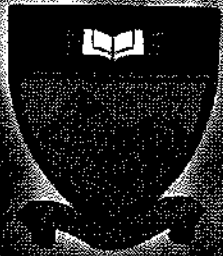

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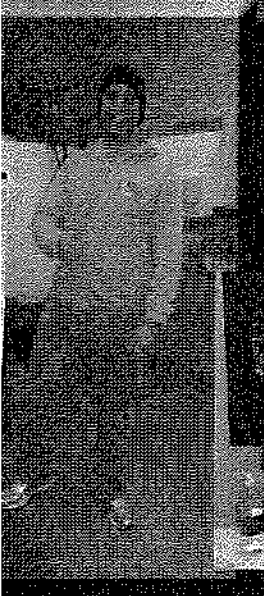
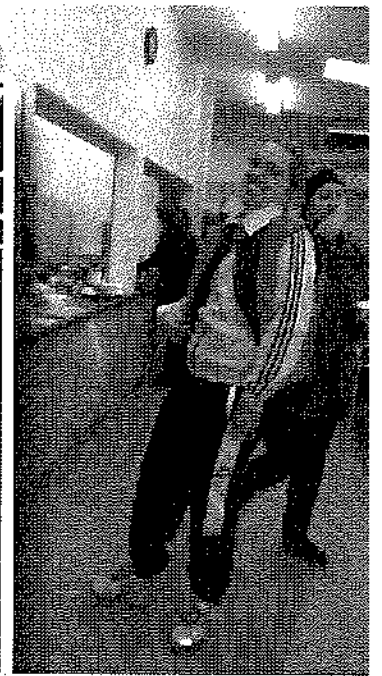

The past year has been a busy year for the Board as we continue putting systems and initiatives in place that will support the strategic outcomes set in the School Charter. We have been overwhelmed with the support from the community over the past year particularly from former students who have offered support, time, resources, funding, and their expertise in making the positive changes necessary to ensure that Papakura High is the school of choice for our families.

Time given by parents and staff to co-curricular activities such as sports, cultural activities, music, dance, kapahaka, art and holiday programmes, is very much appreciated by the Board. These are the activities that build a heart within the school and demonstrate to our students that people care and value them.

Strategic Direction

The Board has been focusing on two key strategic outcomes from our School Charter that will differentiate Papakura High School from other schools in Auckland, ensuring that our students have the best possible opportunity to transition smoothly into career pathways and employment, and that we have the most appropriate facility to deliver the outcomes of the School's Charter, and really get to the core of our school mission – "Personal achievement at the highest level" for each of our students.

Whakaheke te hurihuru, kareretemanu me whakahokimaitemanakite-whanau, Hapu, Iwi - "Adorn the bird with feathers so it can fly" is a very appropriate whakataurangi for this period of Papakura High's development as the school of choice for our families as we give our students the tools to realise their aspirations.

Vocational Focus – Pathways to Careers and Employment

New teaching pedagogies are being introduced in the Senior and Junior School to better support the learning needs and vocational aspirations of students. The Board and the Senior Leadership Team has been working with the local business community, tertiary education providers, industry training organisations and others over the past year on a vocational pathways based approach, supported by a strong careers development focus to pathway students into employment.

This process begins in Year 9 and 10 through the Poutama classes, where students begin their journey of self discovery, making informed decisions on their future prospects through a strong 'careers focus'. Students will be introduced to potential career opportunities and the learning pathways required to achieve their aims. In Year 11, 12 and 13 they choose the appropriate subjects and qualifications that ultimately, will pathway them into the vocation of their choice.

New Build Proposal

There is a truism in strategic planning that "form always follows function". Whether personal achievement for each of our students is in the field of academia, business, service, construction or primary industry the school needs to have the most appropriate form/build to allow for this change in pedagogy to take place.

Papakura High was built in 1953 and originally was a stand-by hospital. Papakura's history was as a military services based town with the Army in Takanini, the Airforce at Ardmore and Papakura High on standby as a hospital, but it was never utilised for that purpose.

Papakura High School has already been developing Inquiry Based Learning (IBL) using the Nelson Block (2 storey buildings) classrooms as learning commons for year 9 students to ease their transition from intermediate and primary schools. This whanau approach, where teachers come to the classrooms for teaching and learning rather than students moving around the school, helps students transition to the secondary curriculum. However, the current building's configuration limits the effective use of IBL due to the lack of break out spaces that offer passive surveillance.

The school's objective is to have a building structure which supports IBL and our vocational pathway approach as a 'whole of school' programme.

The Board has been working closely with the Ministry of Education and we hope that, in due course, progress will be possible in achieving a build of Papakura High that matches the pedagogy.

ERO Report 2011

The Education Review Office visited the school in May 2011 with the Confirmed Report being released in July 2011. The Report is available on the school website.

Key findings indicate that the school is making progress in a number of areas, but we still have a number of our students leave school without a qualification. This is the most significant challenge facing the school.

2011 has been a year of considerable challenges along with memorable successes. I wish to acknowledge all staff who have patiently got on with their job under trying circumstances at times, particularly during the Rugby World Cup. The school is not too far from its Everest.

Teaching is definitely something I always wanted to do. My parents inspired me and gave me all the knowledge and skills to be the best role model and the window through which many young people will see their future.

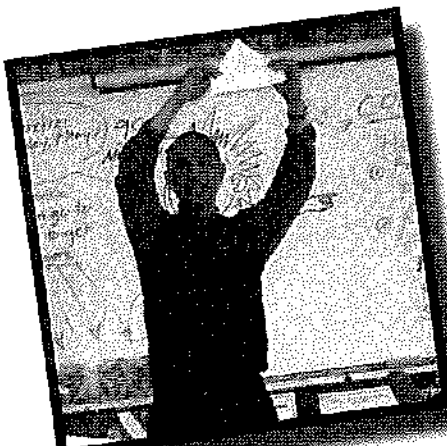

Papakura High School Library has been undergoing some significant changes this year and these will be ongoing through to 2012. 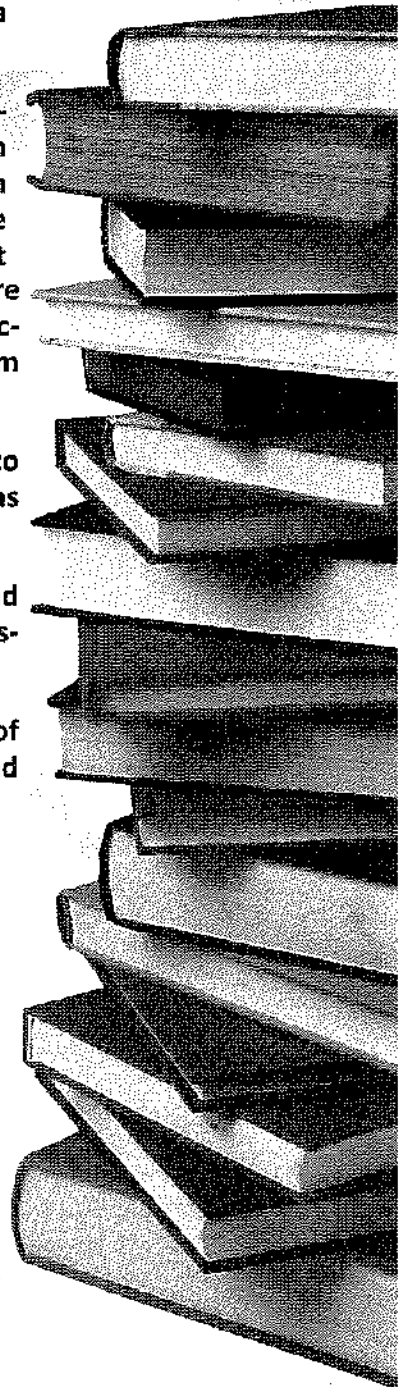
We are also looking at increasing the number of computers in the library from 9 to 12. This will make it easier when classes are in the library in terms of research as well as individual access during break times and after school.

THE XA UNIT & STUDENTS 2011

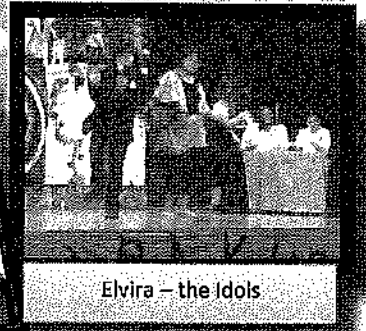

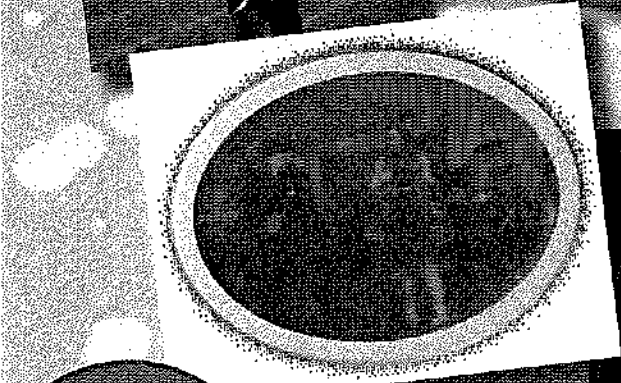

Each year we see many students who have studied hospitality leaving school and going on to do further study and work in this area. We were very proud to see many students go to MIT, AUT, modern apprenticeships and employment. In hospitality we always like to keep in touch with our past students and see how they are doing in the big wide world. It was great to see Alicia Doel represent MIT in the Torque D'Or competitions and win a silver medal. Te Pou Rihari is now doing his apprenticeship at Jet Park which was just awarded top restaurant at the Culinary Fare. Tony Jacobson and Reece Kepa were successful in gaining their Level 3 diploma in culinary arts at MIT and have now gone on to do Level 4. Charlton Brown was made Executive Chef at Hamurana Lodge, a boutique hotel which has just won top restaurant in Rotorua.

The outside catering business within the hospitality department has taken off with students catering for up to four functions a week. We were honoured to be selected to cater for the NZRL prize giving where the students had to cook and serve for nearly 450 people. Students are able to gain their credits using these opportunities and see what it is really like to work in the industry as opposed to a simulated environment.

Te Roopu Kakano

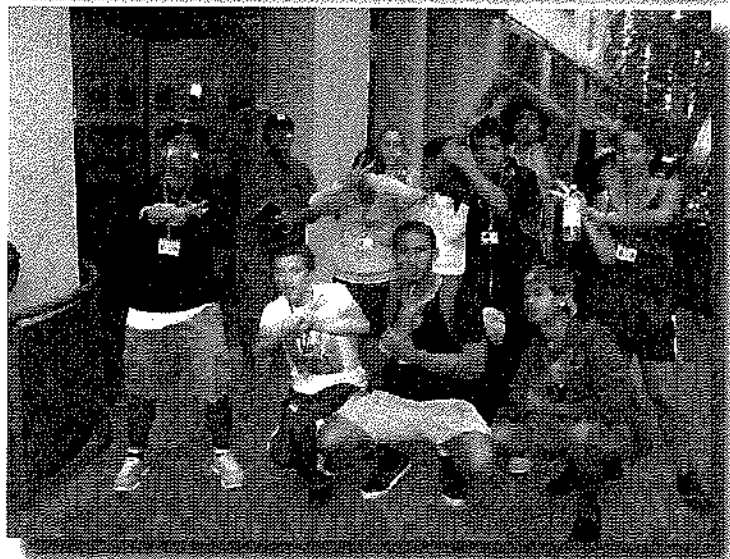

SENIOR BOYS BASKETBALL



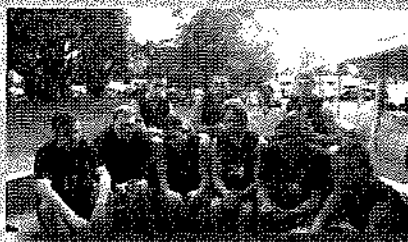

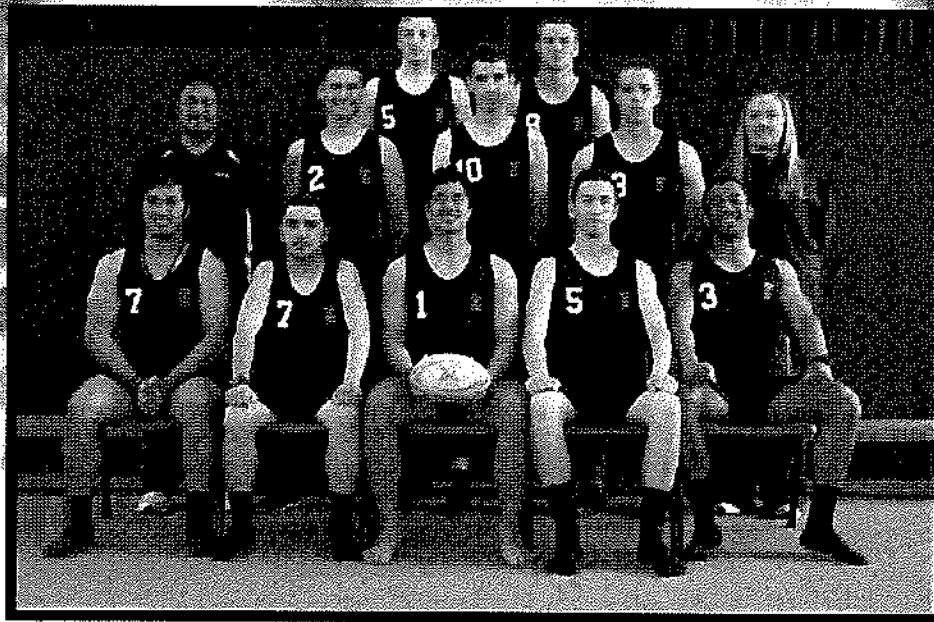
On behalf of both Boys and Girls Volleyball teams, I would like to thank:
