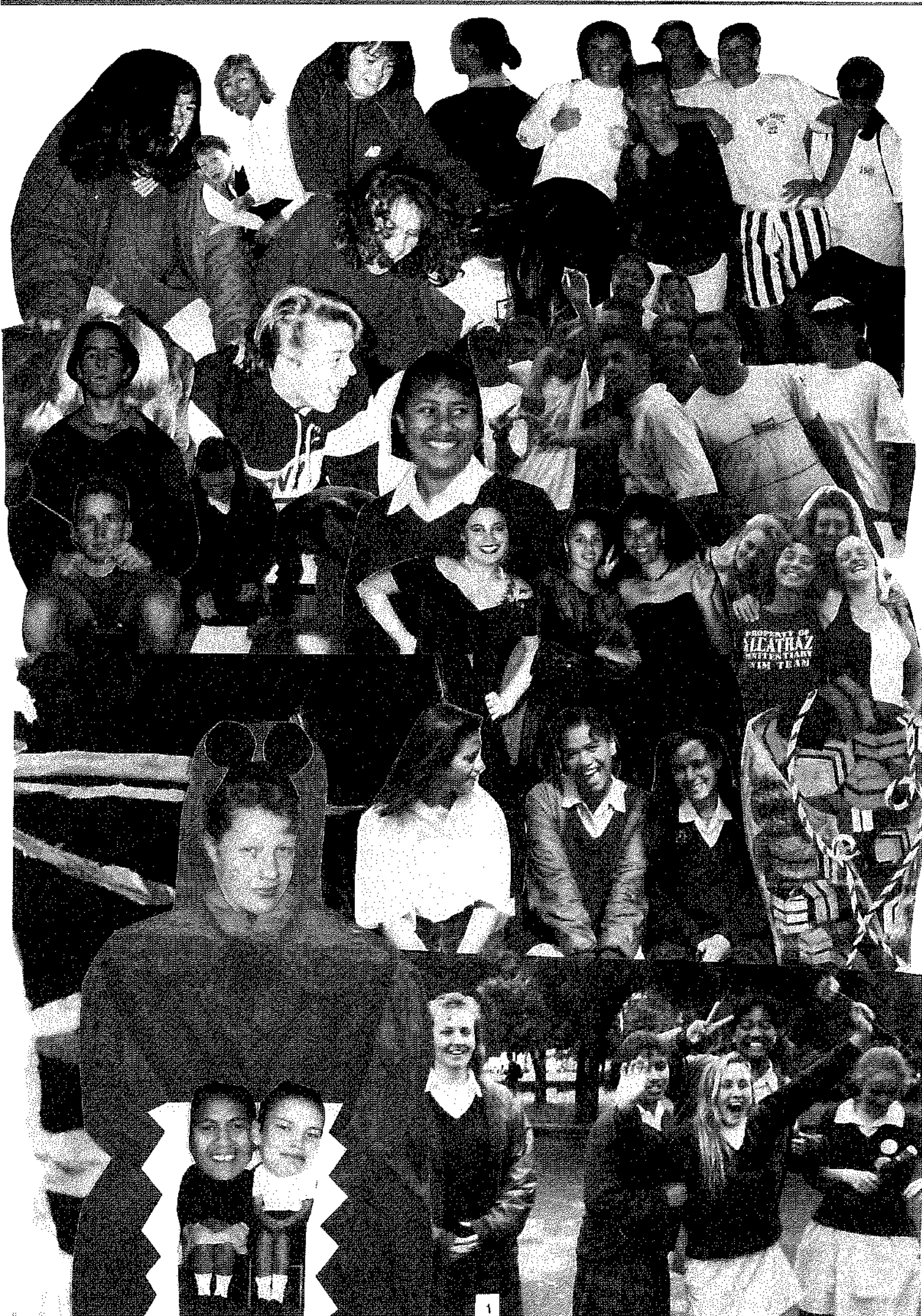

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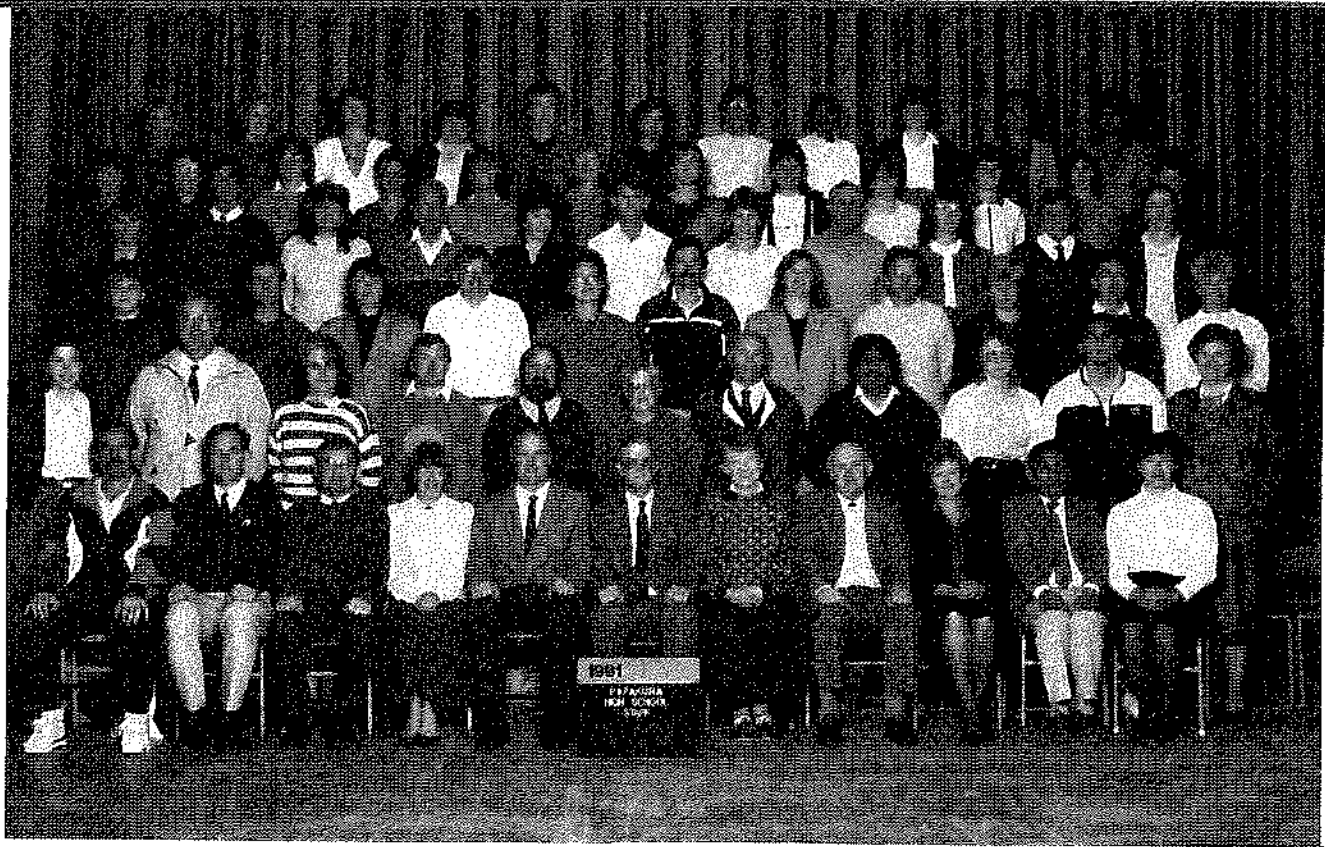

PRINCIPAL'S ADDRESS

Educational standards in New Zealand schools take a regular bashing by parents, employers, politicians, professors, the media and in anecdotal letters in newspapers and magazines. The cry goes up that pupils cannot write, spell or calculate as well as they used to, that students in other countries do better and that there should be a return to the basics - reading, writing and arithmetic. A research report by Professor W.B. Elley, Professor of Education of the University of Canterbury indicates otherwise.

By international standards New Zealand secondary school performance levels in basic subjects are very high indeed. Age for age New Zealand students are highly literate and very competent. In reading comprehension and literature no country showed better performance levels. New Zealand's top Form Seven students can hold their own in all subjects with the brightest students in any other country.

In the external examinations Papakura High School students achieved excellent results in both the School Certificate and Bursary Examinations. In the internally assessed Sixth Form Certificate the work is of a very high standard.

It is worth noting too that the schools first year students at University succeed well above the average and there is a steady stream of former students graduating from the various Universities and Polytechnics, many with distinction. This is really a reflection of the excellent grounding they have received from the staff at this school.

A very significant event in the 1991 school year was the rededication and formal opening of the school's Wharehui, "Te Kahwangi". It marked the culmination of a lot of work done by staff, pupils, parents and other members of the community. I am confident the Wharehui will be a terrific asset and a focal point for all the students. Without a doubt the Wharehui is one of the first, if not the finest Wharehui located at any secondary school in New Zealand.

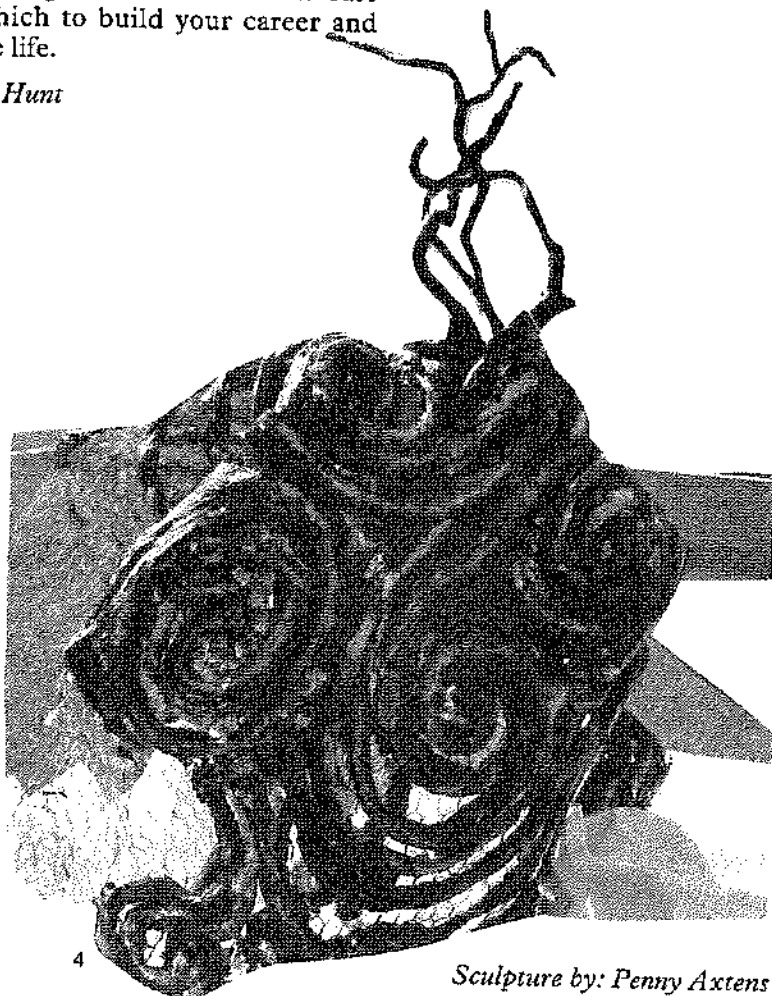
As usual the attitude of the bulk of

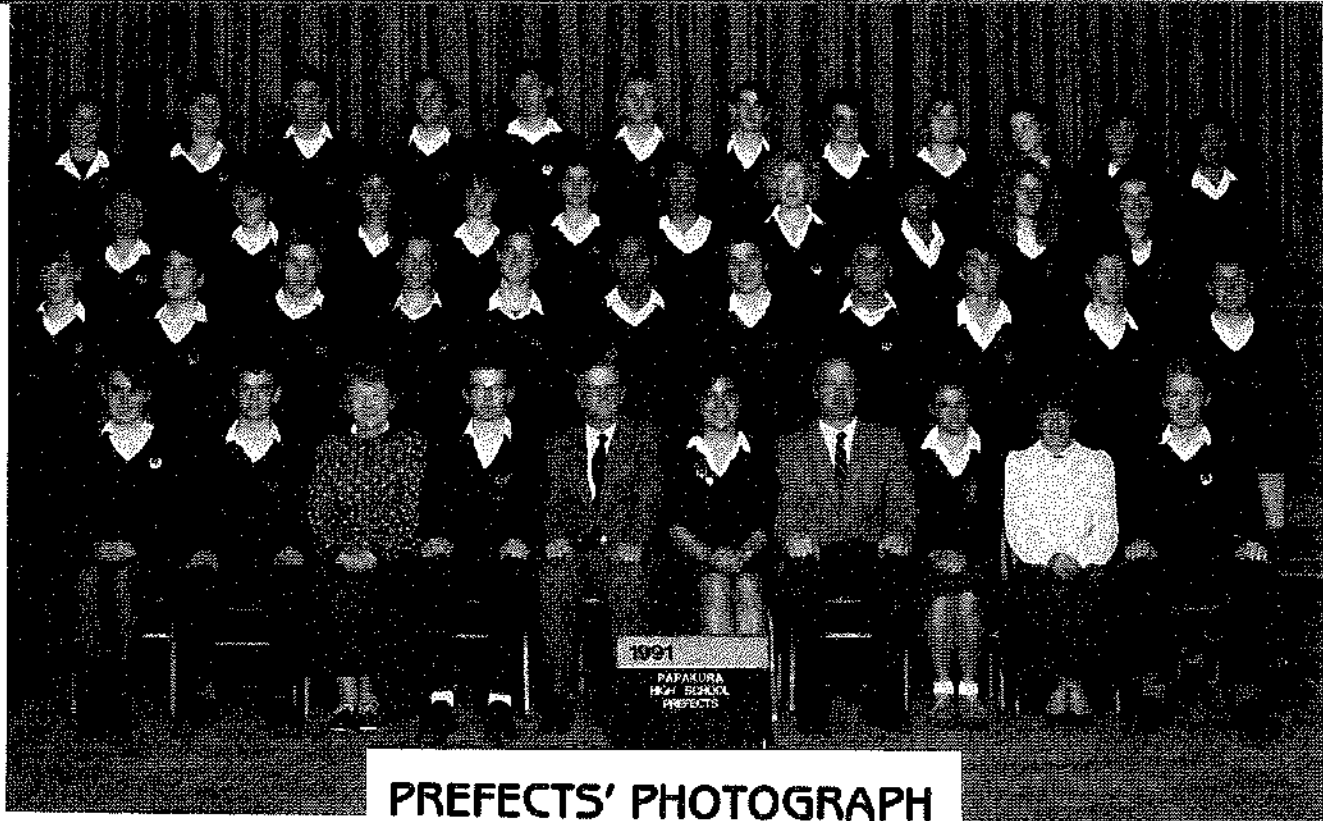

It has been a pleasure to have taught at this school and to have been associated with both the teaching staff and pupils. I will miss them all very much.

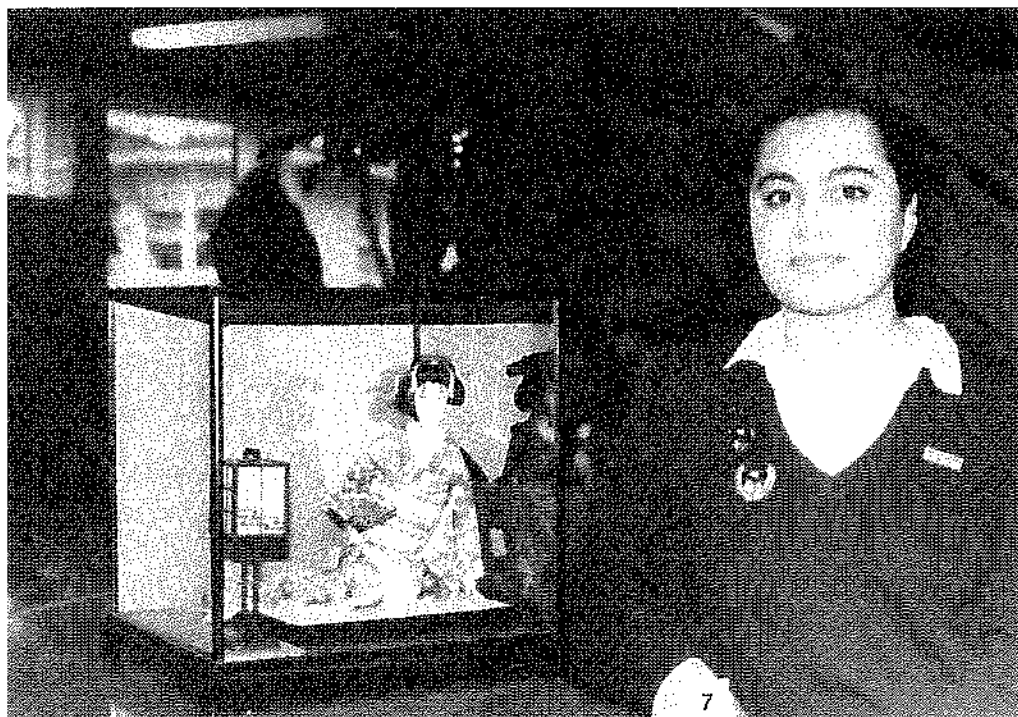
I have always tried to give words of encouragement, understanding and kindness to pupils where necessary.

The essay competition was given few outlines, but generally it was to be written about why a language was

chosen to be learnt by the student, what they planned to get out of the language and its use in today's society.

I believe learning a language is very important, because until you do, you don't realise the extreme narrowness of knowing only one tongue. Language knowledge really helps you to appreciate your own language, and you begin to realise the thousands of different forms of language structure. Knowing how to speak a foreign language is invaluable when travelling, because you also begin to understand the customs and significance of it in that country, like all the many languages that can make up one spoken tongue today. Today's trade and tourism is very important, especially to New

Zealand, therefore Japanese, Arabic and Pacific Island dialects are languages we, and future generations must have the ability to speak fluently, to maintain our trade ties.

Helen Kerr also received a prize for her entry in the competition. 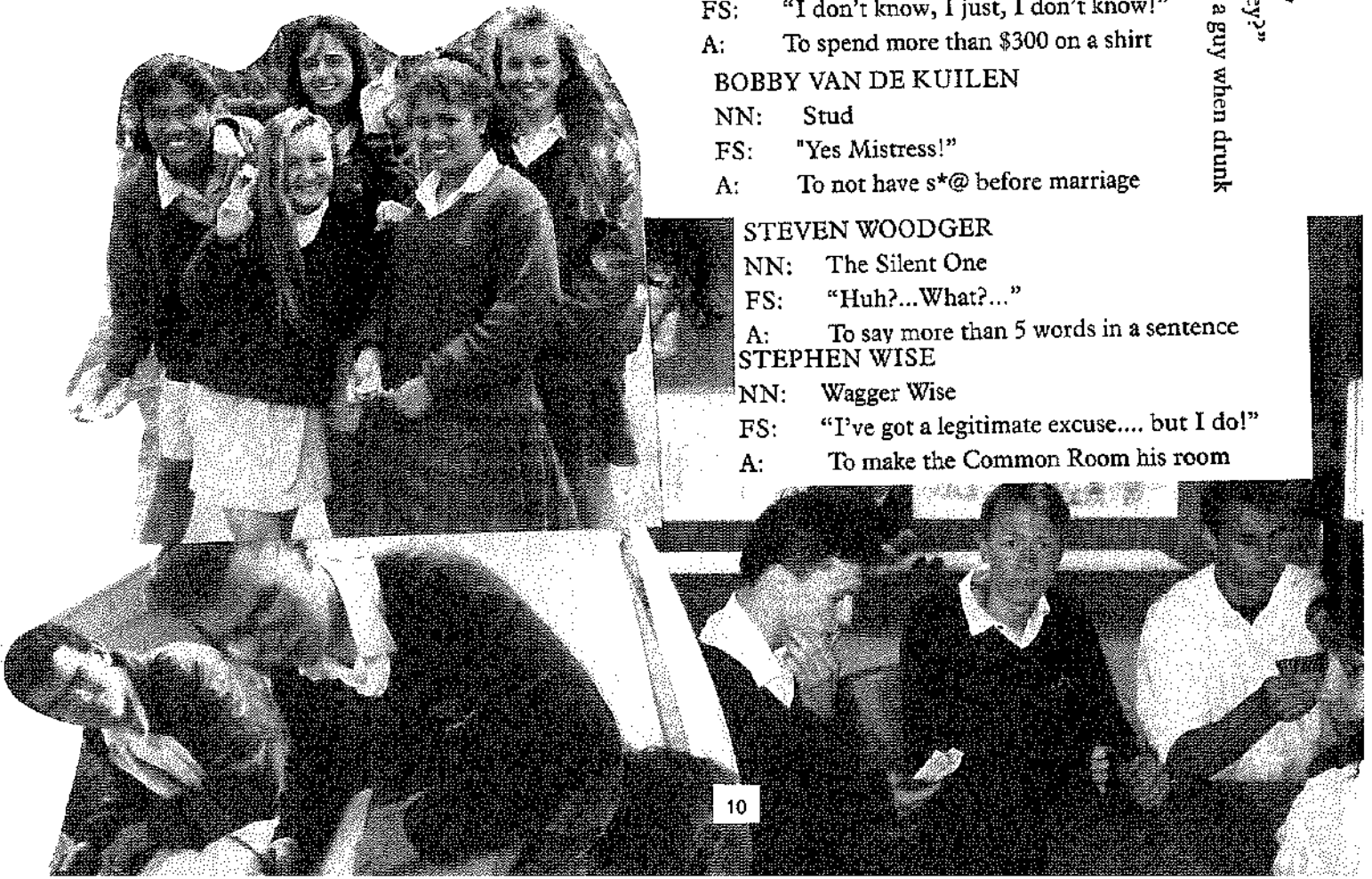

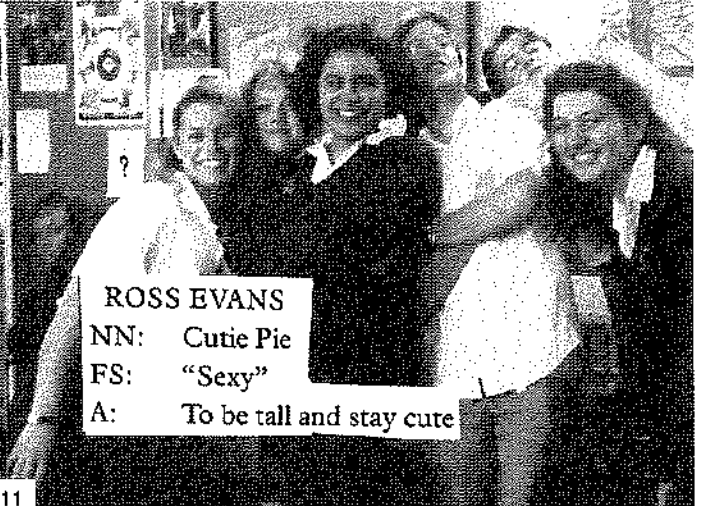

The Wharehui was officially built about 15 years ago, and was opened on the 17 March 1979, at about the same time as the official opening of the Neville Thornton Library.

WHARE HUI

No-one can remember whose idea it was to build a school Wharehui as it was here before Mr Sadler came to our school and before Mr Hunt was principal. It represents a part of Aotearoa heritage and background, bringing the two cultures together as one within our school. It was through Mrs Margaret Williams, a previous teacher of Maori, that the Wharehui idea was established.

With a definite go-ahead for the building to begin, more problems arose. Where was the Wharehui to be built? The traditional Maori entrance and greetings are made at the back of the pa, but in European culture they are made at the front door. As the Maori prefabs were situated at the back of the school this is where our Wharehui was built, to keep the cultural buildings together.

Once the actual building was erected it was decided that Henare Mahanga would be in charge of organising and completing the preparation of the carvings and tukutuku panels for the ceremonial decorations.

The Maihi was cut from a specially selected tree and was well on its way to being completed when the school ran out of funds to support the labour costs. A Senior Common Room was to be built, so Henare Mahanga abandoned the project

Four years later in 1987 the Wharehui was relocated to the front of the school. Society and Ideas had changed and people came to the front entrance of the school first, so this was where our Wharehui was to be located.

Aronui, from the Papakura Marae, set up an access course and agreed to finish the carvings and tukutuku panels, but were reluctant to finish the Maihi as it was already cut.

On our Wharehui, the Maihi represent the legend of Tanenui-arangi and how he travels into the heavens from earth to receive the three baskets of knowledge from Io Matua Kore. (The Supreme Being) This legend is appropriate to our school as it symbolises the need to learn and acquire knowledge for future life.

As a gift to the school from the 1990 prefects the stained glass windows now adorn our school Wharehui, incorporating the image of a church, but more to the point, making it look nice, adding a personal touch.

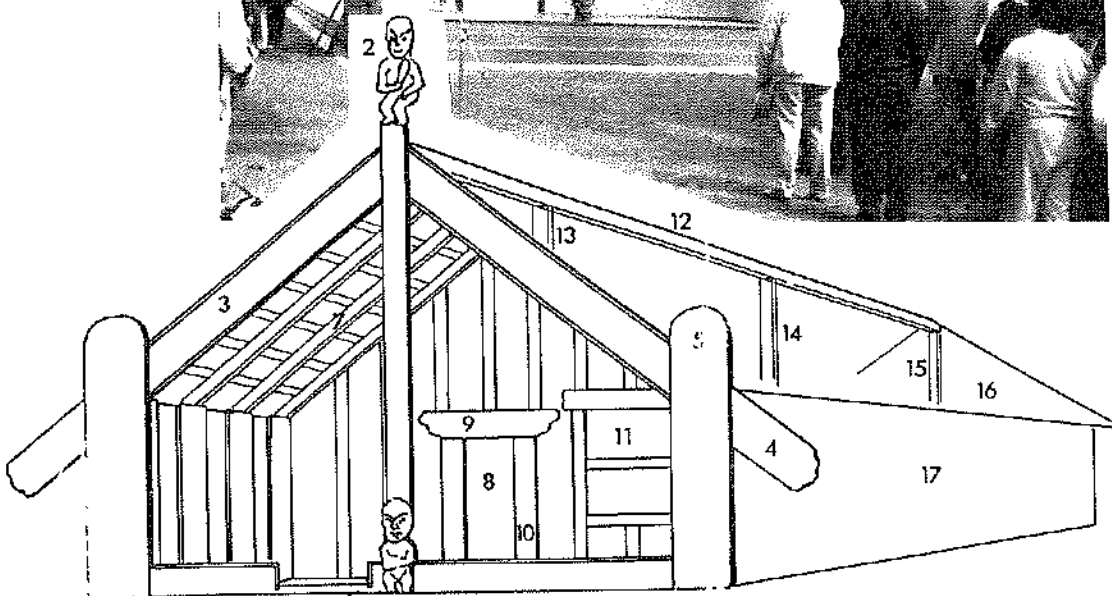
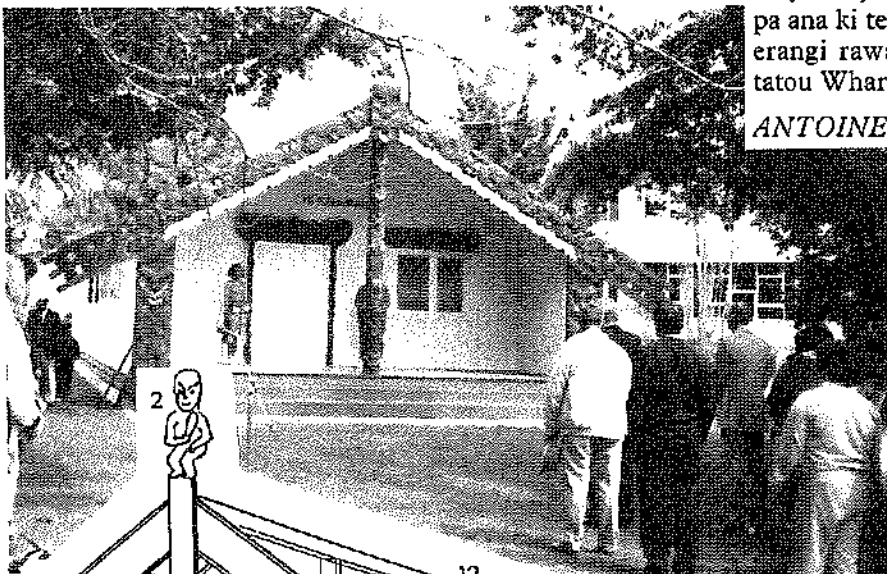
With the Wharehui completed, the traditional, full ceremonial opening was held on the 5 October 1991. Mr Rua Cooper of the Tainui Tribe King Movement, conducted most of the formalities. There was a good turnout of people, and the occasion was a great success.

In the near future, it is hoped that a few other additions will be made to our Wharehui, to offer the best of manaakitanga we can.. For instance a dining room, to cater for manuhiri, and some keketua (latrine) blocks, with a surrounding punga fence to enclose the whole Marae.

The Wharehui is a great addition to our school. It makes us more aware of the fact that we are a multi-cultural society, in which we all co-operate with no trouble at all. Think of the problems our ancestors had all those years ago! Thank you to all students and staff who have helped with the Marae, It may have taken a while but look what we have to show for it.

Unaware of the strength of this team a cool headed, masterful coach began to tune this team into 'a mean green machine.'

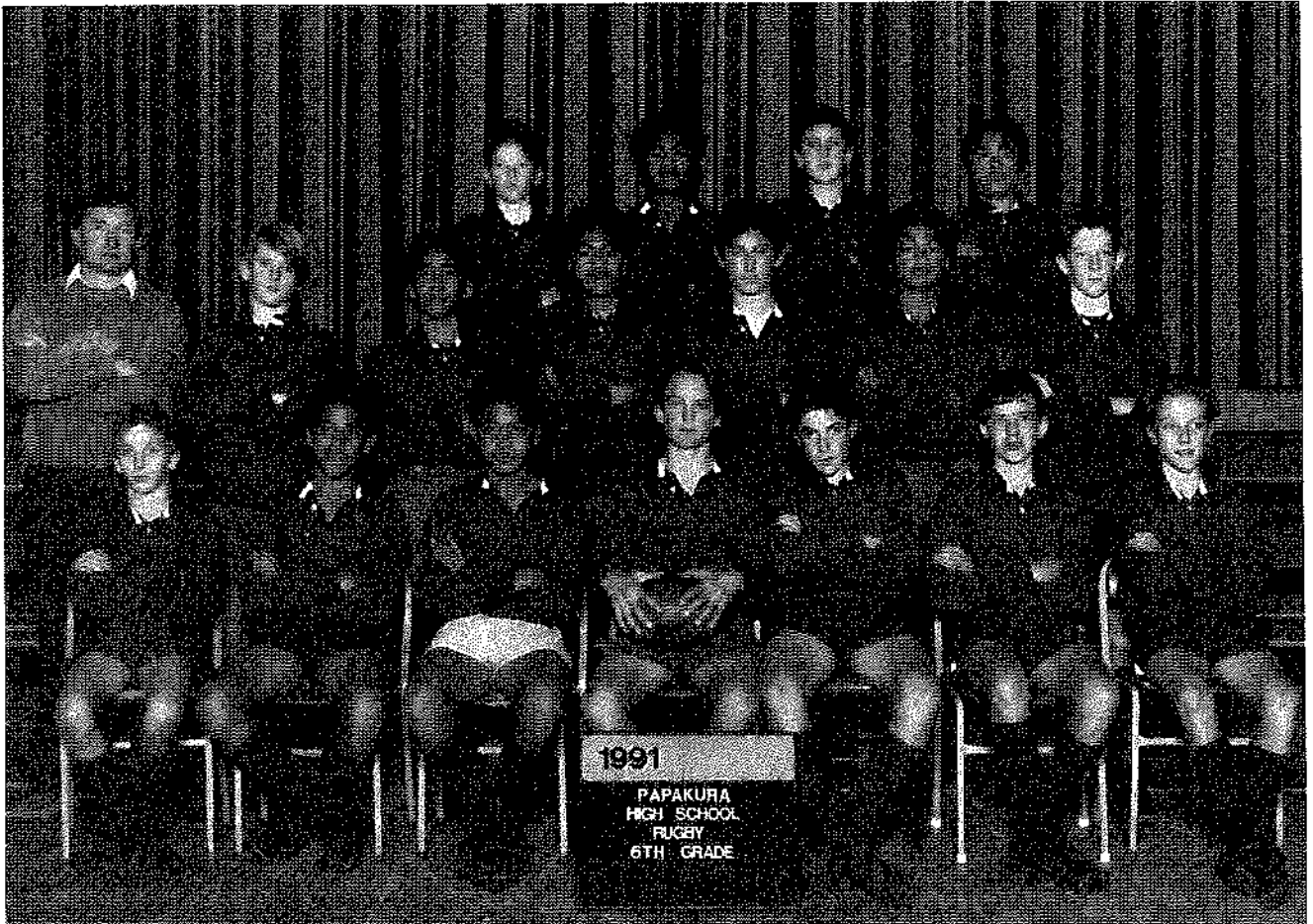

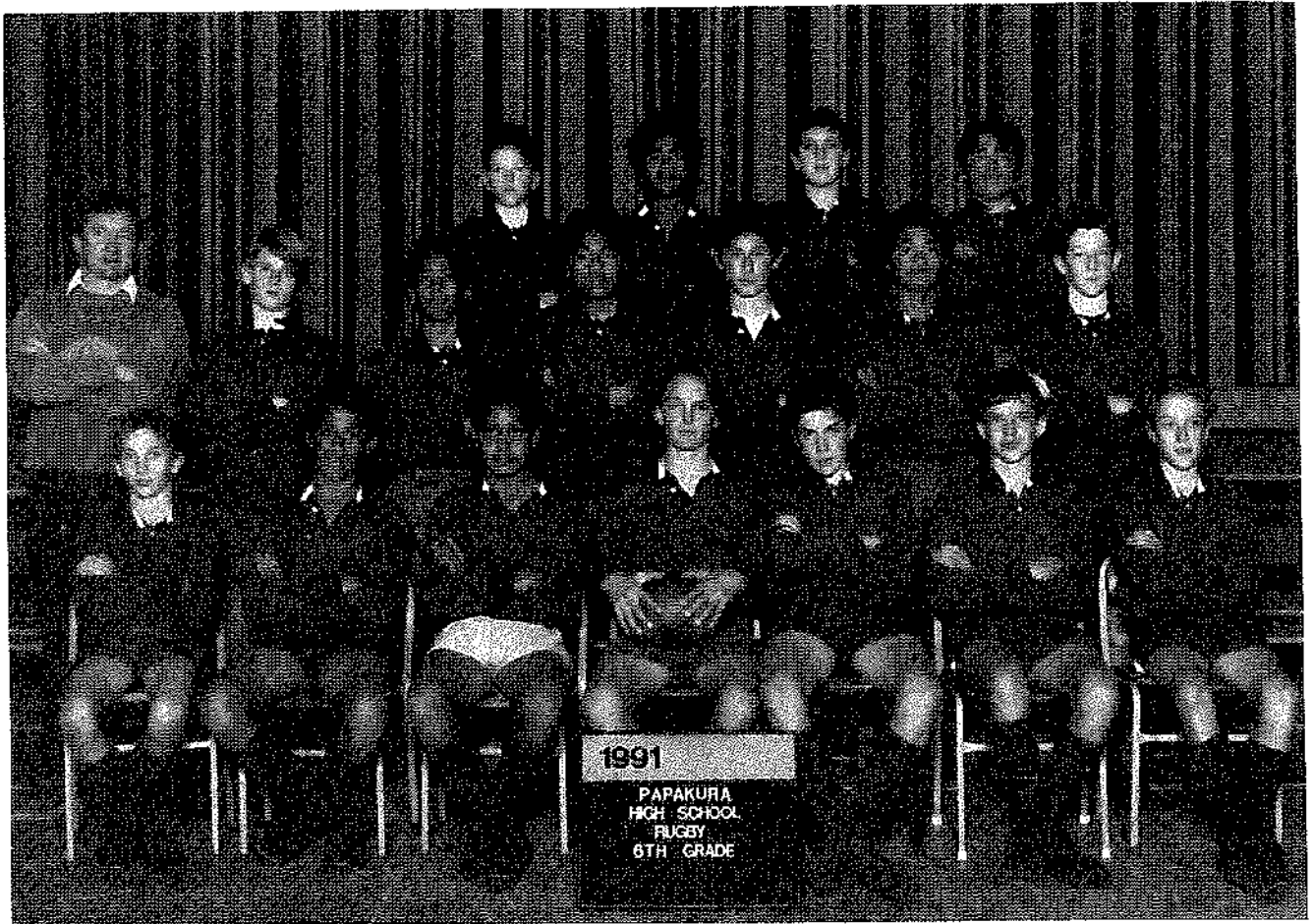

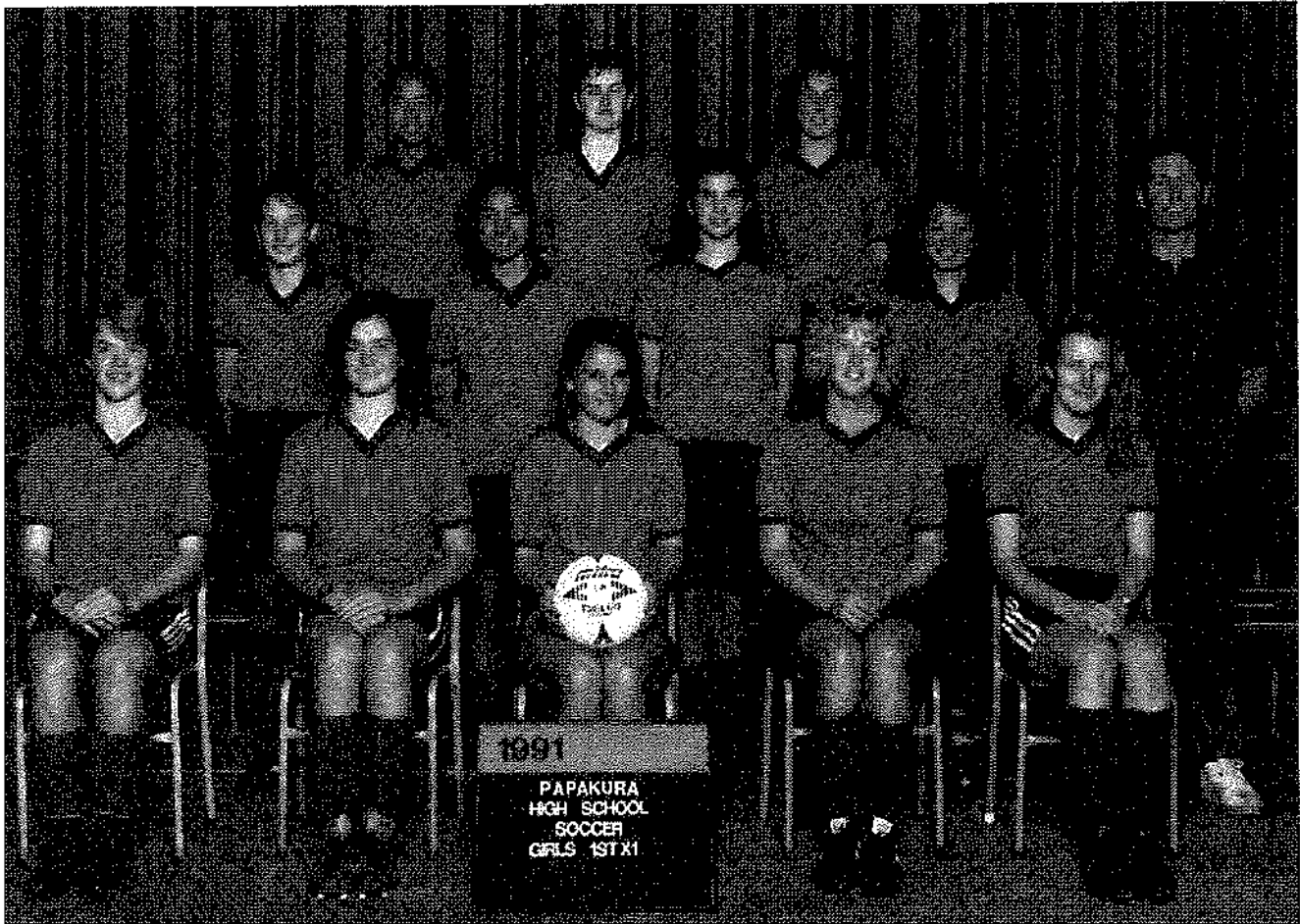
1st XI BOYS SOCCER 1991

The team, I'm sure, are grateful for all his time coaching the 1991 Senior Boys Basketball.



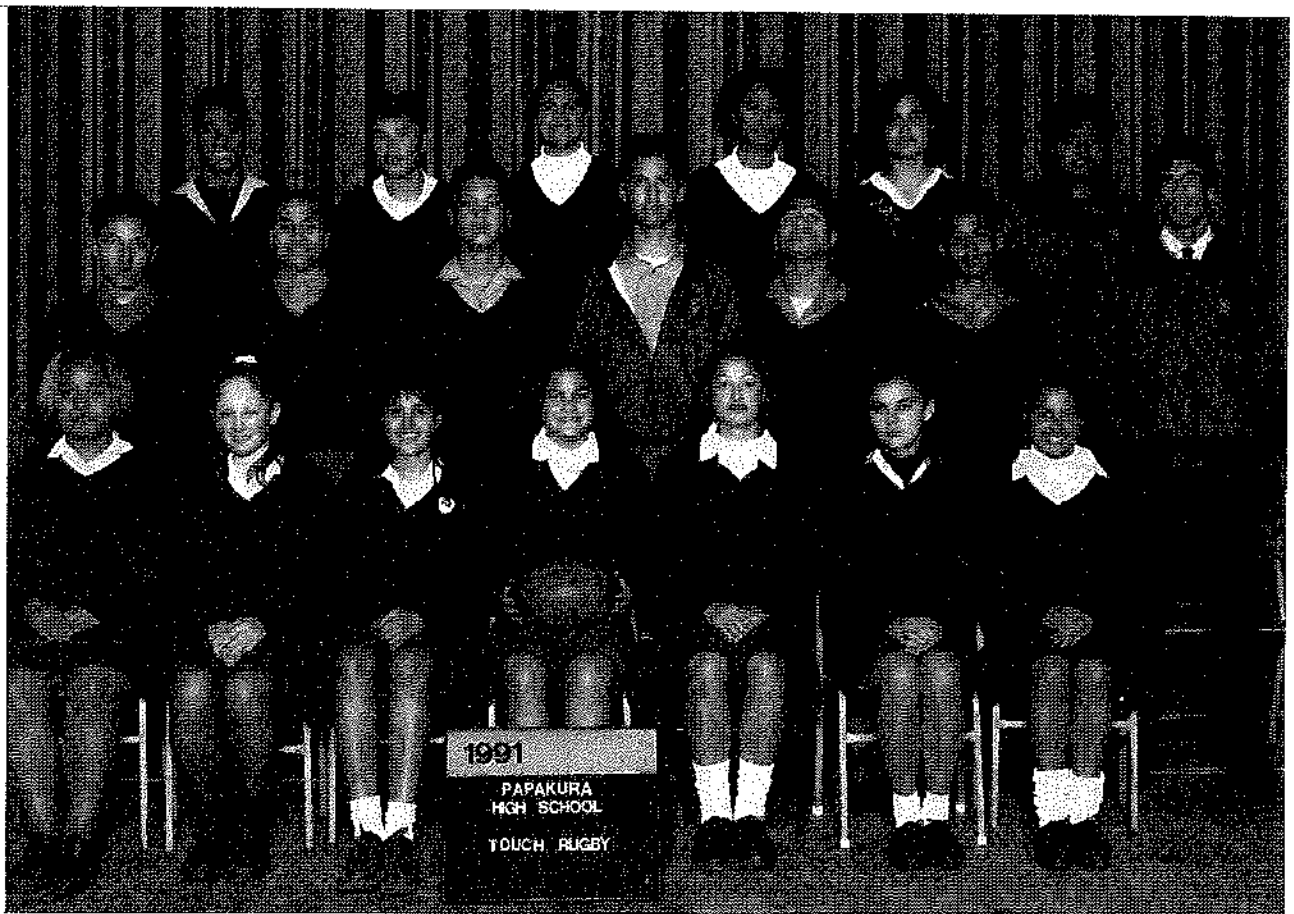
SENIOR GIRLS BASKETBALL

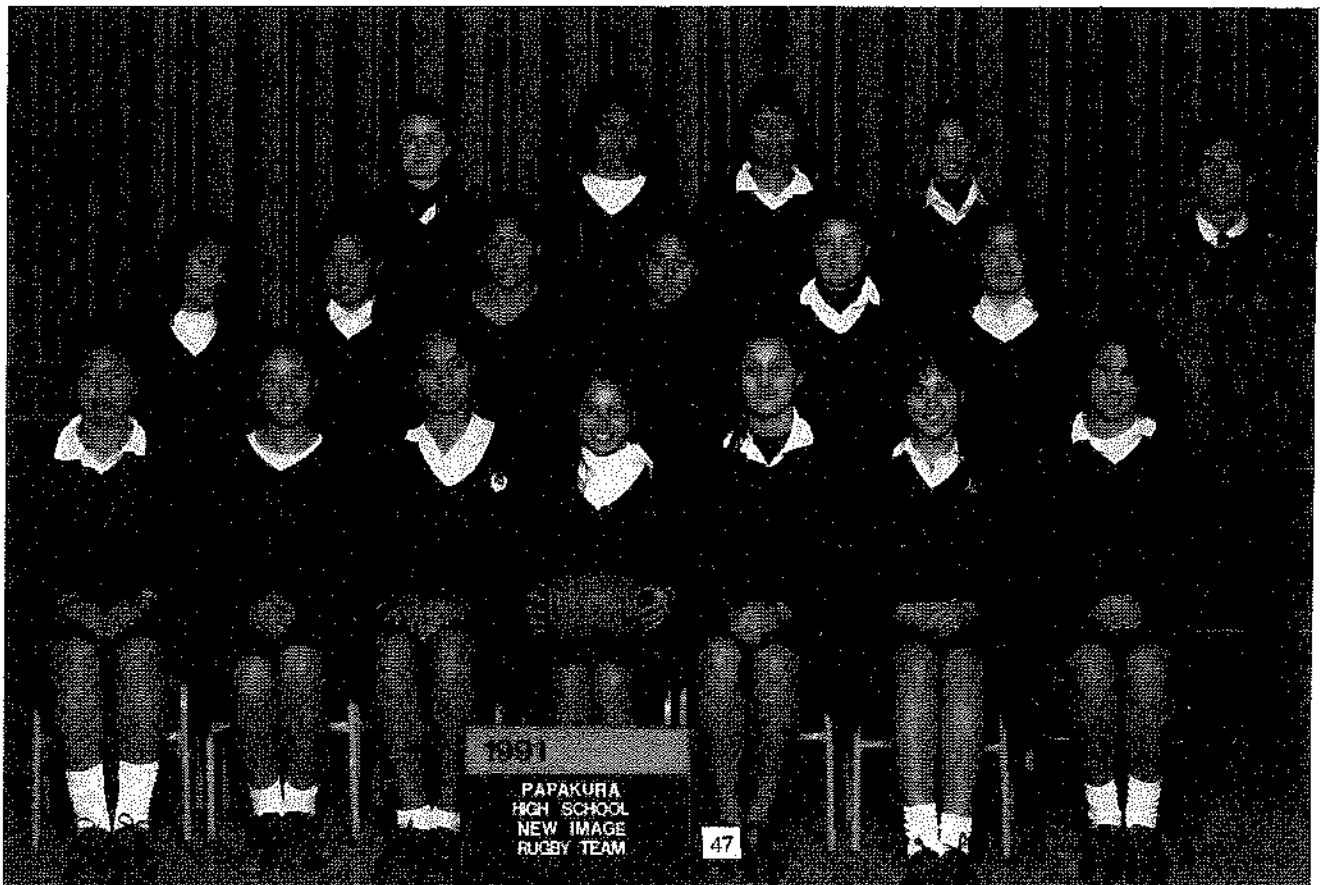

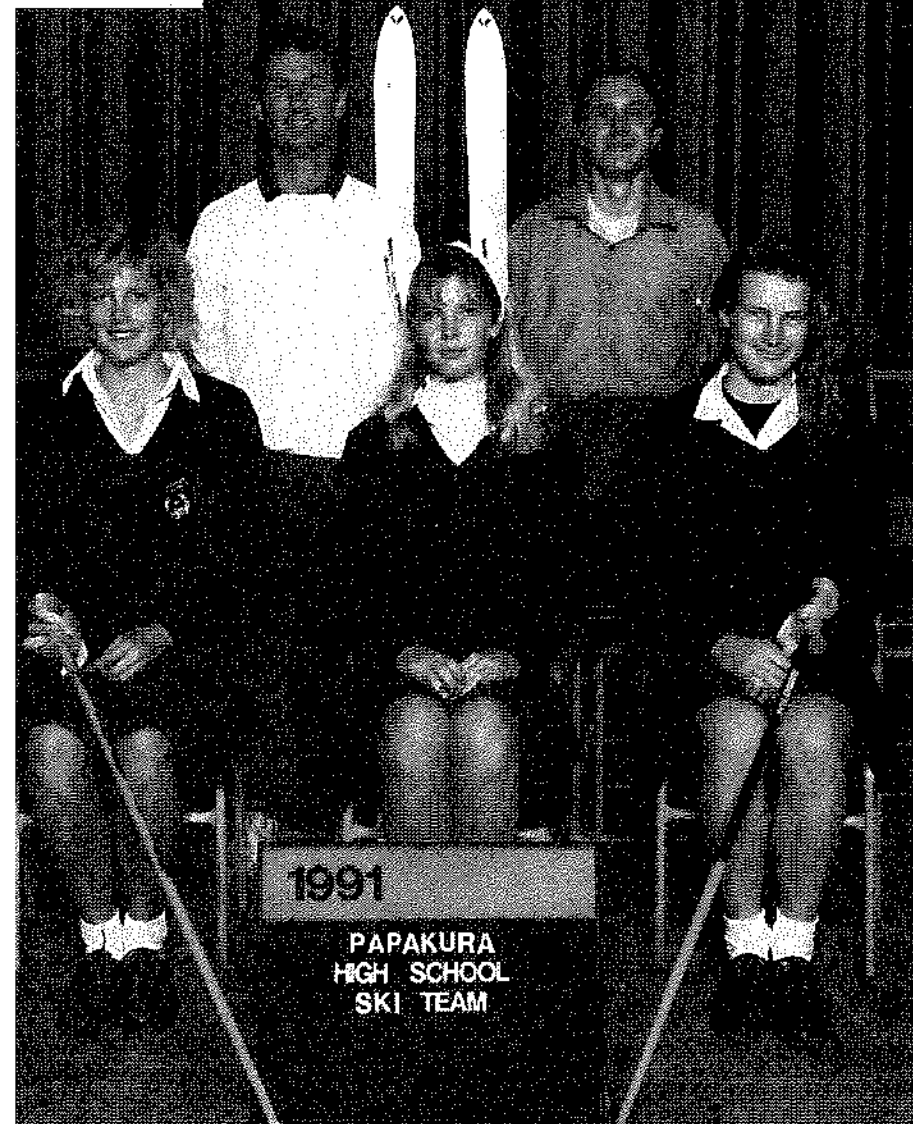

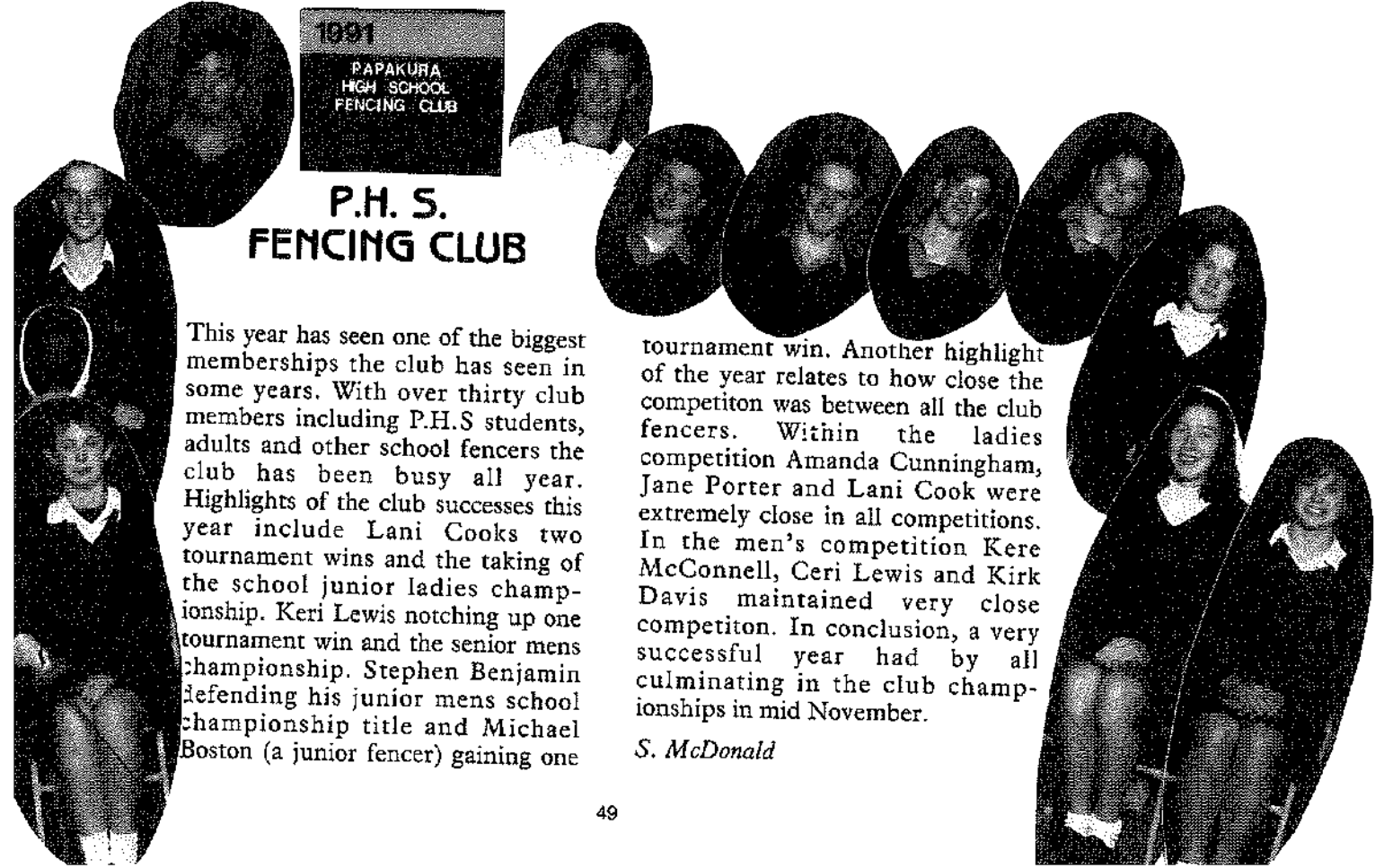


SKI TEAM 1991

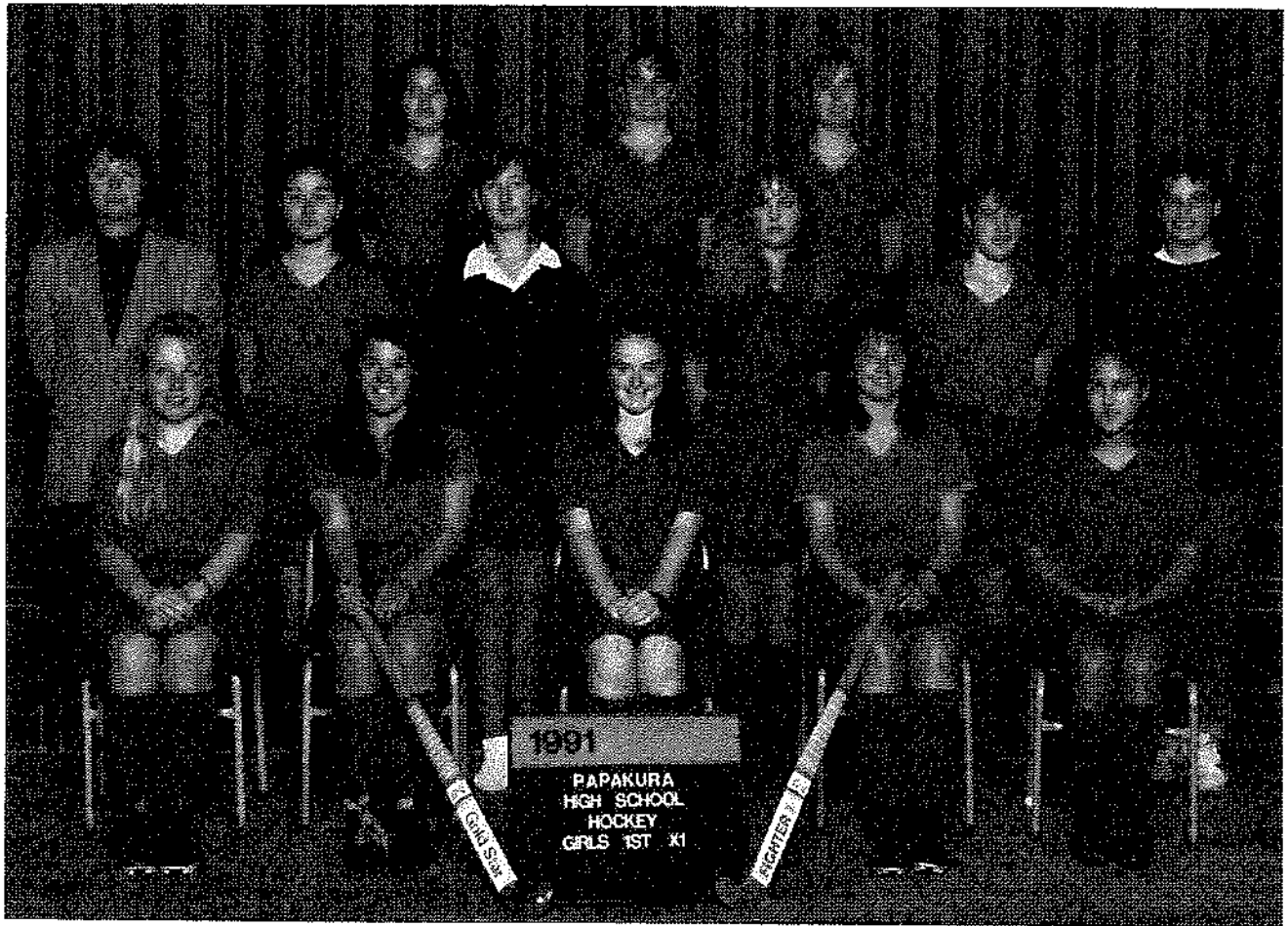


P.H. S. FENCING CLUB

1991 was a good year with the many more new books. We've bought both teenage fiction and non-fiction books useful for projects and interesting reading.

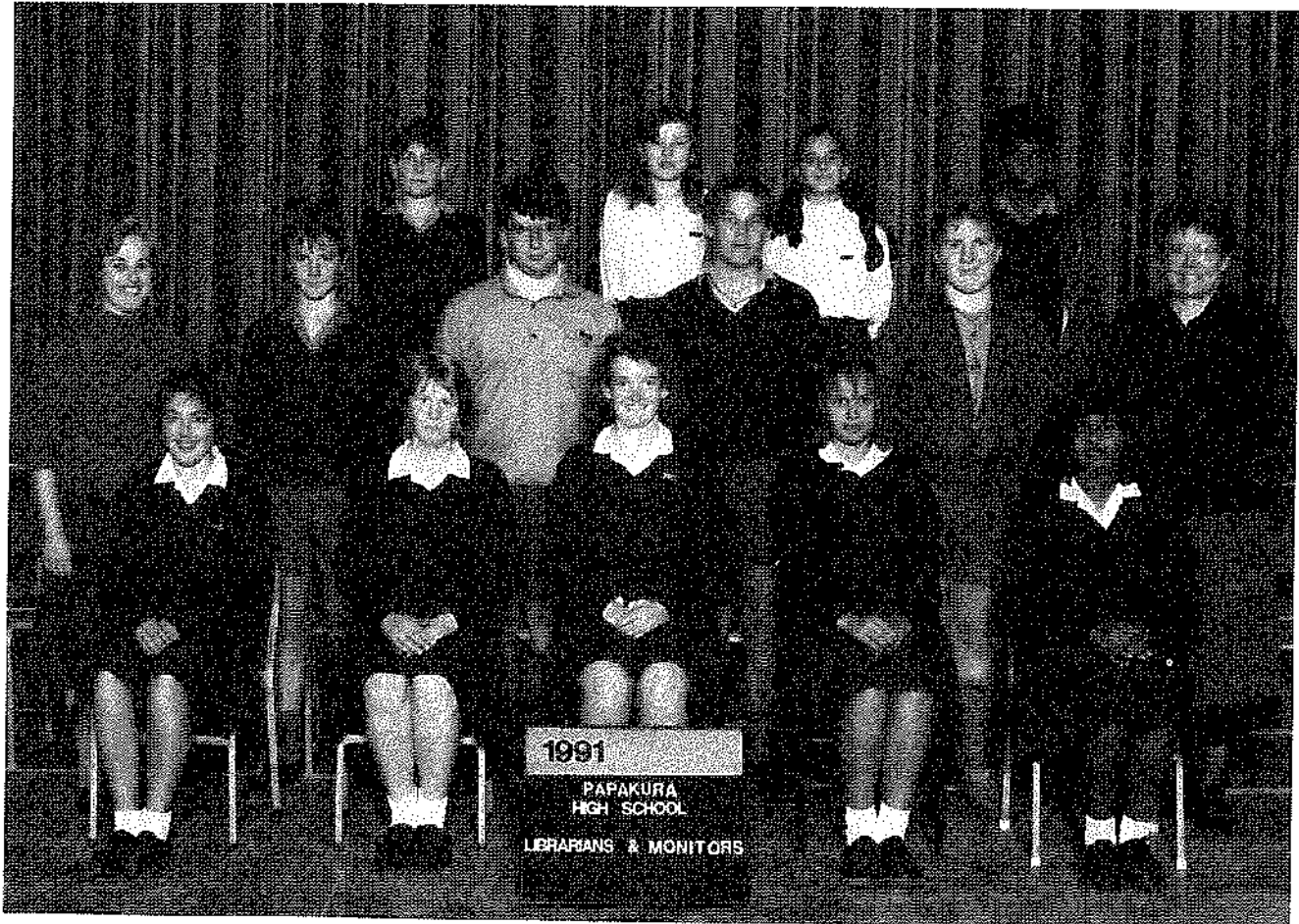
We hope to see some more of you reading enthusiasts out there, join up and become a library monitor in 1992. Because the librarians really need your help looking after the rowdy students.

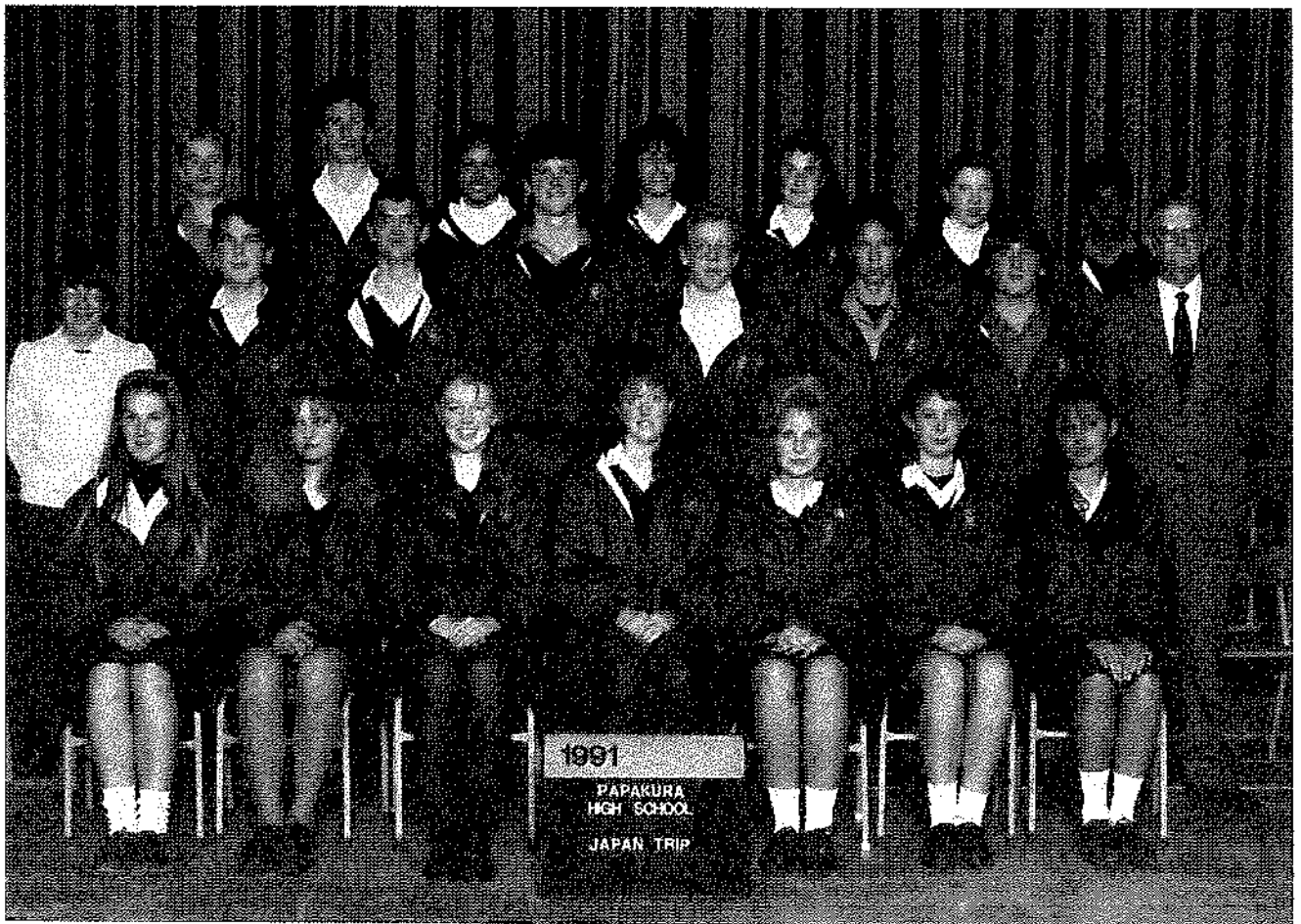

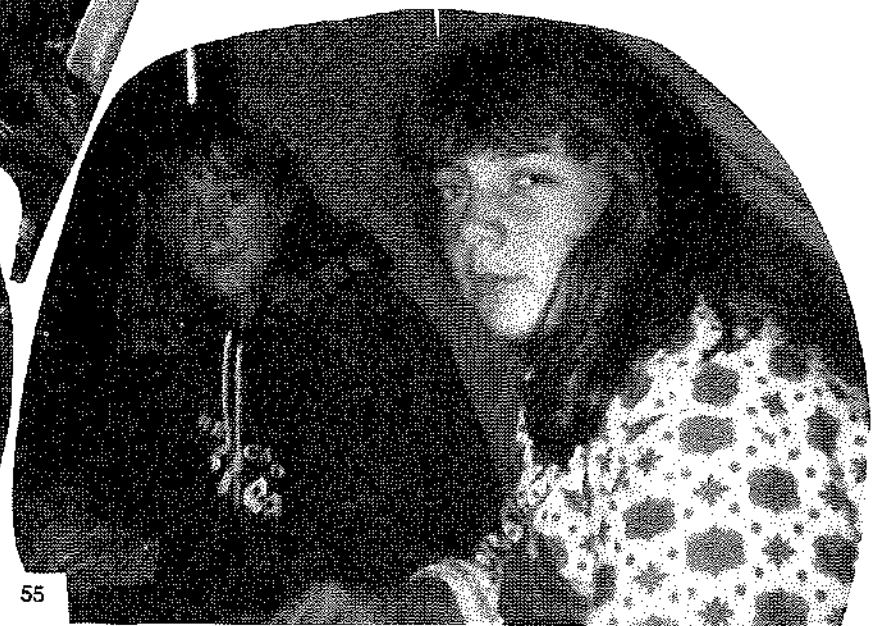
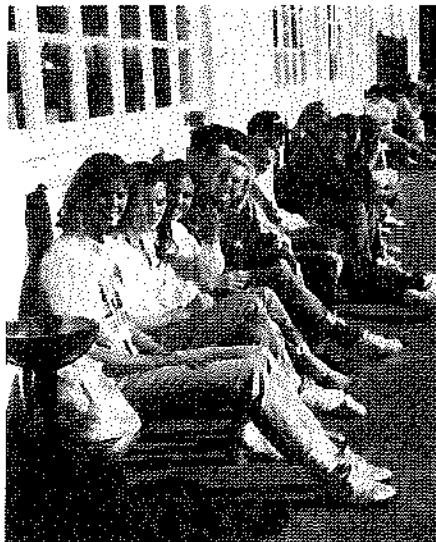
MOTUTAPU ELECTIVE

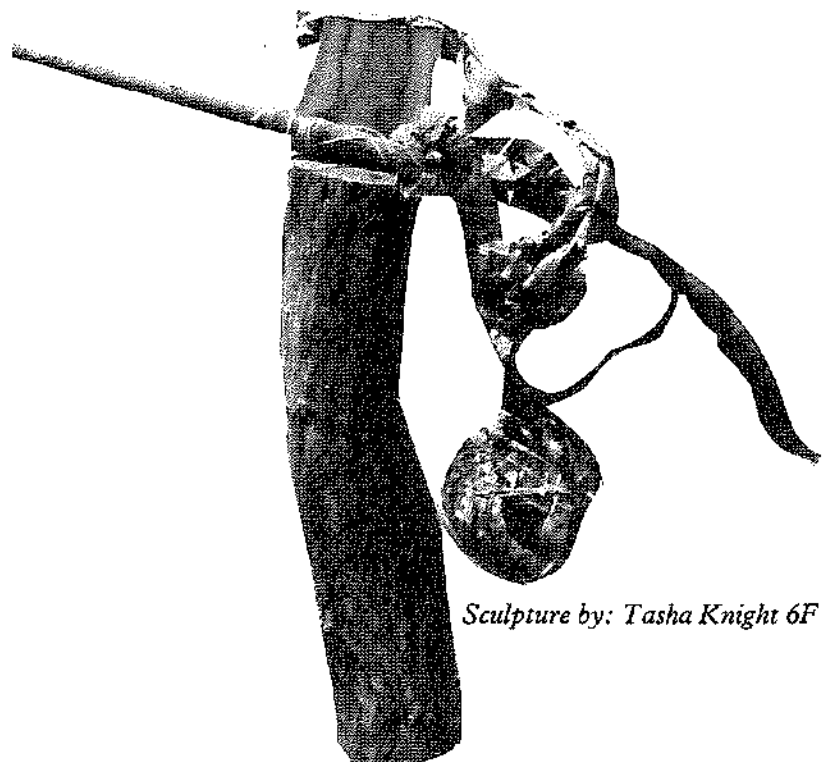
