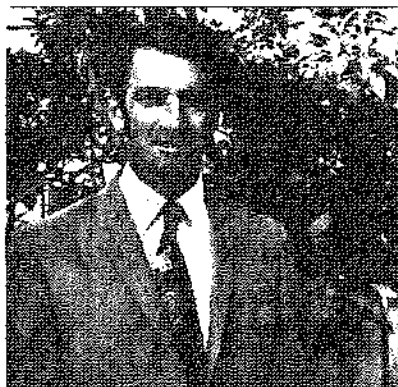

A school has 'spirit' when the majority of the pupils take pride in belonging to their school - the greater the majority, the greater the school spirit.

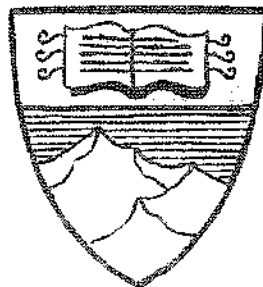

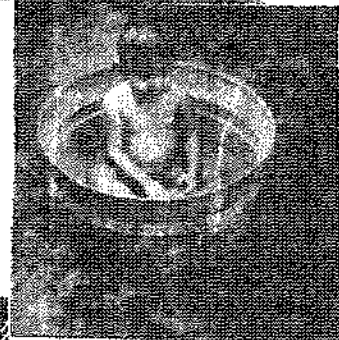
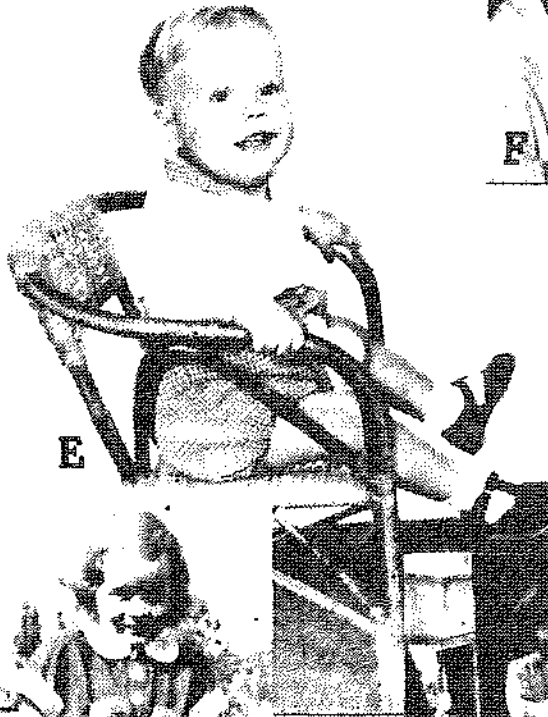
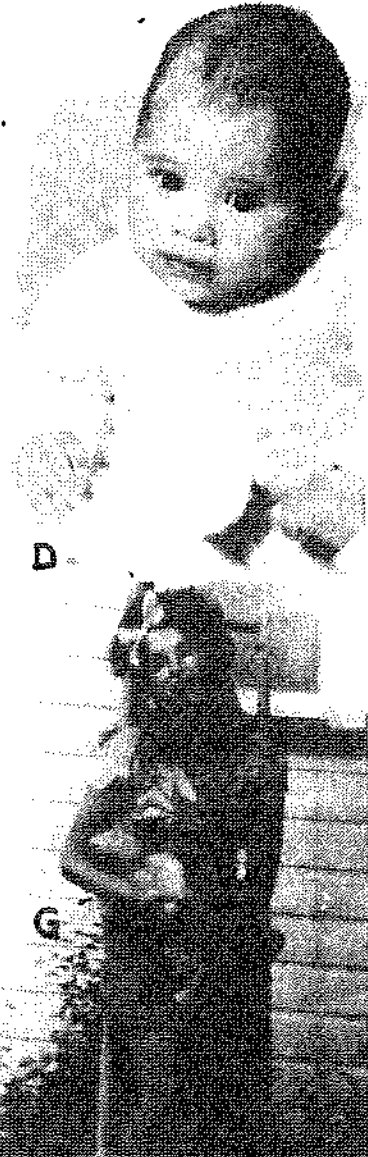
How can we achieve school spirit?

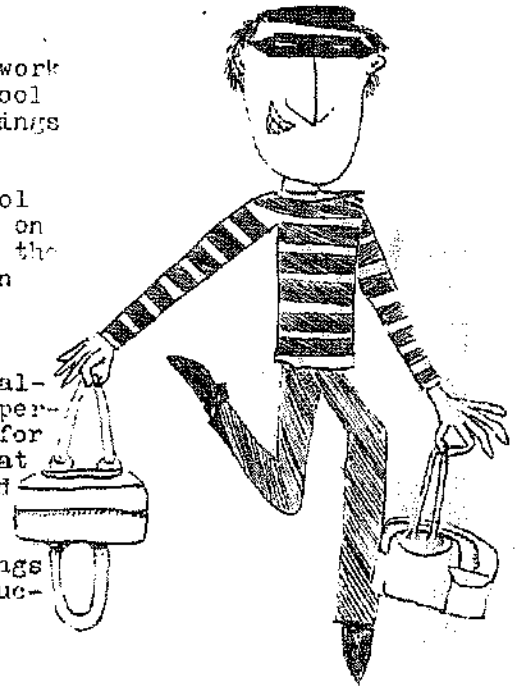
The Problem With Lockers

How many people would really put a year's school work and their personal belongings in the middle of the school car park? About as many people that put these same things into a school locker.

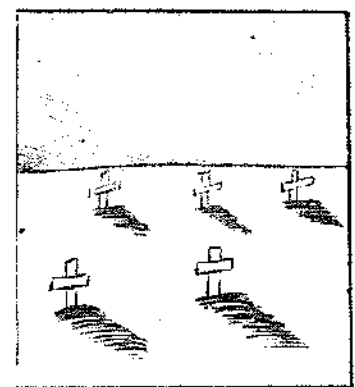
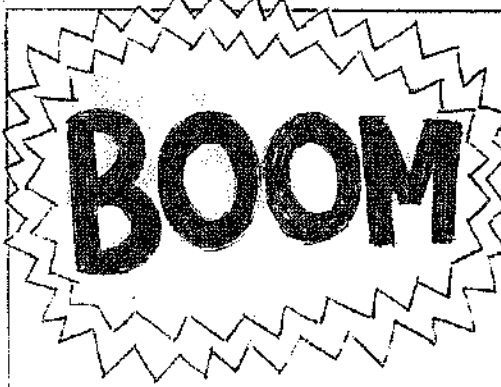
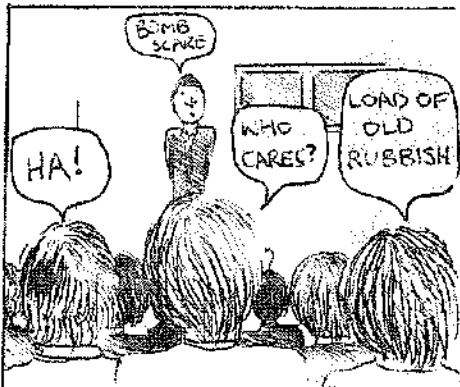

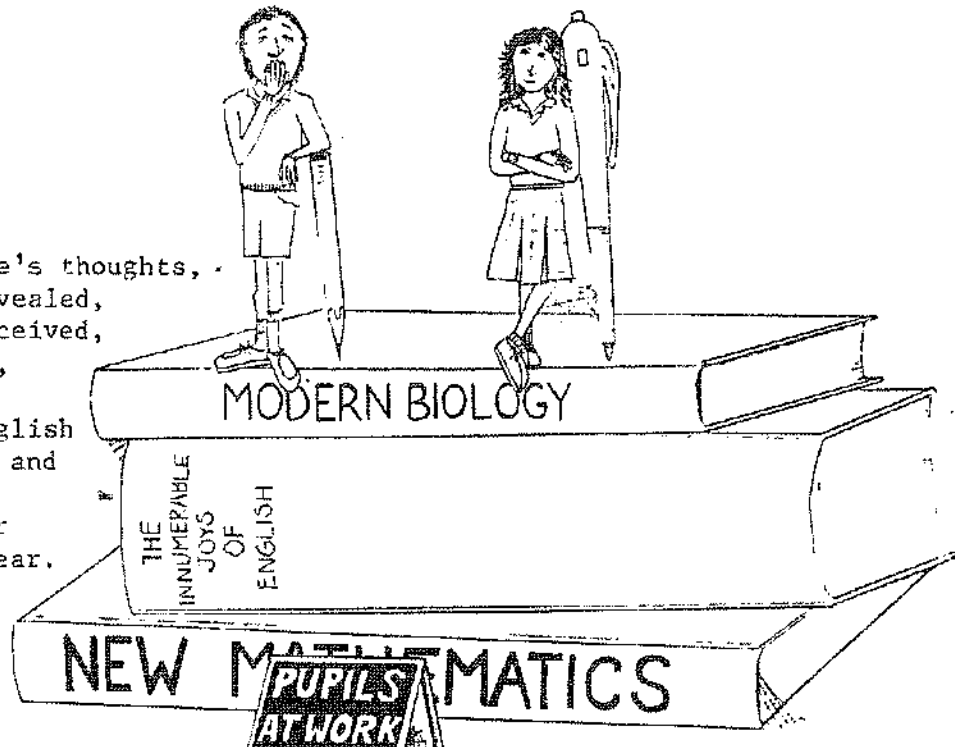
We can have funny clowns, balloons, flags, windmills for the kids. With some preparation we can have drama performances, even "Radio Papakura".

SOCIAL CUSTOMS AND POLITICAL CHANGES IN THE PACIFIC ISLANDS

In the August holidays the Kiwanis Service Club held its annual convention in Ni Vanuatu. It used to be called the New Hebrides when the British and French ruled it jointly. Today a local person Mr Walter Lini who studied in New Zealand in the 1970's is Prime Minister there. He is a Melanesian as are 105,000 of the 112,000 people there.

French settlers in the neighbouring islands of New Caledonia are frightened that the local Melanesian people there may also want to rule their own country. However, there are only 55,000 of them in a total population of 135,000.

You may remember the news about Jimmy Stevens bow and arrow revolution in

the northern island of Santo. Like the South Island of New Zealand, they talked a lot about pulling out and becoming a separate country, but Papuan New Guinea troops of the same ethnic group have stopped this.

The French and British took their customs to the islands. The idea of wearing underwear has become fashionable although it is so hot that they have a siesta (sleep) from 12.00 to 1.30p.m. Mrs Sokomaona, the new president's wife felt she had to wear a bra when she went to meet Mrs Gandhi the Prime Minister of India. However some Australian and New Zealand girls bathe topless outside the Club Mediteranean, and when they get a good tan it all seems perfectly natural in such a warm climate.

The flash Le Lagon hotel is now copying local building styles and using thatched rooves and tapa bark walls. Obviously attitudes to whose customs are regarded as best change and we sometimes move towards a mixture of the best from both worlds.

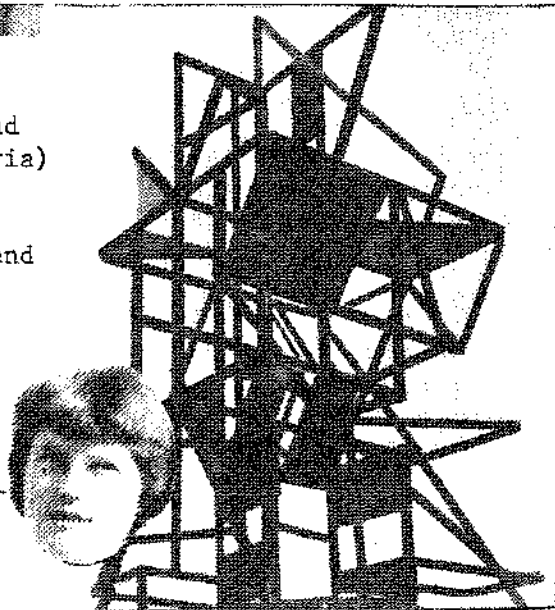

MEETING THE MAYOR

On 10th March, the students from the journalism elective had an interview with the Mayor of Papakura, Mr Farrell at the Papakura City Council Building.

We asked Mr Farrell what are some of the schemes the City Council are planning to do. Mr Farrell replied that these plans are divided into three sections mainly, short, medium and long term planning. The short term planning is mainly the running of the town on a day to day basis while the medium term planning is to be carried out in the next 3 - 4 years and the long term planning takes quite a number of years i.e. around 10 - 20 years.

One of the schemes in the long term plan is to urbanise a large area situated at the south-east of Papakura should the need arise, i.e. when the population rises and residential units are needed. However the matter does not arise at present.

Then we asked Mr Farrell what were his views concerning the increase of violence in Papakura and what steps has the City Council taken to stop it.



His answer was very interesting. He doesn't think that violence is any worse than in many other South Auckland suburbs which he declined to name. This social phenomenon or 'gang era' as Mr Farrell called it will pass. According to him it is a relatively new development because up until 3 - 4 years ago these gangs did not exist, and it is only a phase which will pass. As for the control of it, the Mayor says, it is the function of the police and the actual enforcement is up to them because the city Council has no jurisdiction over the matter.

The journalist elective found Mr Farrell very friendly and co-operative. It was obvious that he has a sincere concern for Papakura and its community and tries his best to help the people.

In May this year our school was fortunate enough to acquire the talents of one of Auckland's foremost Reading Resource Teachers - Mrs C Speight. In Term II she set up a Reading Encouragement Programme in the Library where students have been encouraged to become independent in selecting their own reading material, and were given time in class for Sustained Silent Reading. This scheme covered all third forms with some 4ths and 5ths included. The second part of the programme involved Reading across the Curriculum, where students have been assisted in using printed materials more effectively. This included study reading for all students at all levels, with an emphasis on Study Skills and preparation for examinations in senior classes. Mrs Speight extends a warm welcome to all students wishing to discuss study methods. She is usually found in the library - but with any luck next year's building programme may see her housed in her own Reading Centre.

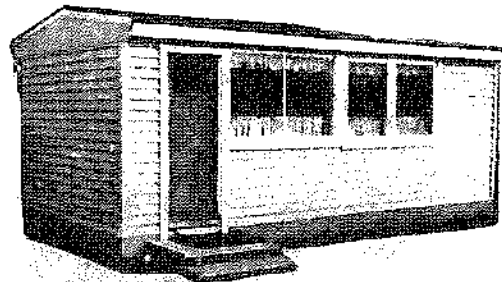

At the beginning of 1981 it is anticipated that an Experience Class will open at Papakura High School. The class will operate on 'Home Room' organisation and cater for pupils who are of less academic ability. Their programme will involve developing basic academic skills of reading, writing, maths, basic living and social skills.

The pupils will be given an opportunity to experience 'work' in local businesses for one day a week, thus giving them the opportunity to learn how to cope in employment situations and to help realise their capabilities.

As occupation of time provides escape from boredom the programme will encourage the development of skills that can be pursued on an individual basis. The children will participate in normal school routines and consequential benefits are anticipated for the whole school.



Mrs Jones

In her four years at Papakura High School, Mrs Jones has established herself very successfully as a Remedial Teacher. Her job involves sorting through the Third Formers P.A.T. tests and sifting out the pupils who have difficulty either generally or in specific areas of English. She works with them in developing their mental reading skills.

Her aim is to get children to understand what they are reading without the bother of pronunciation. She is happy to say that she finds the children she works with seem to benefit from it and enjoy the casual atmosphere in which she teaches. She also has in many of her classes A and B stream pupils who need further extension work. She helps these students to improve their reading speed, to enable them to more successfully cope with the school curriculum.

THE BRAZILIAN EXPERIENCE

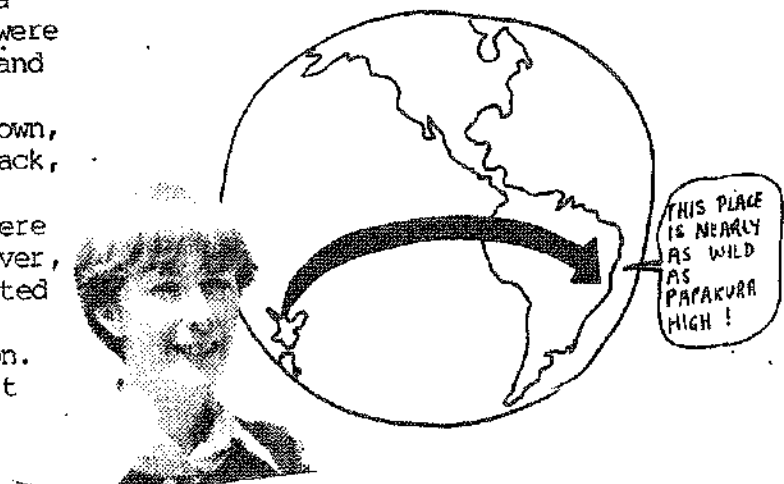
Term II in Brazil.

A dream for many of us, but for Mrs Rodden it was a reality. Breaking away from the warmth and security of Papakura High School, Mrs Rodden (an English teacher noted for her library work) left us for the wilds of South America, to join her husband who is working there for a year. The size of the country and the number of people amazed her. She found the people friendly, but it was difficult to get to know them, as everyone speaks Portugese - which she could not. She says she had a few books to help her and people were very helpful in trying to understand her.

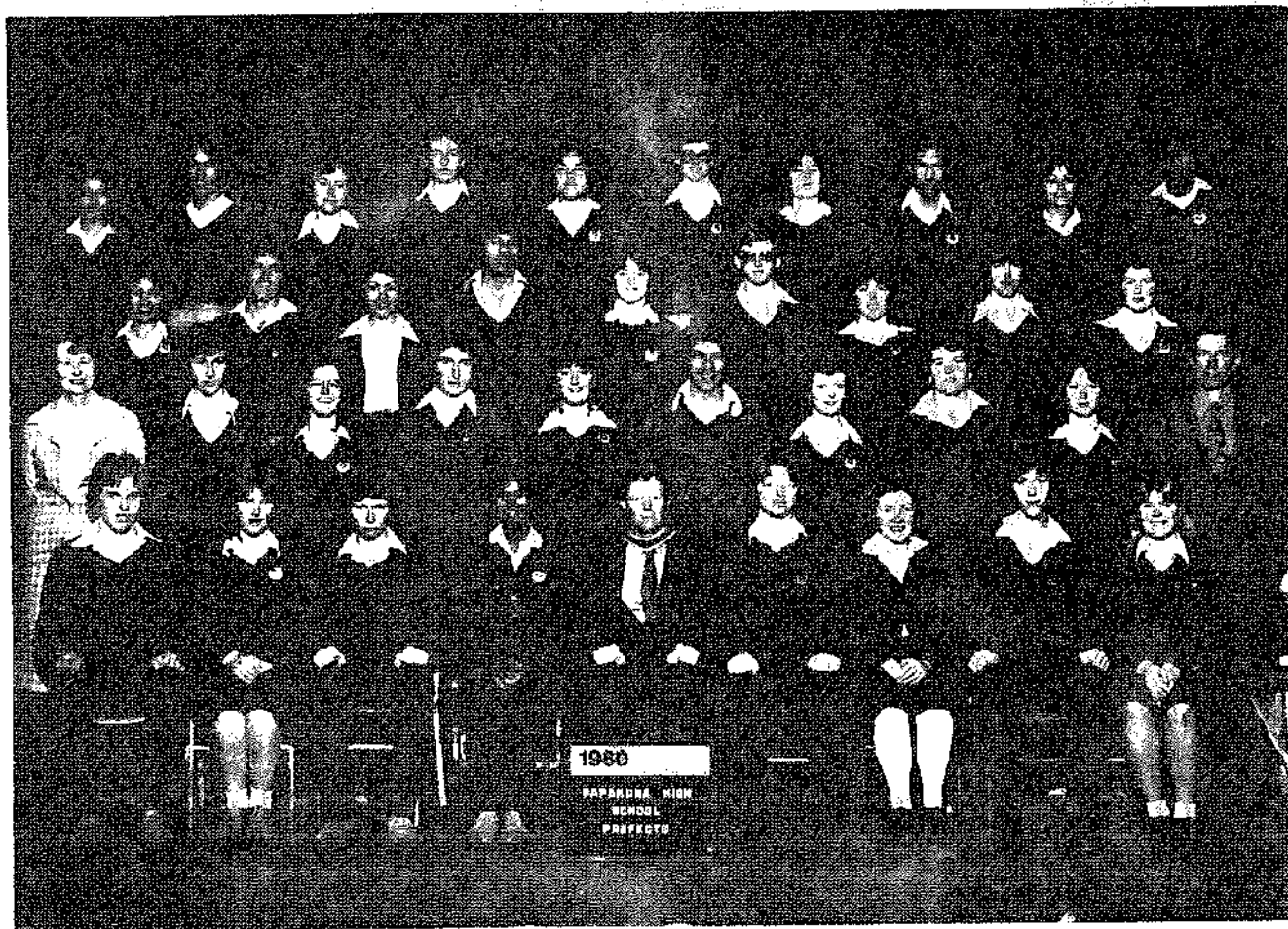
Although they stayed in a small town, which was off the main tourist track, she found that the country wasn't really geared for tourists, as there were not many things to do. However, she did go to Rio, where she visited Sugar Loaf Mountain and she also went for a boat trip on the Amazon. It was winter during her visit but the weather was quite hot, often

around 20°C and sometimes as hot as 30°C. The staple foods in Brazil are rice and beans, and they grow a lot of tropical fruit. Although inflation is at 107% the cost of living is quite cheap. Most things are inexpensive except petrol which is 80c a litre, and is not sold in the weekend.

Mrs Rodden also noticed that the women often wear trousers and that music played on the radio is mostly English and American.

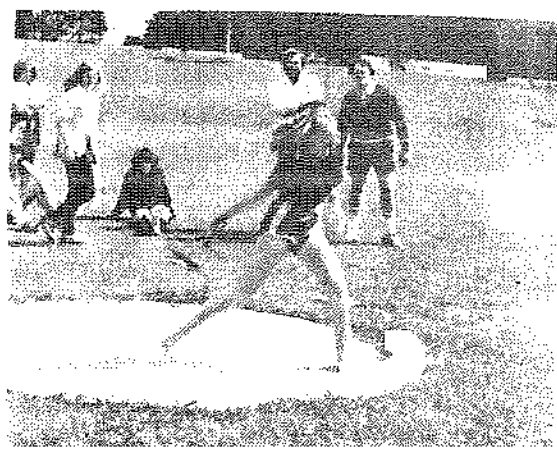

Our class went roller skating which we enjoyed tremendously. Unfortunately we may not be considered the best class but we do try when we are there. All in all we are a pretty good class.

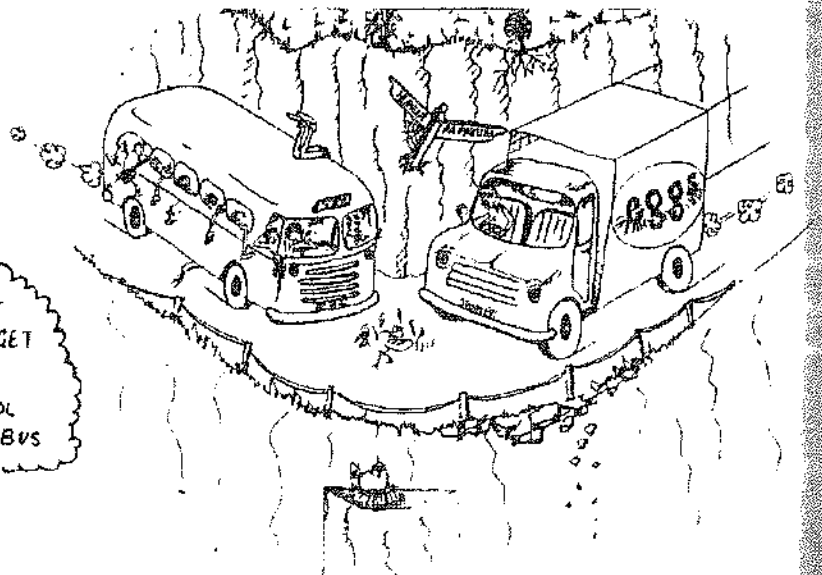
