However, we have the advantage. Thanks to 'cool' taste in clothes, we can see him before

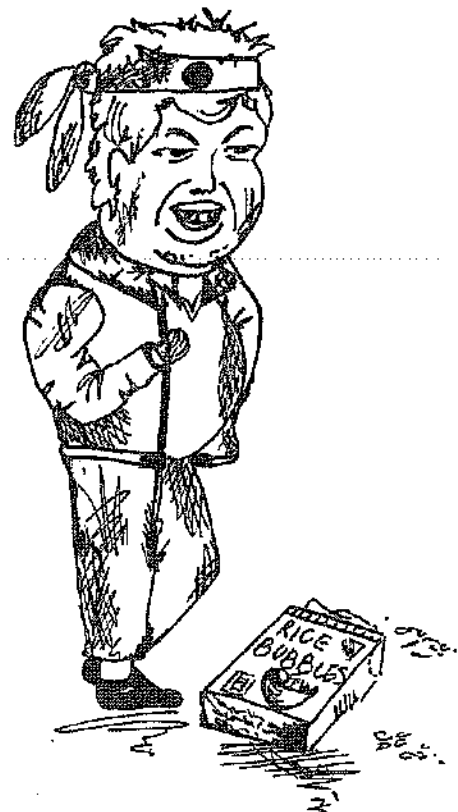
he sees us. I really hope he has a note for his clothes from Mrs Hammer.

Our Schools first and newest exchange student for this year is from Japan.

Her name is Noriyo Iwasa and she is 17 years of age. She has come to New Zealand on a one year rotary exchange during which time she will be attending Papakura High School and staying with three different families. Currently Noriyo has been living with Mrs Lees, our Schools Executive Officer, and her family.

Noriyo is in the Seventh Form and the subjects she is taking while here are: Seventh Form Statistics and Calculus, Sixth Form Biology and Chemistry, and Third Form English.

Noriyo left her home town, Kamagaya, which is situated in the Chiba Prefecture, on March 29. Her family in Japan which includes her 19 year old brother who is studying to be a doctor and her 15 year old sister whom is still at school.

While she is here, Noriyo will attend functions organised by the Rotary Club and has been on Sixth and Seventh Form Electives.

Carolyn Emery is a 19 year old exchange student from Canada. Carolyn has been in New Zealand for 7 months. She has had to go back to Canada due to bad luck, but hopes to return soon. She says her greatest experience in New Zealand was telethon, and watching the All Blacks beat Australia.

Carolyn agrees with everyone else that the All Blacks are the best and she says that Wayne Shelford could join

the football team back home and pulverise them all.

While Caroline has been here she has travelled to Lake Taupo and down to the South Island. She says that her favourite place is Queen Street because there are so many different people to meet, and her biggest excitement was meeting the Black Power Gang.

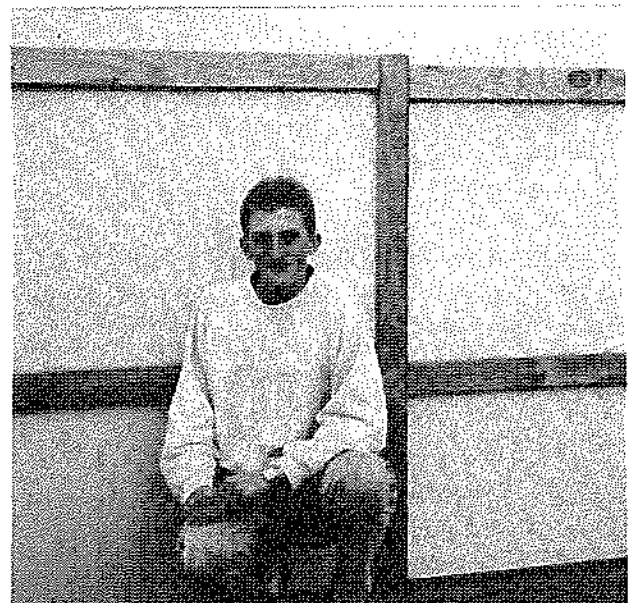
The Americans toured down to Palmerston North then on to Rotorua. Their last day being in Wellington, where most had home-stays on farms once again.

The group also paid a visit to St Stephens College where they were given another Maori greeting and were shown around the school.

After all the travelling of the North Island they bused up to Auckland for the last night. In typical Kiwi fashion some students went out at night for one last party with the Americans. Others waited until the morning to farewell the home-stays at the airport. Before they left I asked a group of students what their opinion of New Zealand was. The main response was "New Zealanders are so nice and friendly", also "It is so green!". So what did the New Zealanders learn? The main response from them is "Oh really!"

The beginning of the third term saw the arrival of a new exchange student at Papkura High School. Torsten Nielsen comes from the city of Aalborg in Denmark.

Aalborg has a population of 160,000 and it is the fourth largest city in Denmark.



Torsten is on a 12 month exchange and will stay with three or four in the Papakura area during his time in New Zealand. He is hosted by the Takanini-Clevedon Rotary Club.

Torsten comes from a family of four, he has recently finished nine years compulsory schooling and will begin a new school called a 'gymnasium' when he returns home. He finds schooling at Papakura High very unlike that of what he is used to. The main differences being that he does not wear a uniform and there are also certain compulsory subjects which must be taken by all students, unlike our freedom of choice. He has studied English for five years and also speaks German and Danish. He is a keen athlete and particularly enjoys high-jump. This is not surprising as he is around 188 cm tall or 6 foot 2 inches.

"New Zealanders are very friendly, warm and open people. It is a very beautiful country", describes Torsten. He decided to become an exchange student because he wanted to experience a totally different lifestyle on the other side of the world. We all hope Torsten has an enjoyable stay in New Zealand.

The beginning of Term Two saw the arrival of two Australian exchange students at the school, Melyssa Price and Adam Sharpe.

The two students are being hosted by Grant Barnes and Tracey Duder who spent the first term of this year in Australia.

Melyssa is 16 and lives in Nelson Bay which is four hours north of Sydney. She decided to become an exchange student

because she wanted a change of life style and to experience something new.

The Rotary Twin Exchange Scheme was advertised at her school, she was interested in a challenge so decided to give it a go. It wasn't all that easy though. First she had to go through a series of interviews, which became harder as you progress into the final selection.

When asked "Is New Zealand all she expected it would be?", she replied "Yes, better than I expected and also alot colder". She finds school here very similar to school in Australia, the main difference being that Papakura

High is alot more straight-laced. From this exchange she believes she has gained better understanding of people and many friends, also a sore throat from chorus practice.

Melyssa recommends this opportunity to anyone interested in travelling and meeting people. The best thing she has done so far is meeting so many great people (not including Mr Bishop).

The hardest thing so far has been sitting in front of the 1200 students in assembly but the hardest moment is yet to come : speaking in front of 1200 people.

Adam Sharpe is 15 and lives in Swansea a suburb of Newcastle which is three hours North of Sydney. He became an exchange student because he wanted to visit and learn about another country

Adam went through a similar selection process to Melyssa, which included answering questions on general knowledge and how well he would represent

his country. New Zealand is better than what he expected and he really enjoyed his stay here.

School life at Papakura High is not much different than his school in Australia, but he does think that Papakura High School is very strict.

He recommends this exchange programme to anyone who is interested because he believes you learn alot about other

people and their lifestyles through participating in the scheme.

The best thing that he has gained so far is friendships, the hardest thing he has had to deal with so far is conflicting personalities.

Although he has occasionally felt homesick he has gained an experience of a lifetime.

A YEAR IN FRANCE

The question I get asked since I've returned from my year overseas is "So, Joanne, how was France??" A question that is not easily answered in the amount of time that the person asking generally has to spare! Nor in a magazine article, but I'll give it a go!

Nice is mainly a tourist city in the south-east corner of France, not far from the Italian border, and is amongst the more famous cities of Montecarlo, Cannes and St. Tropez. It is especially a very colourful city, as is most of the southern region of France, "la Provence". Closest to the shore the pebbly "beaches" of the Riviera, is the 'old village', a busy little network of narrow streets winding around the steep 'canyons' of old apartments painted in all the colours of the rainbow. Each window is decorated with it's colourful shutters, the odd flowerbox and inevitably the clothesrack with the daily washing dripping on any unsuspecting passer-by 3 floors below.

Just behind the old village 'wall' is the new city, which in winter is jam-packed with

old ladies in fur coats and with poodles and fox terriers, or in summer with hords of Americans and other tourists.

To the north of Nice is where my family lived, in a house fairly typical in style, three stories tall and very narrow. There were four of us at home, Maman and Papa, 19 year old Agnes, and myself. But it was a large family and all the others, Sophie and her fiance, Xavier and his wife and daughter, and the grandparents would often call in or come for lunch (the main meal) or just to spend a Sunday afternoon together. Neither parent worked, but rented out flats or garage space that they owned. They were both very involved in community groups, and helping at the church, being very religious catholics.

Agnes and I were in a 7th form class at "Lycee Parc Imperial", a school of 3100 students ranging in age from 11 or 12 to 20 or 21. The front building of the school was a very large elaborate white building, which until 1865 was an Imperial Hotel belonging to a Russian Tsar, Nicolas. After that it belonged to Alexandra III

who used to hold big festivals there. Then in 1933 for a big international exposition. Behind this first building which now houses the administration block, the canteen and the boarder's rooms, are two four storeyed blocks which is where all the classrooms are. Separating the three is a large concrete courtyard with trees set into it, and one end reserved as a mini "playing field". The school also has a gym and a concrete running track.

School starts at 8am every day including Saturday (!) and generally finishes at about 4 or 5 in the afternoon depending on your own timetable. There is no school on a Wednesday afternoon or a Saturday afternoon. Each period is an hour long and lunch is a two-hour break during which you can eat at the school cafeteria (although the students consider that to be a major health-risk) or you can go home for lunch. Lunch is the most important family meal and is usually four or five courses, sometimes taking as long as an hour or even more. 6th and 7th form classes are divided into sections depending

on what range of subjects you study. I was in T1A1 a literary class, our main subjects being philosophy (compulsory for all sections, but different amount of hours) and languages. History/Geography is also compulsory for all sections. My other subjects were Music and Nicois (an old dialect of Nice).

I found there was very little voluntary sporting or social activity, unlike New Zealand high schools, and although there were various clubs operating, there seemed to be very little interest in them.

The school system in France is tough, and a lot of pressure is put on the 7th form students especially, to pass their exams because it is difficult to get into university without them, let alone get a job.

During the year I travelled a fair bit along the southern part of France to Lyon in central France, to Paris, the alps, where I learned how to ski, to Germany for two weeks over Easter, and I also took a train across the border to Italy for a day. Everywhere I went, what always struck me the most was the different architecture,



and the sense of time and history that you feel, walking through towns and villages.

I was also lucky to be present at two very different weddings. One in the family, a very modern but intimate family wedding and the other a very traditional and 'proper' wedding for my penfriends sister.

My last two days in Paris with 100 other exchange students after very tearful goodbyes with my family, were during the French Bastille Day celebration. We saw the

very impressive military parade along the Champs Elysees boulevard, and there were fireworks and other festivities

A year had come to a close so quickly but it was the busiest and most active year of my life. I did so many new things, and learnt so much, and now I've got a travel bug to see the rest of the world. There's more than a lifetime of places to see and things to learn out there So what are you waiting for ???!!!

LIVING IN JAPAN

My 9 months in Japan started off at 6am on April 8th 1988. After trying to break through the language barrier I discovered I didn't have a students visa. Two officials from the Utsunomiya City Council, hurried us into a mini bus for the 3 hour trip to meet the Mayor.

Utsunomiya is the capital city of Tochigi Prefecture and is situated about 80km north of Tokyo. Utsunomiya is the sister city to Manukau. After meeting my host parents, lunching with the mayor, and giving interviews for several newspapers, I began to start life in Japan.

My house was basically westernised as far as things like toilets and kitchen tables go. Although my bedroom did have the traditional tatami floor, I slept not on a bed, but on 'futon'. A futon is a mattress which I had to take out of the cupboard each night and put away again in the morning. This meant the small room wasn't cluttered with a big bed.

All the windows of the house

had metal shutters which had to be closed at night and opened every morning, but as my bedroom was on the second floor, I was able to avoid doing this during the hot summer months.

Another difference in our house was the bathroom, which was completely filled with a bath about 2 feet wide by 2 feet and about 2 feet deep. The bath was filled with hot water and before you got into it you washed yourself completely with the shower hose beside it, because no soap was allowed in the bath.

Then I went to school. I was put in the first year at Utsunomiya Kita High School. There are 3 years and 8 classes in each year. I was the 48th person in the 3rd class of year one.

At first nobody in my class wanted to talk to me because they were too shy to use what little English they knew. Eventually I became friends with all the girls in my class, but the boys still don't talk to me.

In November, I was privileged enough to join the 2nd years on their week excursion down to Nara and Kyoto. As these students were in the same age group as myself it was easier for me to relate to them. I visited many of the beautiful shrines and temples that Japan is famous for. The 2nd year students showed me that not all Japanese are silent and studious. They had parties without asking the teachers permission, and showed me Utsunomiya after dark. (A great opportunity as my curfew was 6pm)

The whole nine months visit was an experience to remember, My host family was the nicest and kindest that one could ever hope to get. They took

their time to teach me all they possibly could about Japan, its cultures, language, and people. And the people at the City Hall were always willing to help and provide for me.

For example, whenever there was somewhere that I really wanted to visit they were always able to arrange it.

This article didn't even start to express the generosity and hospitality I recieved in Japan and the many new experiences I participated in. I suppose you have to go there to really understand the Japanese.

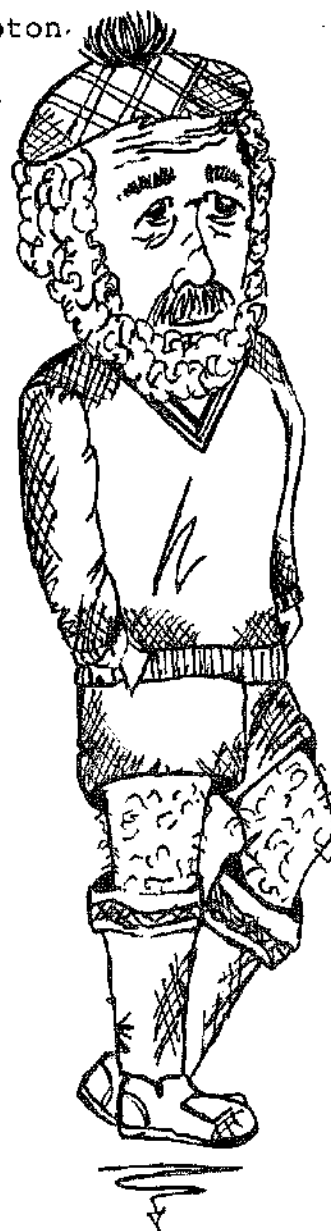

"Respect yourself, be yourself" was the theme of Papakura High Schools' play, when it opened Tuesday 9th August, setting a high standard for the rest of the shows.

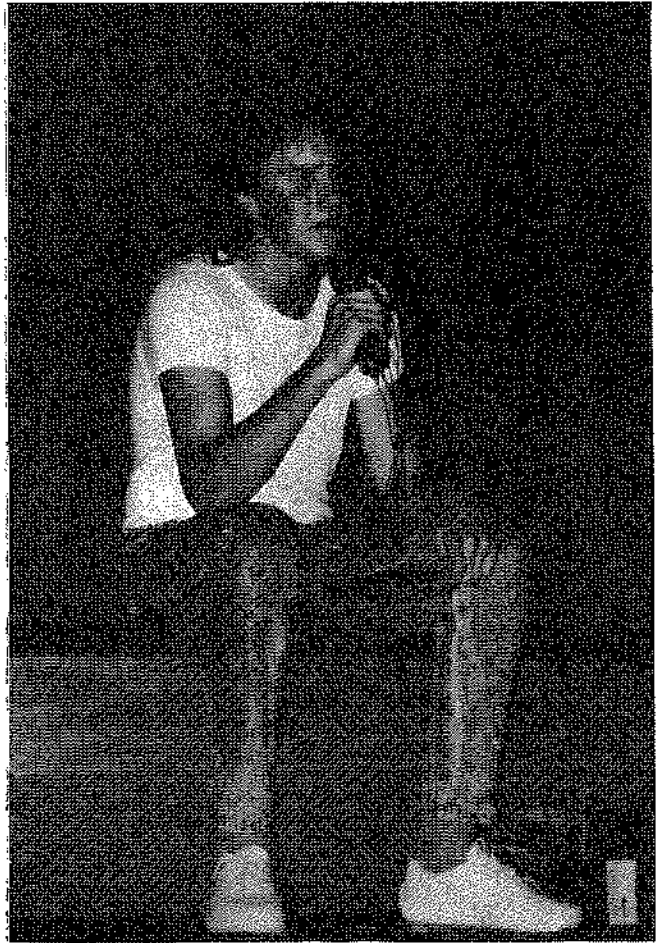

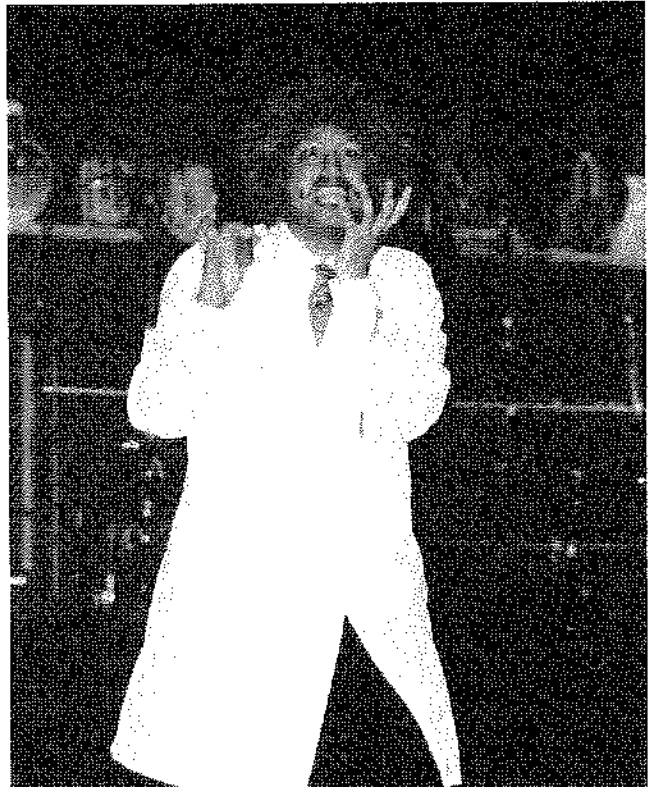


She transforms from a plain wrinkled spinster to a hot sizzling sex symbol, and captures her very own beast!

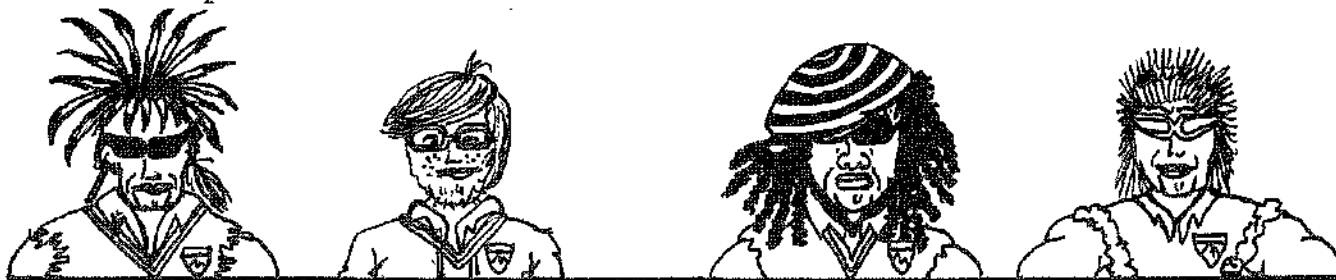
up and made beautiful, hair combed and all!

Later on that afternoon they all made their way to Miranda Hot Springs where they swam and ate sausages, coleslaw and chips.



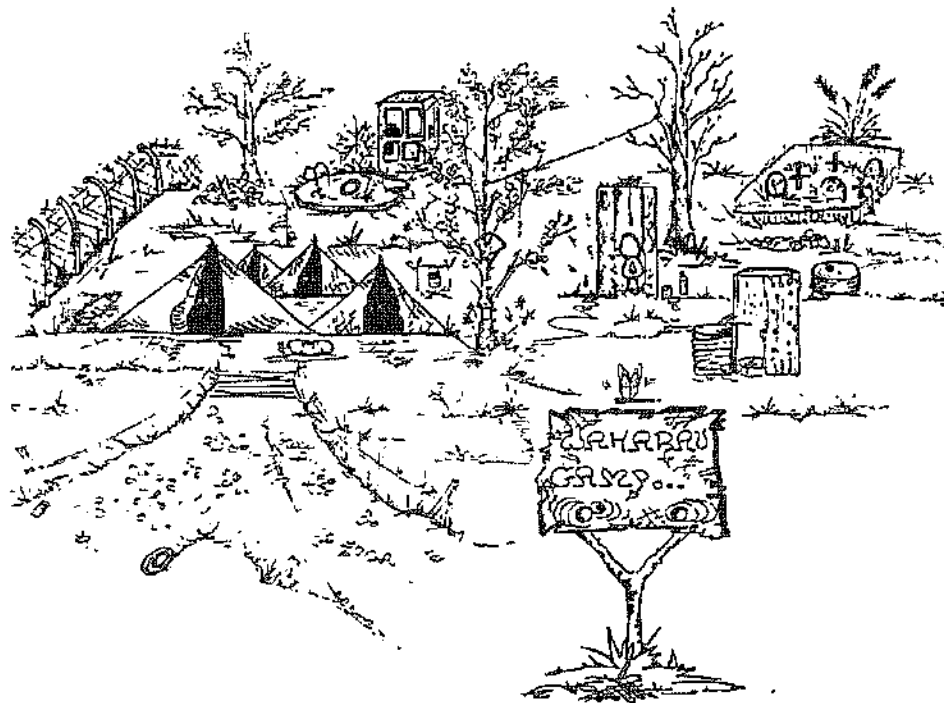
On Thursday, skipping was the activity for the morning. It was a shame though that Mrs James forgot that you were supposed to jump the rope, and ended up flat on her behind.

Angela Neale, Bruce Rogers, Angela Keen and Dale Matheson won special awards for outstanding achievements in sport. Achievement awards were presented to the following:

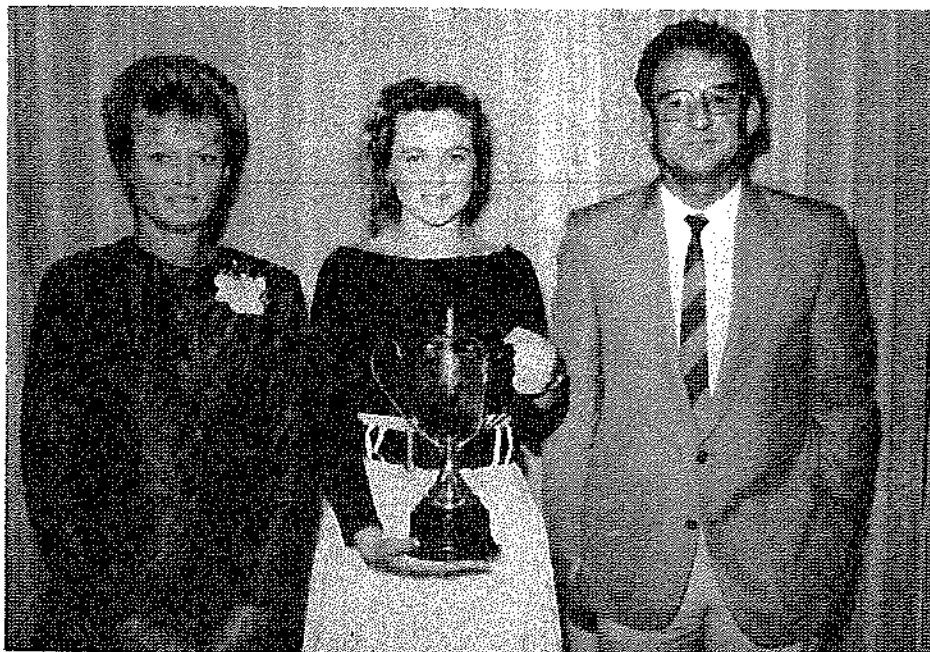

MATHEX COMPETITION

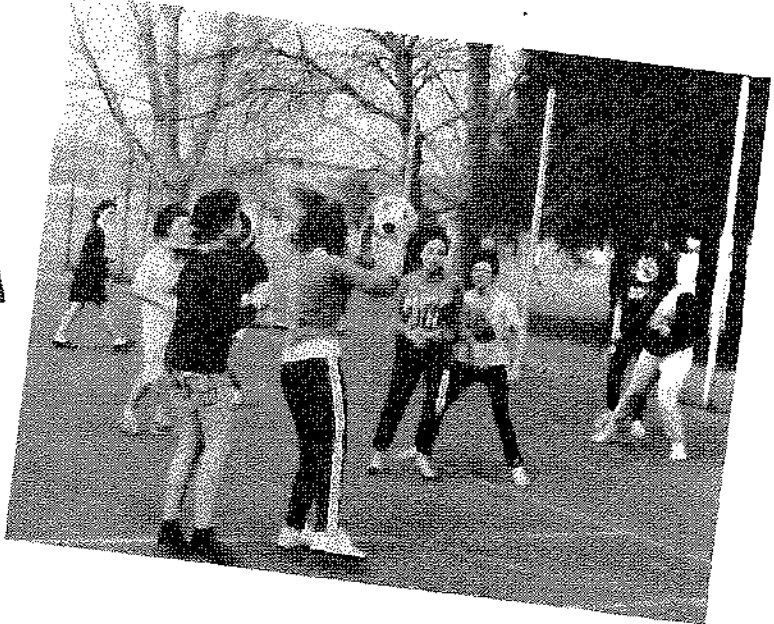

disease).

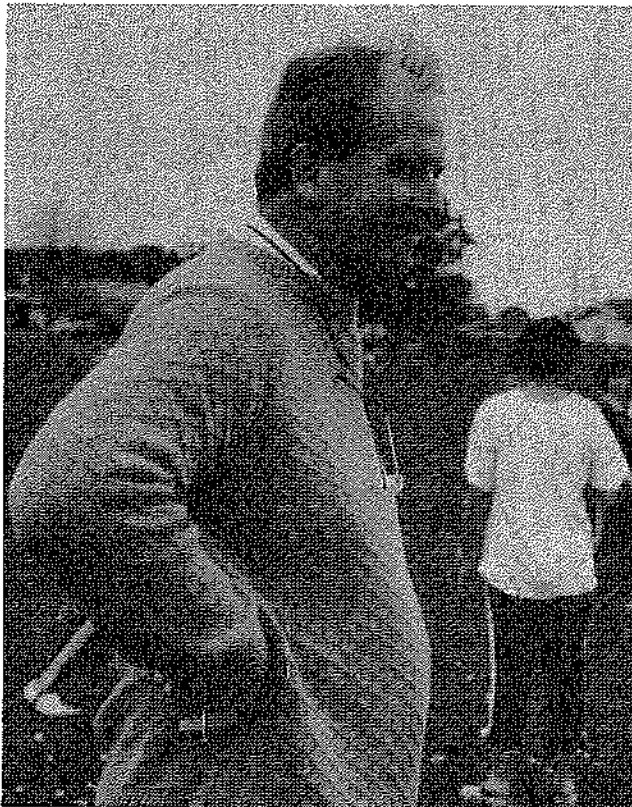

There is an interruption... The usual late person, he knows who he is, arrives and after exchanging "Good afternoon's", he is also allowed to join in the conversation.

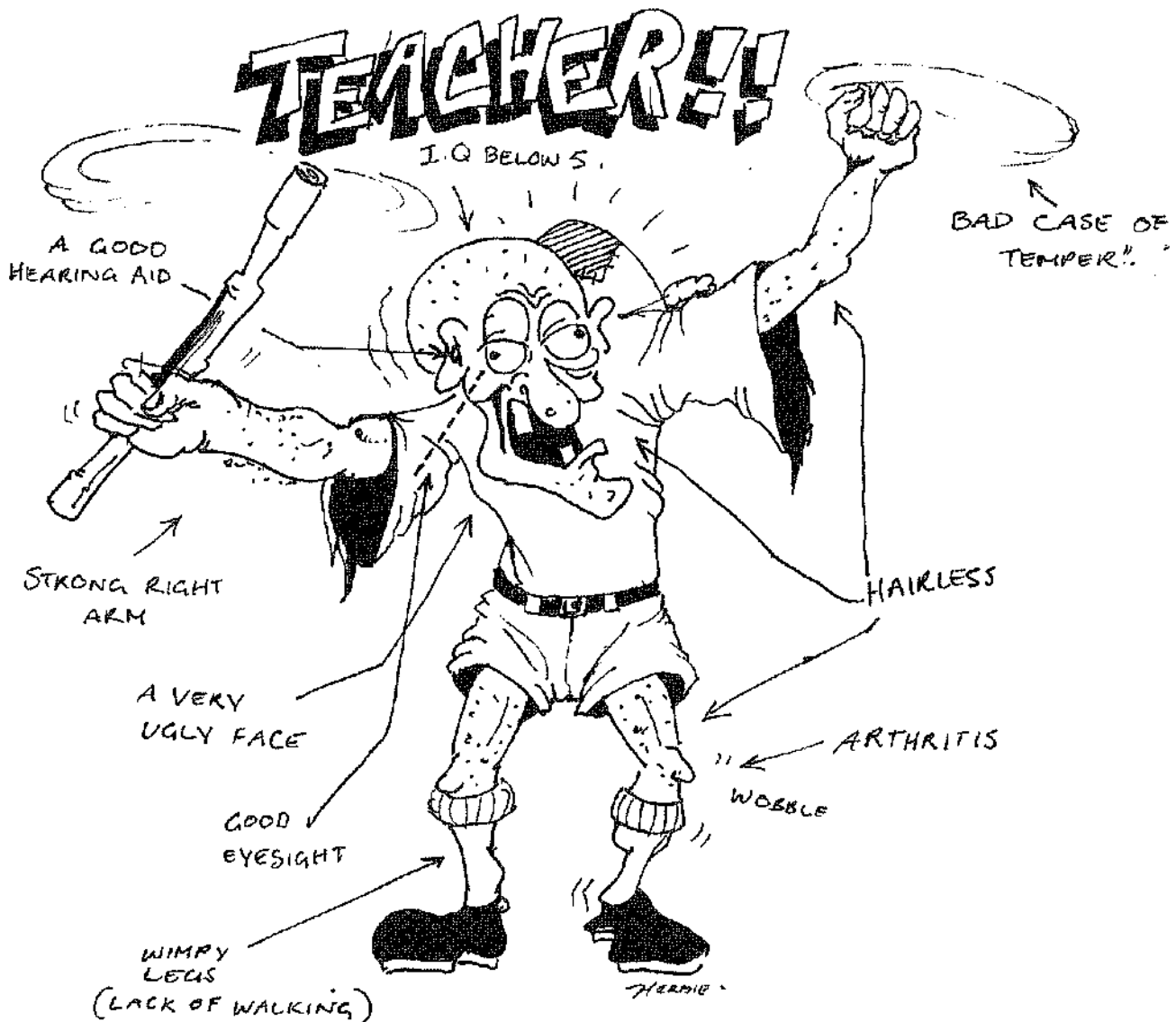

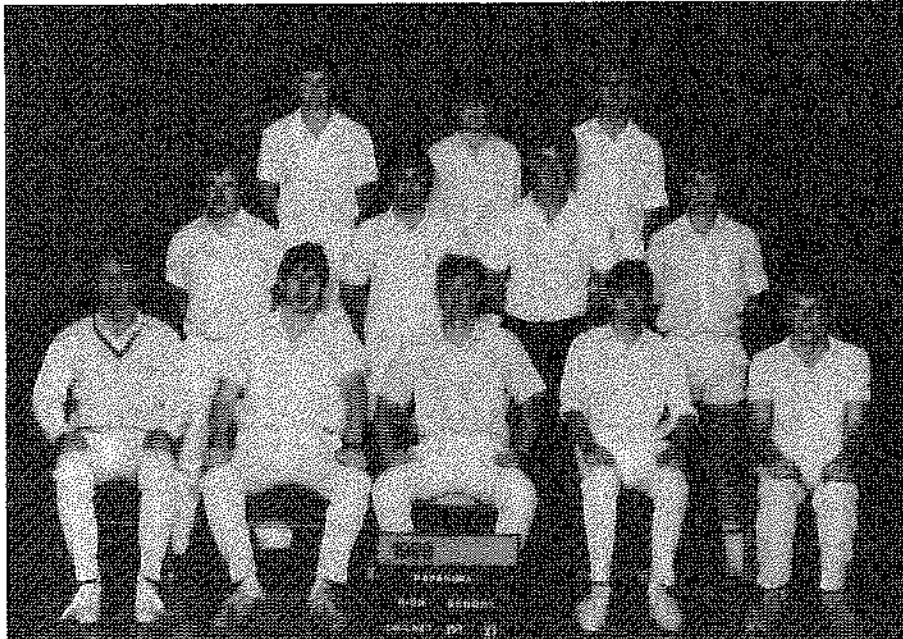
1st XI Cricket

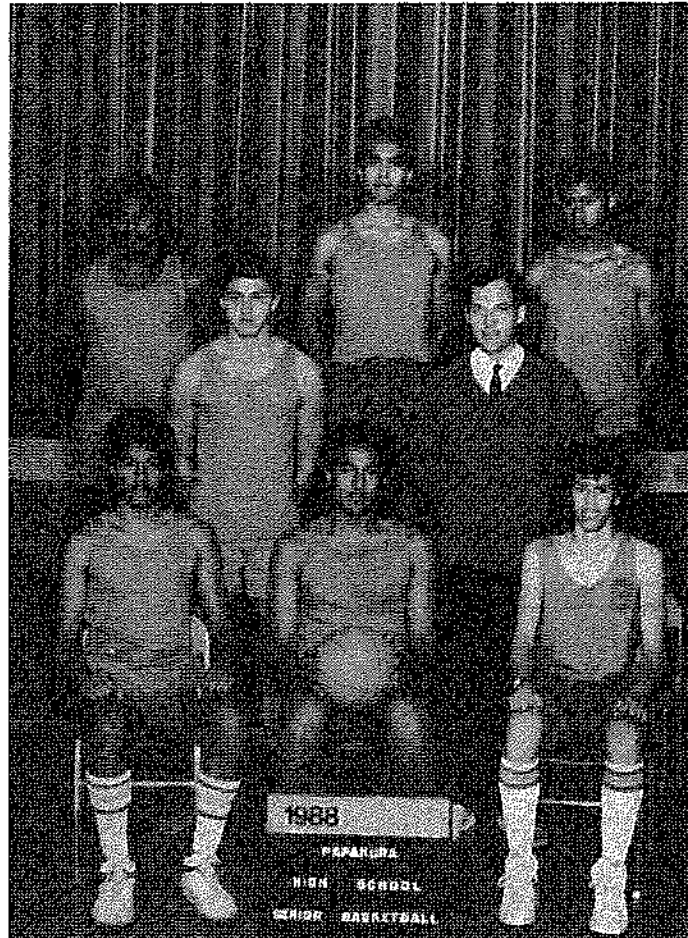

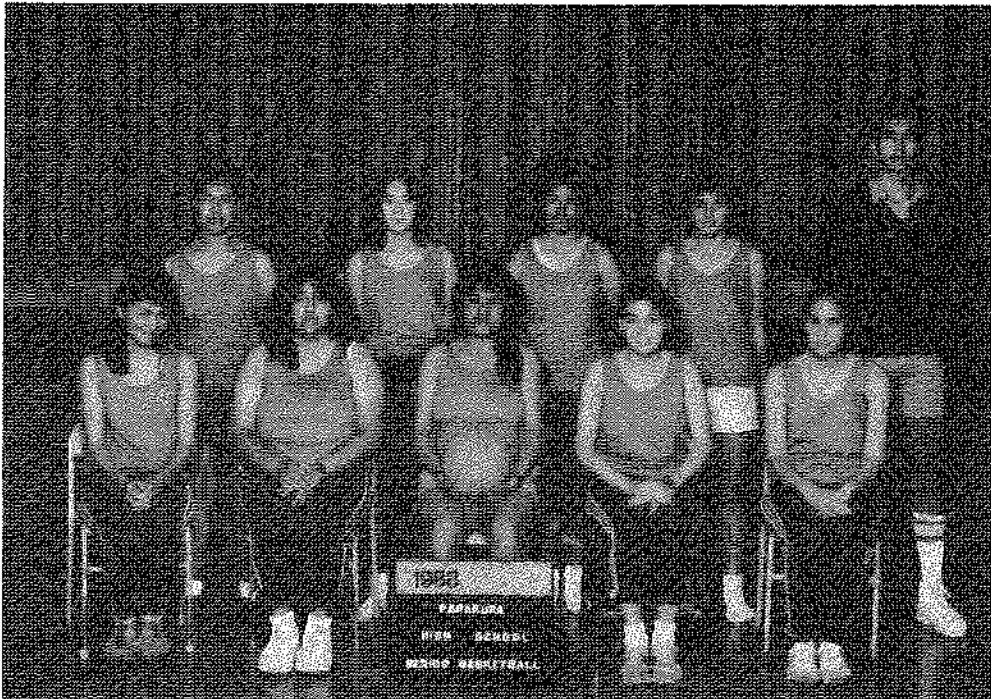

We started off the season with a 1-0 win over Otahuhu and finished the competition with a resounding 7-1 victory over James Cook. The cream on the cake was the 4-1 win

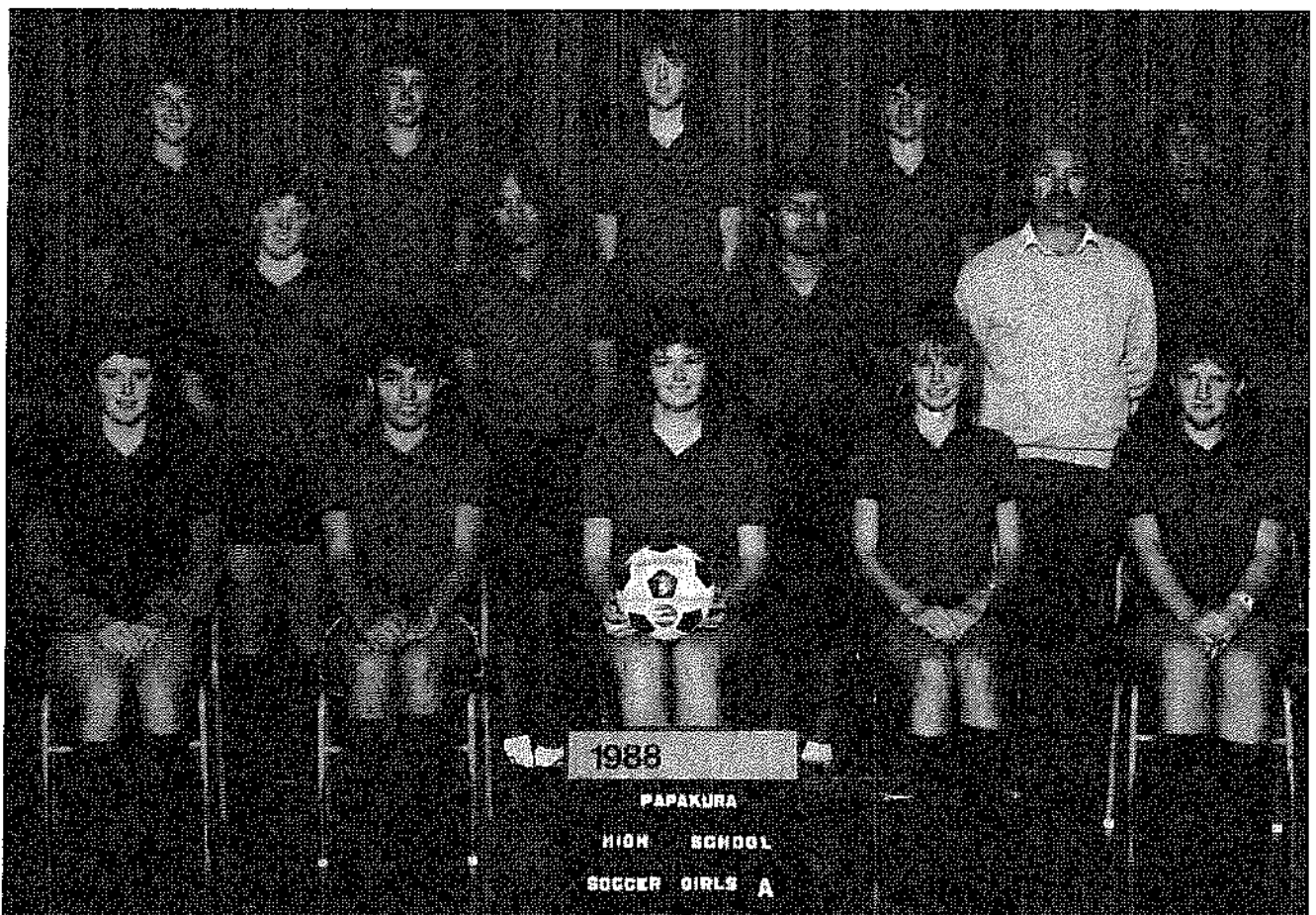
over Ngaruawahia in the end of season sports interchange.

We finally lost 4-8 but Mr Foster was extremely proud of everyone even the reserves who supported so well.

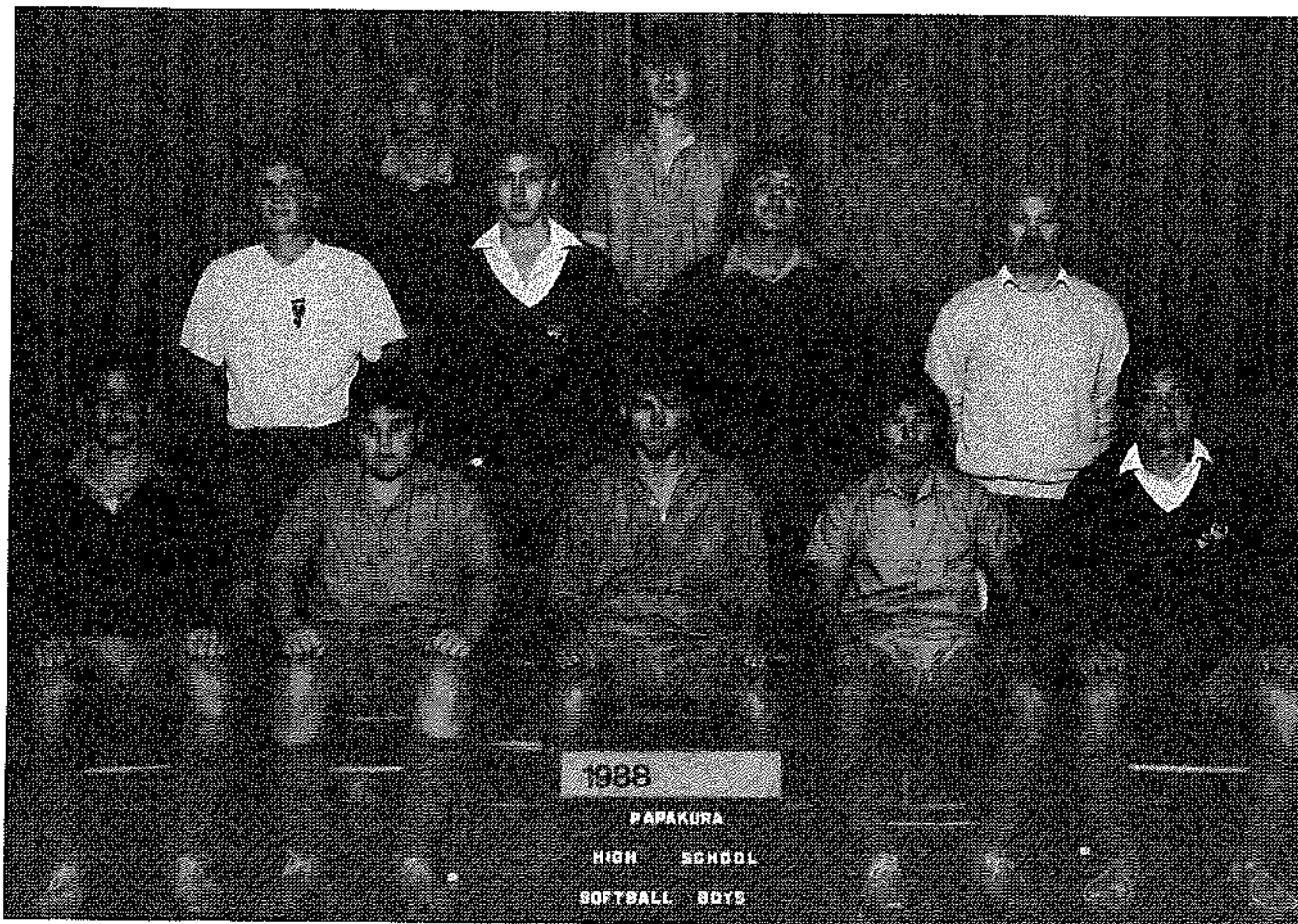

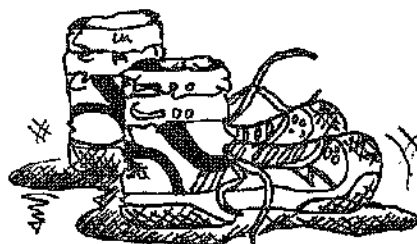

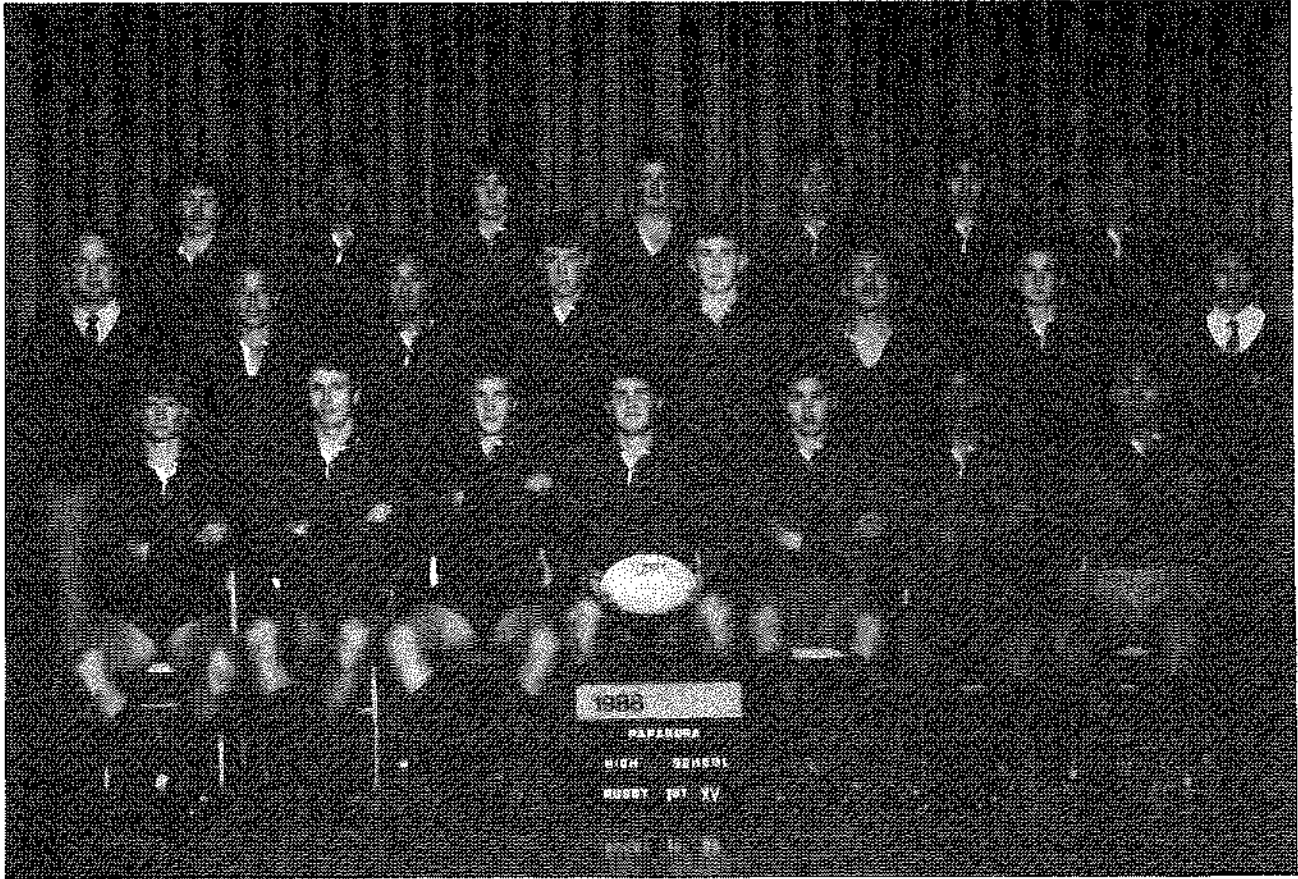
As the season progressed the team was let down by

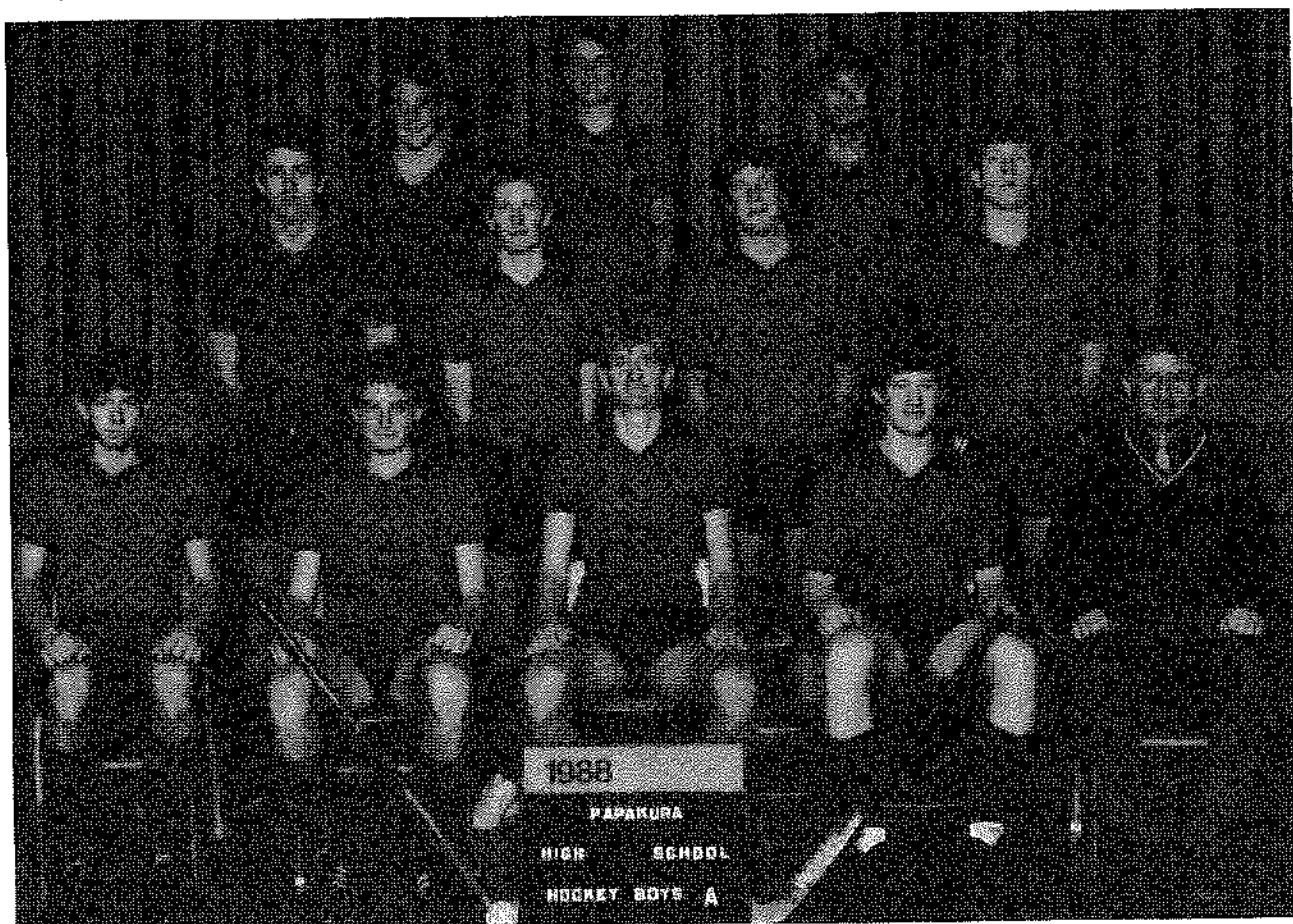

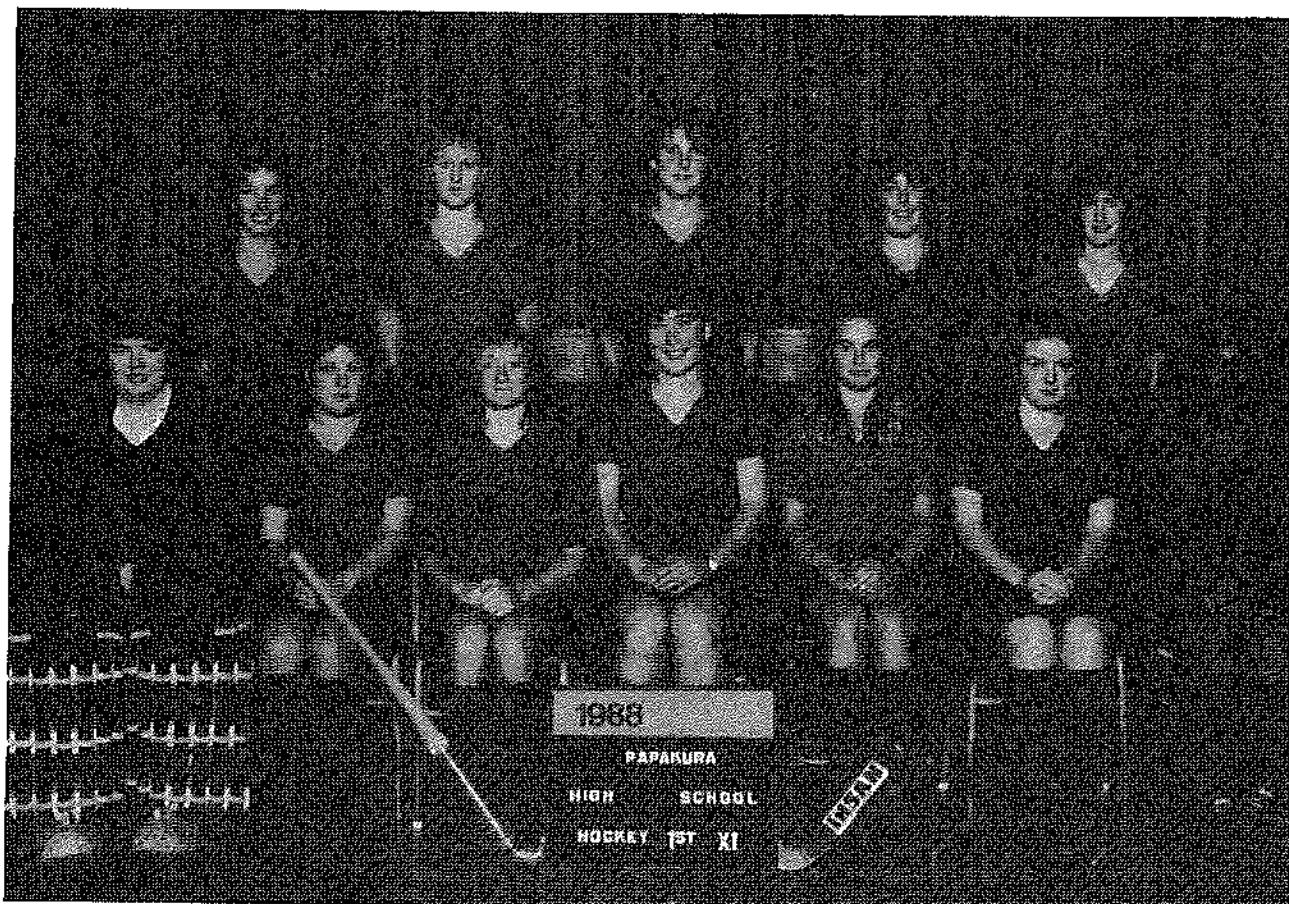
Despite being handicapped by a lack of regular intensive coaching, the Girls Hockey teams had a fairly successful season this year.

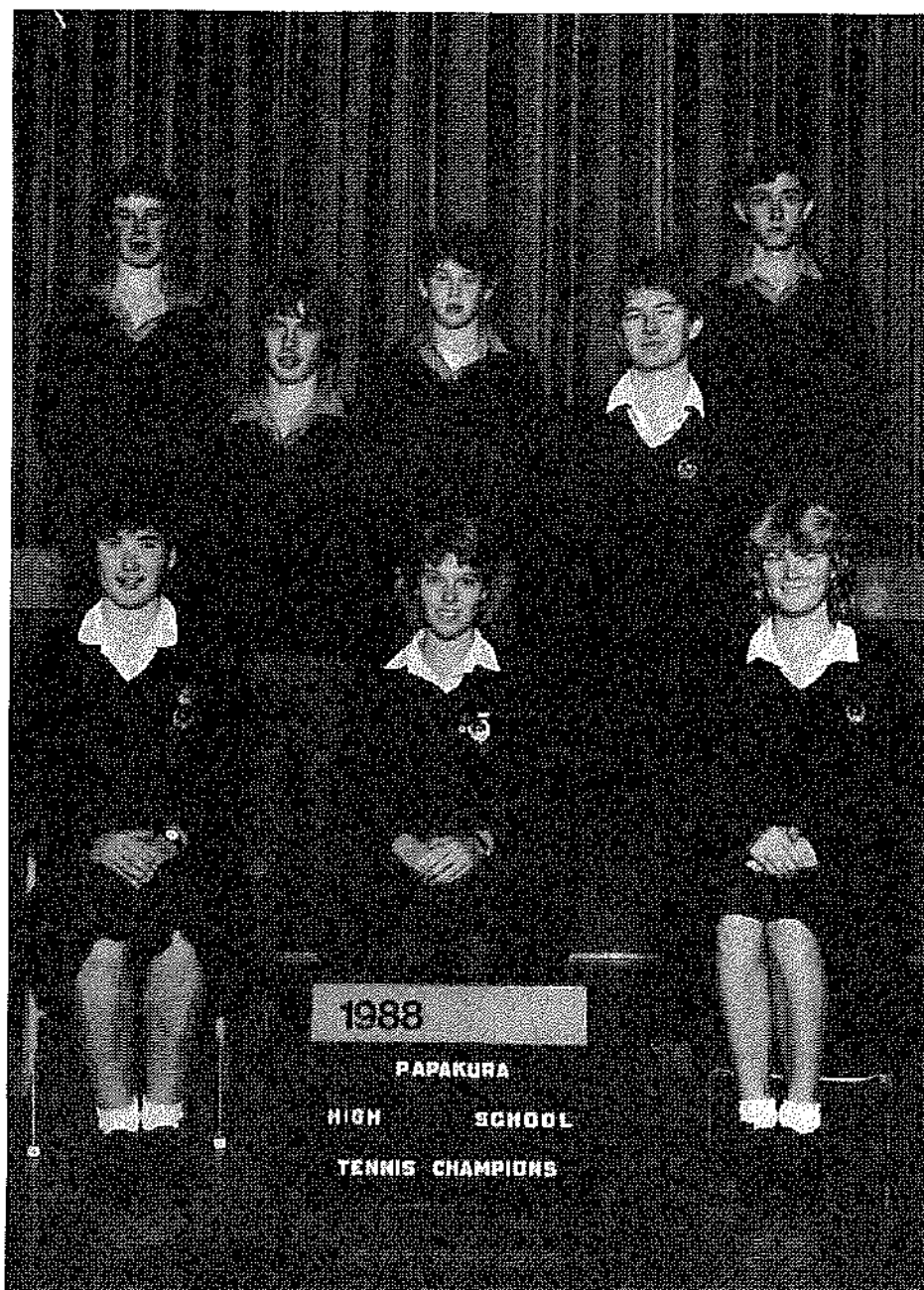

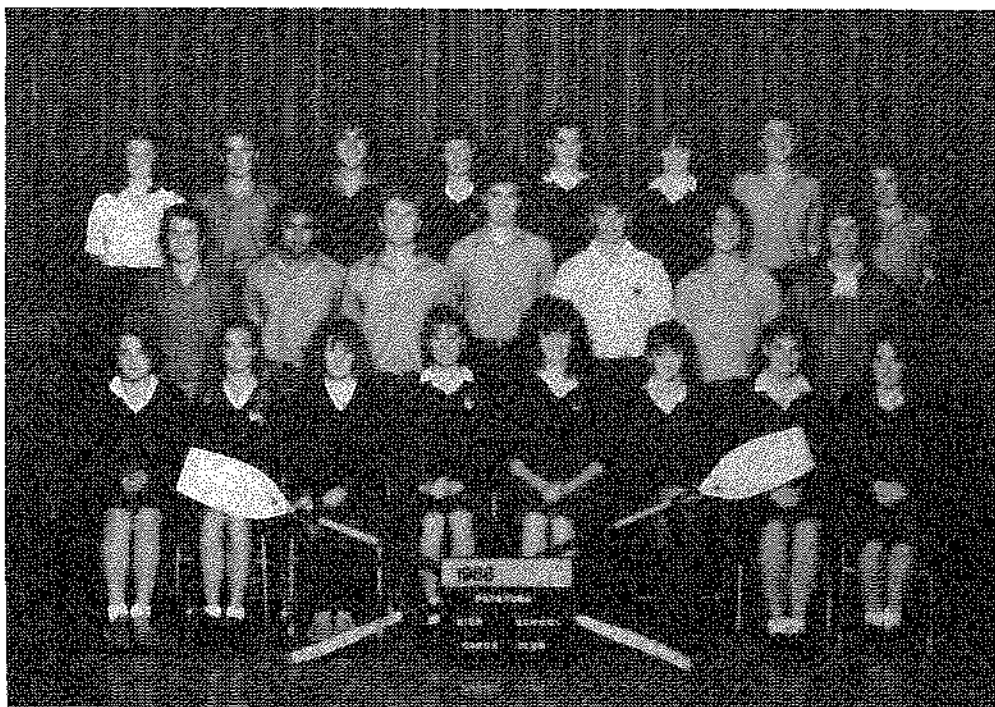

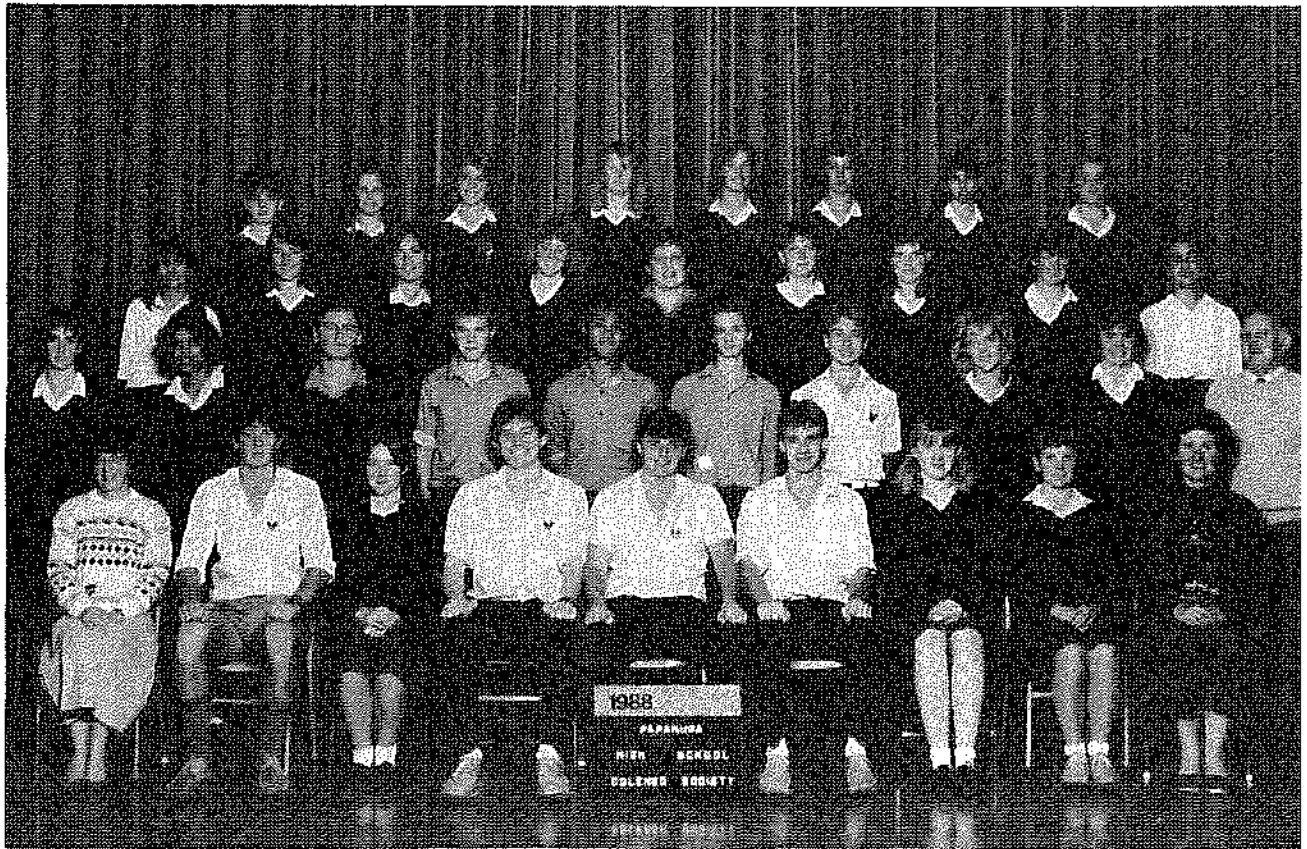

While not participating, the members used the opportunity to watch and learn from the other schools present.

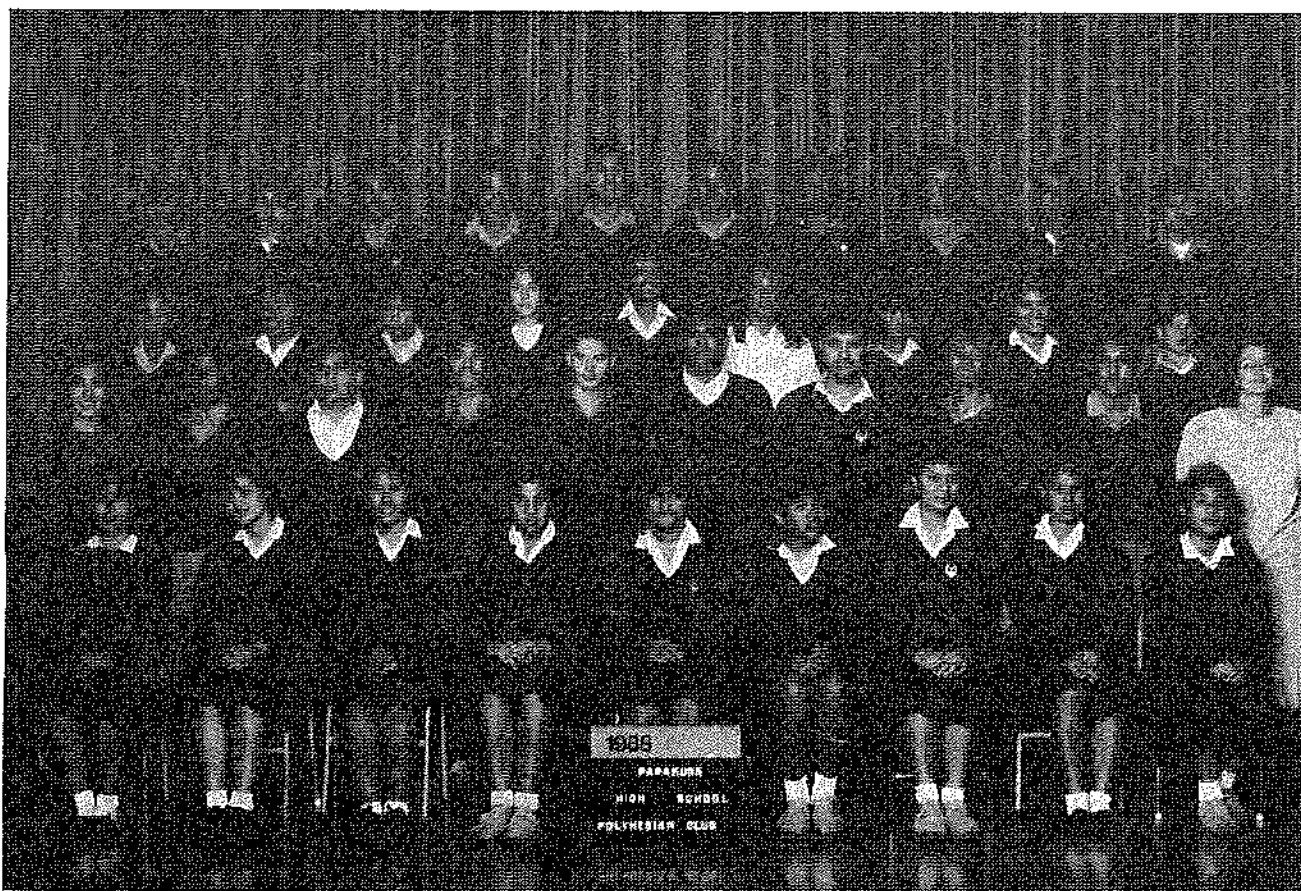

TRAMPING CLUB

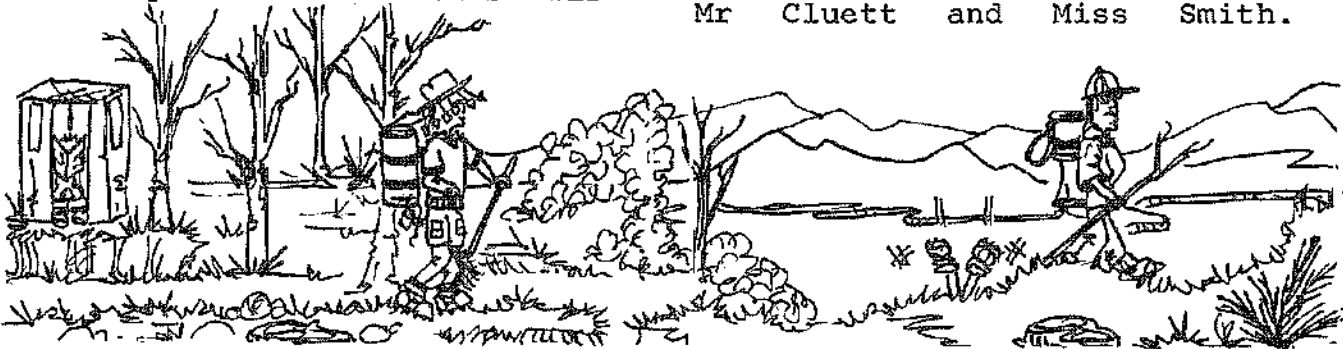
