

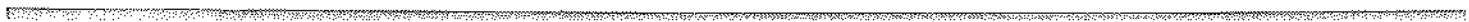

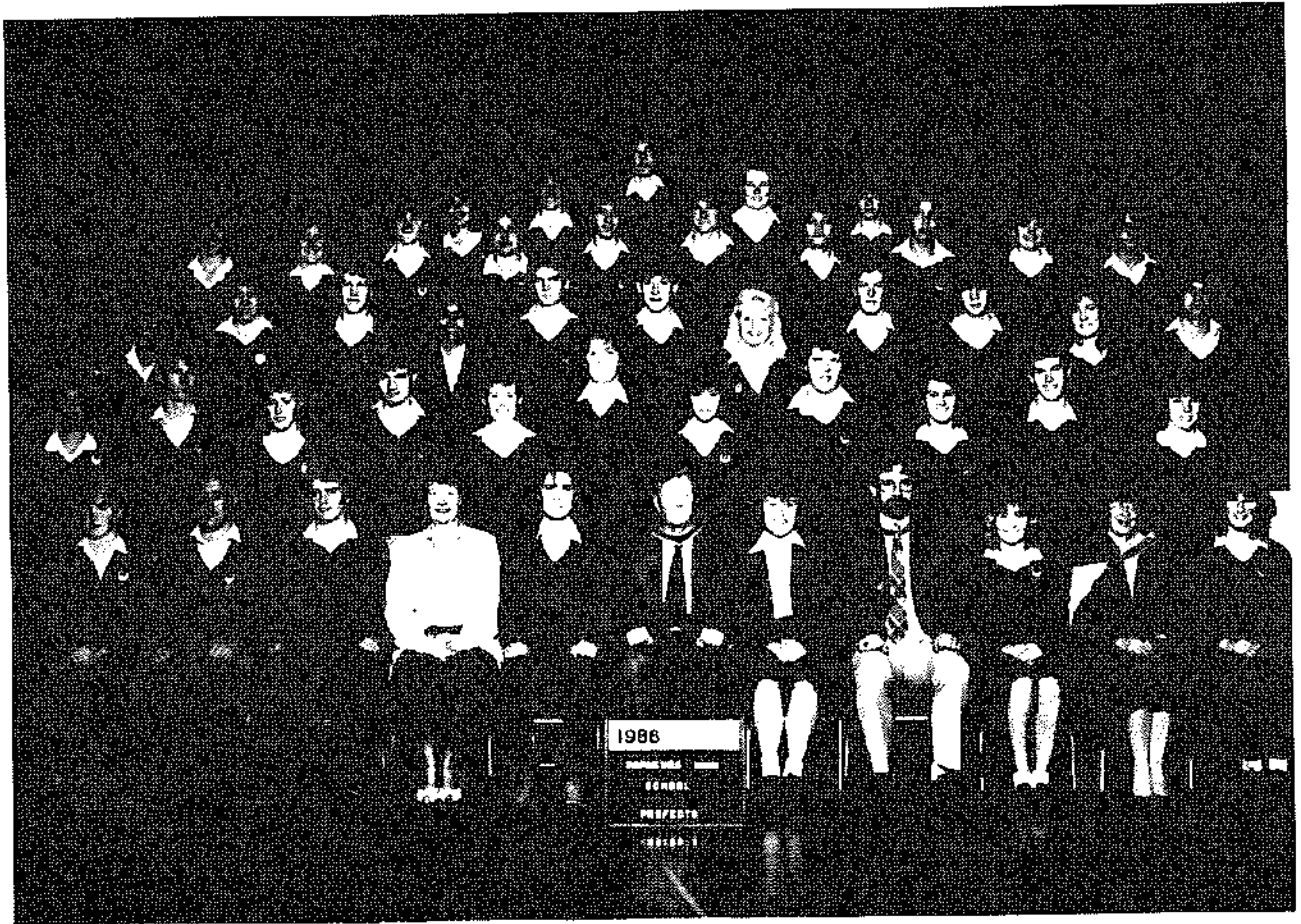

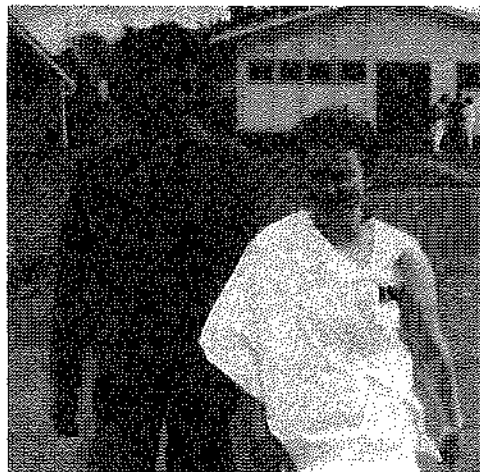

Mr Junge also works on Saturday mornings supervising periodic detainees. In this role he supervised the laying of gravel paths around the Waharau Outdoor Education Camp.

Mr Junge has said that he has found coming to Papakura High School both a change and a challenge.



Students attending music classes at the beginning of the second term were struck by the change in the atmosphere with bright coloured desks and rock music being included with the traditional classical music. The changed atmosphere was due to the arrival of Miss Roz Armour who believes that music should be interesting and exciting. Miss Armour came to us from Wanganui High School. Although most of her spare time is spent singing with a band, she found time to be the musical director for the Sweeney Todd show.

Two staff who have been at the school relieving took up permanent appointments this year. Mr David Wilson left Papakura High School in 1983 and moved to Dunedin, but due to his preference for the northern climate and way-of-life returned in 1985. After a period of long-term relieving he was appointed head of the Slow Learner's Department in 1986. Similarly Mrs Susan Pickard was a relieving teacher of English in 1985, but appointed to a permanent position in 1986. A number of staff are leaving Papakura High School at the end of this year, either to move on to other teaching jobs or to try and develop their talents in other fields. Ms Barford has taught Social Studies, History and English. Despite her love of teaching, Ms Barford is leaving the profession to concentrate on her writing. In 1985 she had a book of poetry called "A Plea to a Spanish Lady" published and she hopes to continue with her poetry as well as developing other forms of writing.

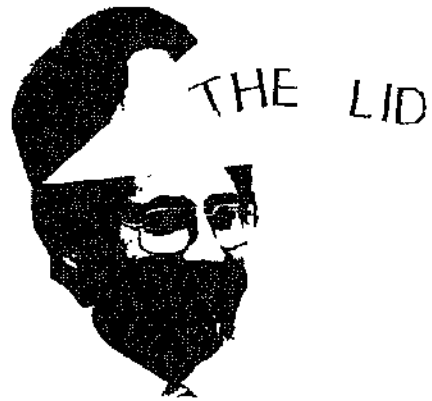

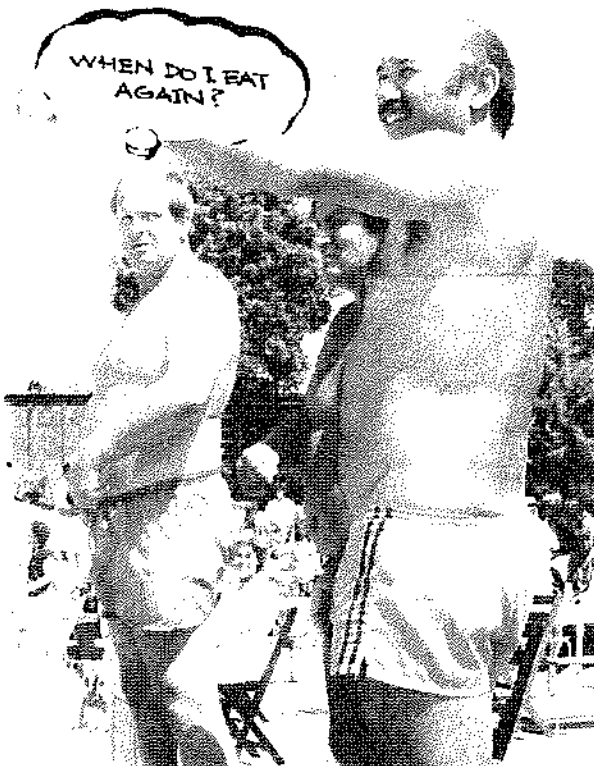

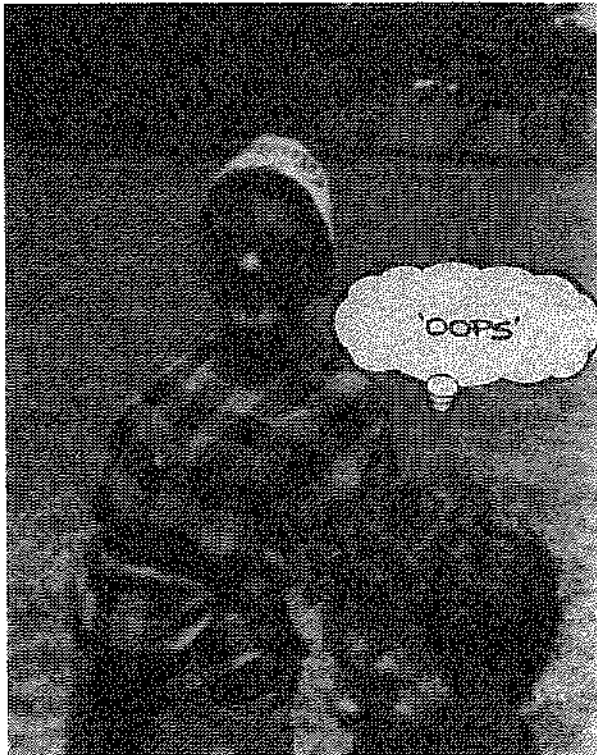

'TWINS' GET AN AUSSIE TWANG

After three months of being laughed at because of their kiwi accents in Australia, six Papakura High School girls were ridiculed for their newly-acquired Australian accents, when they returned home.

The girls were exchange students sponsored by the Papakura and Takanini/Clevedon Rotary clubs. They spent three months in various parts of Australia, discovering how our neighbours across the Tasman live.

For all but one of the girls their new homes were in small farming communities, the largest of which had a population of 2 200.

Although the lifestyle was not very different to that of New Zealand all the girls encountered language problems. They were given pens when they asked for pins, laughed at when ordering chips, and to even utter the number six - well, you can imagine the look they got!

In May they returned to New Zealand with their twin (the person they stayed with in Australia) to show them our country and, as one girl said, "to teach them to speak properly."

It was the first time Papakura High has had so many Australian students - and all females as well.

But principal Don Hunt said, "That's alright."

Kerry Crompton (15) stayed with Wendy Speer (16) in her home town of Gundagai, NSW, which has a population of 2 200 and an economy based on wheat, cattle and sheep farming.

For Kerry, the three months were most enjoyable. She had loads of laughs and found Gundagai a very friendly place. She explained that although the town is small it is steeped in Australian culture as the home of the famous radio play, "Dad and Dave, Mum and Muriel."

Sharyn Morgan (15) lived with Jenny Foster (15) in Paterson, NSW, and because it was so small (800 people) they travelled to nearby Maitland to attend school.

Sharyn described the exchange as "the most wonderful experience I have ever had," and would recommend it to other students.

Fifteen-year-old Angie Neale lived in the civilised city of Melbourne in the Frankston home of Cindy Calvert (15).

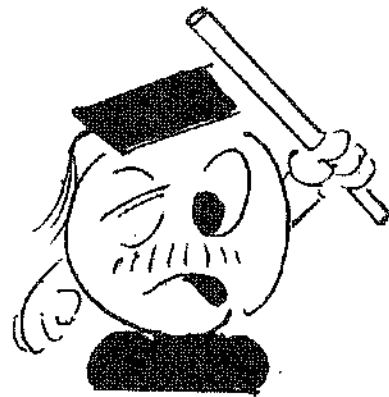
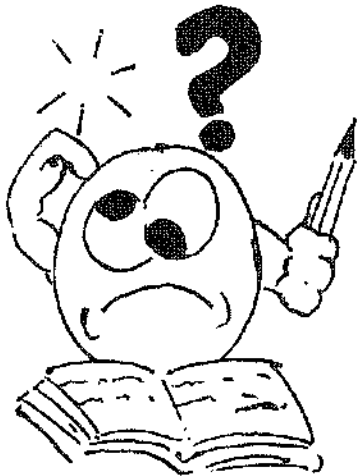
Another small farming town, Merriwa in NSW, was graced with the presence of New Zealander Kelly Hansen (16).

The play followed the day-to-day life of some of the men's families involved in the dispute. We learnt about the strain such a situation placed on wives and children, especially when they do not fully support their men's actions.

The following Friday we attended a workshop with the playwright and the producer of the play at Theatre Corporate. The play was written by Renee, and is a sequel to her popular play "Wednesday To Come."

She explained to us how she decided to write the play and how she did her research into the events of 1951. She also explained the process she went through in writing the play and how she decided what incidents to include and which to leave out.

This helped us to realise that everything that appears in a play has a structural or dramatic purpose.

The producer, Roger McGill, explained how he decided to stage the play.

After answering our questions about the play, he invited us to look around the set.

We were amazed that so much action could have taken place on such a small set. Each actor's movements would have to be carefully co-ordinated so that he did not bump into other actors or furniture.

All the props and furniture were old pieces from the 1950s which added to the realism of the set. The most interesting props were the old barber's chair and hair clippers. Even the strikers' broadsheets used as props turned out to be genuine.

We were also able to go into the lighting box and play with the mixing board for the lights.

Our exploration of the set, props and lights made us realise there was far more preparation involved in drama productions than we had thought.

The workshop also gave us an insight into the writing and staging process.

EX-PUPILS WIN GOLD MEDALS

Two Papakura High School ex-pupils each won two gold medals at the 1986 Commonwealth Games at Edinburgh. Stephanie Foster, who was also the flag bearer for New Zealand at the opening ceremony, won gold medals in the women's single and double sculling events. 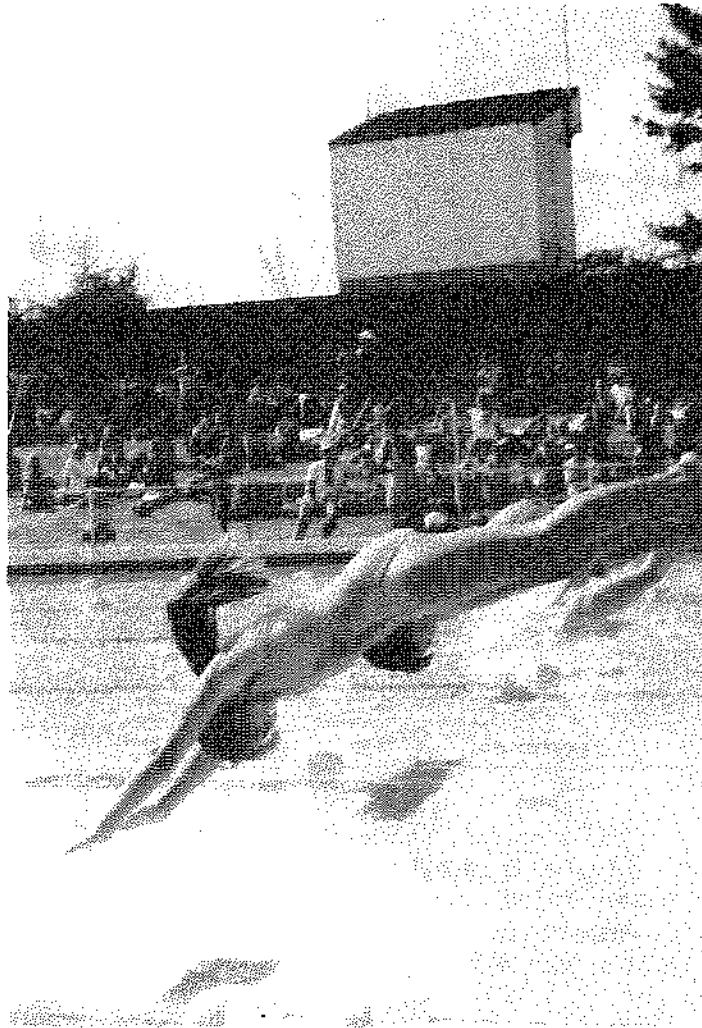
1986 SWIMMING SPORTS

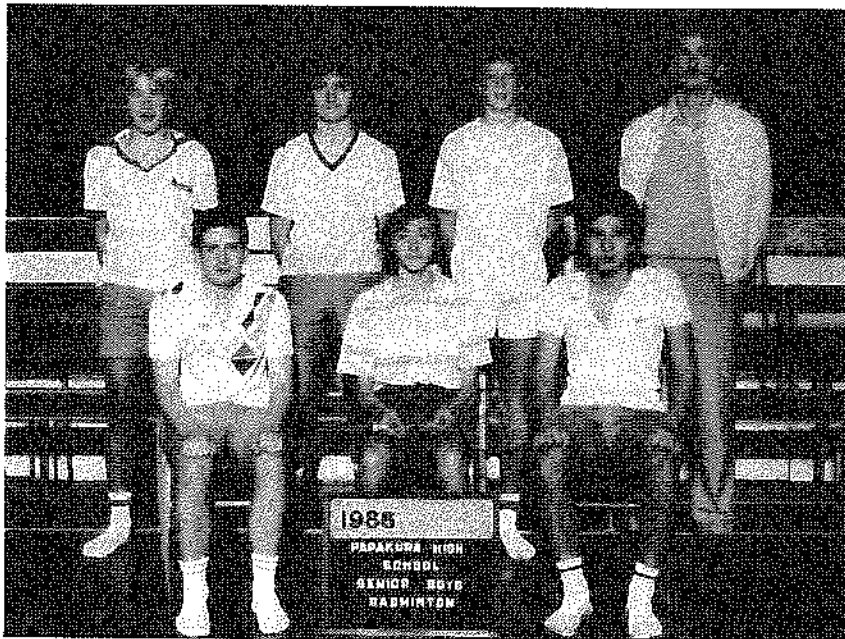

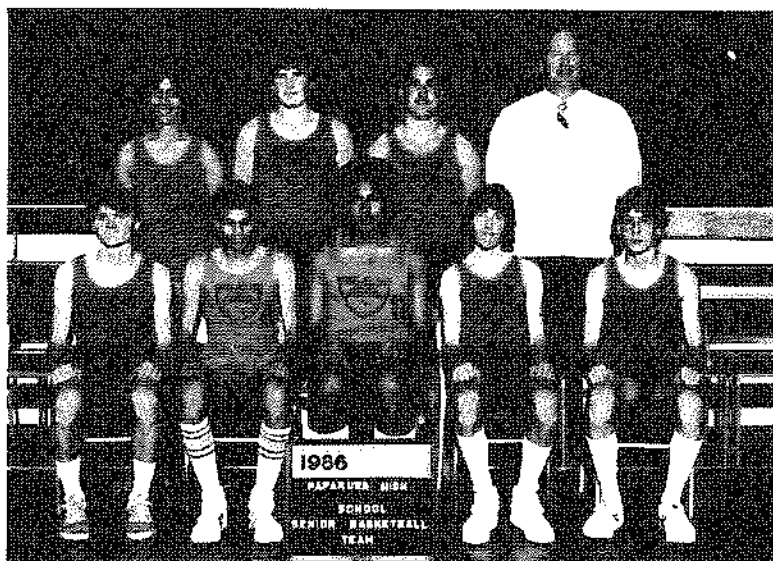
SENIOR BOYS BASKETBALL

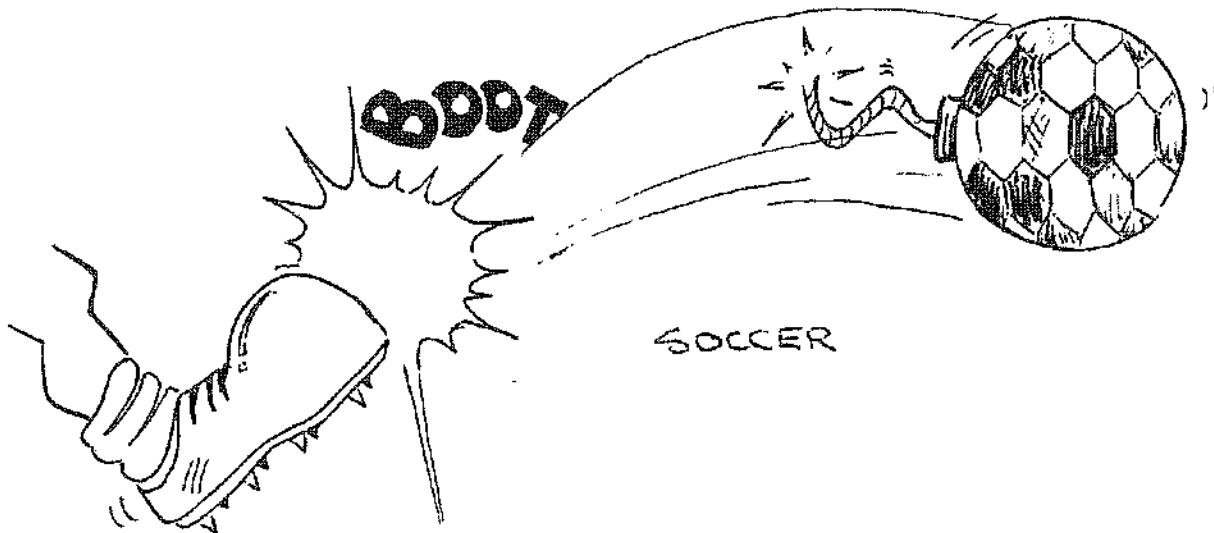
GIRLS SOCCER

All players developed well throughout the year and it was pleasing to register four wins from the last four games including our two annual fixtures.

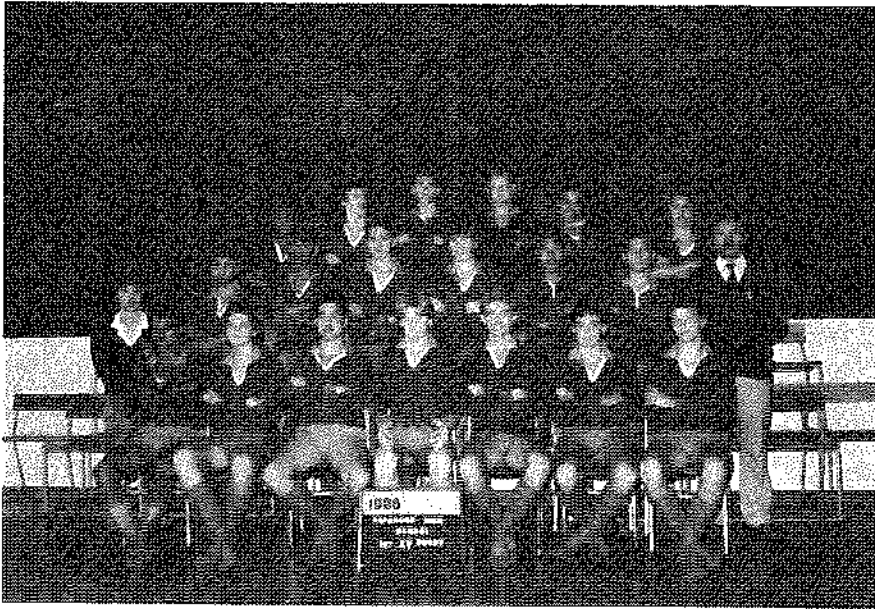

ticked by she became anxious that he wouldn't put in an appearance.

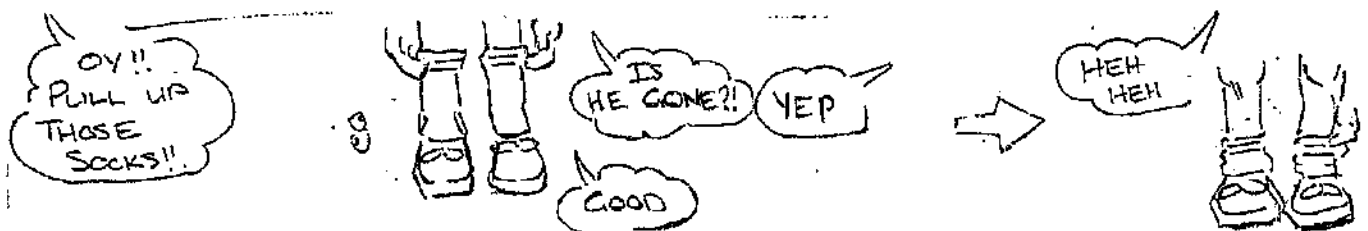
Then there he was. His tall, well-built frame silhouetted against

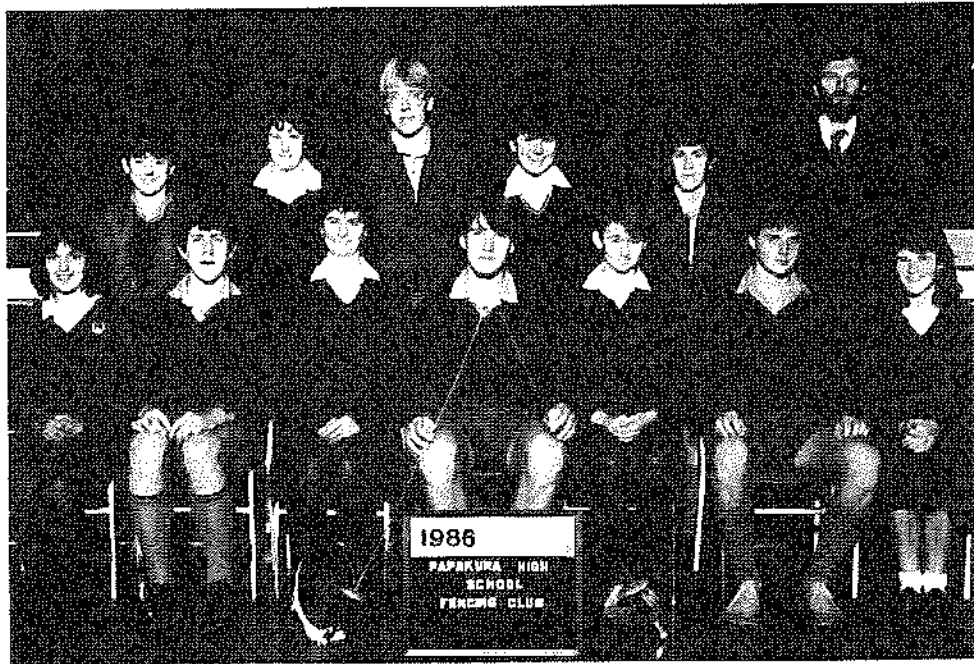

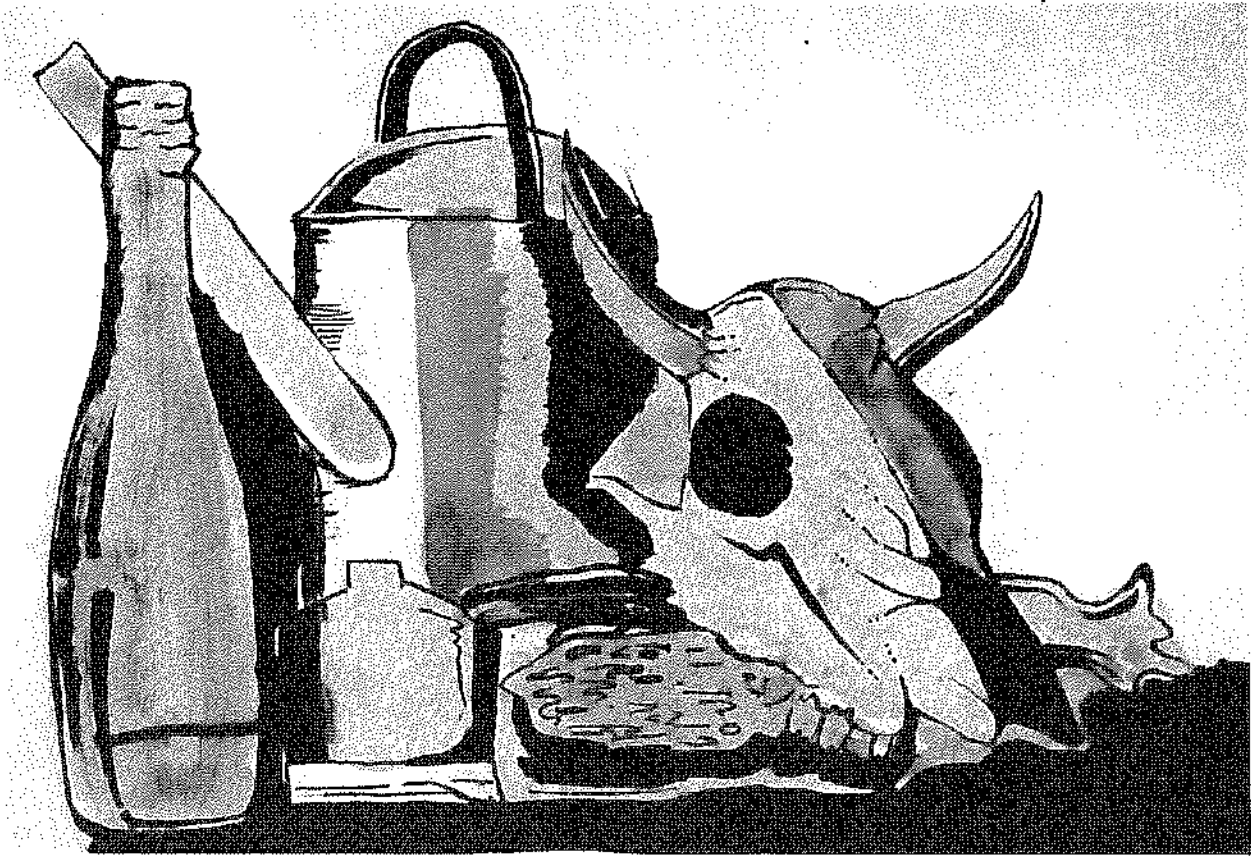
Overall it was a great learning experience, and we would like to thank everyone who was involved in making this business such a rich experience.

So maybe you could class our staff as the agglomeration of Paris, New York and London!



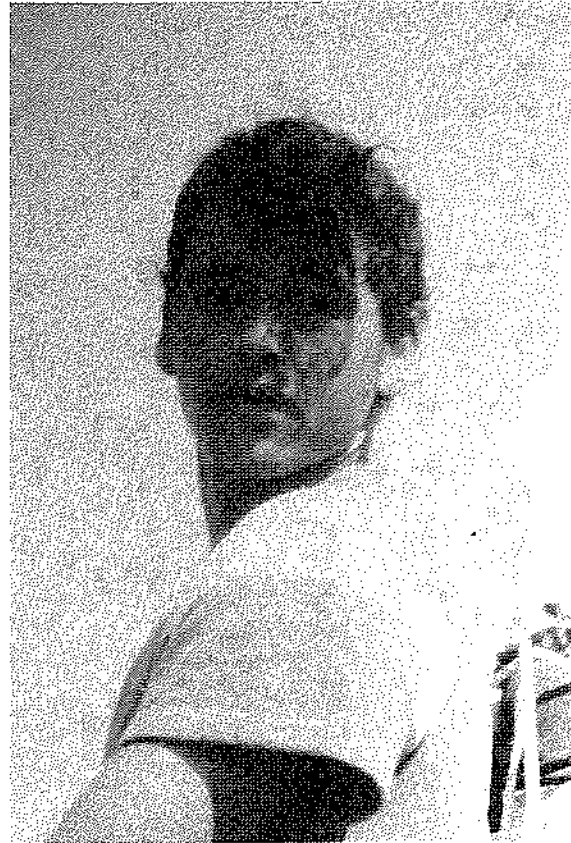
