Co-curricular activities are the heart and soul of a school and our staff and volunteers have been outstanding. Our Arts Faculty entertained at the community fireworks night, they also ran competitions, drama performances and showcased at the Hawkins Theatre whilst our cultural groups have been outstanding at Polyfest and Fia Fia night.

Our school is 65% Maori, 23% Pasifika and 5% Indian and it was good to see both Samoan and Tongan groups at Polyfest as well as our kapa haka group. Our Indian students have

also done well and have been practising their written Hindi in after school classes. We have continued to encourage the development of cultural links and our Board in 2014 has reflected this with four Maori, one Pasifika and four European members. I would like to recognise here the hard work of the Board in supporting their school.

On an individual note Phoenix Pule'anga performed in Las Vegas at the world hip hop championships. Our XA unit has also been achieving NCEA credits this year as well as highlighting their talents both in school at our Country and Western Show and out of school with visits to care homes.

Academically our girls have been shining lights and they have set a challenge for our boys to meet. We have individual stars and we are pleased with what looks like significant improvements on last year's NCEA results. This is a testament to the hard work of all our staff, whether teaching or non-teaching personnel.

As a school we believe that the higher up the academic ladder a student climbs the further he or she can see in terms of achievement and opportunities. Therefore we want our students to attain tertiary education but realise that this can be in many different forms and times. While many of our students will go to University or Polytechnic in the next three years, others may wait longer and gain experience in employment. There is not a wrong way, or a right way, just the

way that suits the child and their aspirations.

We work with the Marae and parents groups to support our Maori students as well as our Pasifika through parents' Hui and fono. I thank all those caregivers involved in supporting these groups for their time and commitment to our children. We are a low decile community which reflects the challenges students may have in prioritising school. Our students are choosing education as a way forward into their future and I commend them for this.

This years' prefects have been young men and women who have shown an immense commitment to the school, organising blood drives, fund raising for charities and a plethora of events. They have learnt skills which will put them in good stead in their future pathways.

I would also like to commend the 2015 prefects and look forward to their role modelling next year.

At the back of our hall we have 60 years' worth of prefects' photographs. We had the privilege of welcoming many of the original students of 1954 back in March. This was a humbling event to meet the many students who were here when the school was built for \$200,000. Sixty years later our prospective rebuild has a price tag 200 times bigger!

Leaving us at the end of the year are many talented teachers and several support staff. I wish to acknowledge;
















Senior Boys Football 2014

Shane Anand did his best in goal with no experience at all. Brandon Walden showed adaptability by moving into a midfield position from defence and then scoring two goals.


The biggest win was 8-0 over Edgewater College. The most exciting games were a 4-4 draw with Manurewa and a 3-4 loss to Pukekohe.

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College Sport: Papakura rule with few resources

The Papakura High School Girls' Under 19 basketball team are a shining example of triumph over adversity. They won the Counties Manukau girls' Under 19 grade this season, reeling off 11 wins in a row - usually with just six players to choose from.

urthermore, they generally trained as a team only on Monday afternoons ahead of their Tuesday night games. But they played it smart tactically, slowing the game down, staying clear of foul trouble, and ultimately coming up trumps.

Now, they are eyeing a competitive 2015 season in the Counties Manukau open grade, where they will come up against more seasoned, taller opponents from bigger schools.

The spine of the team was captain Kisa Malakai (the only year 13 student), Reaghan-Anne Hura and Rachael Harris. They had tasted rep basketball and brought nous and skill.

The others lifted to try to reach their standard.

Harris, a gifted shooter in her own right, believes the side can perform in the higher grade next season.

"It'll be a great opportunity for us to play harder teams and see where we stand. I think we'll do all right," she said in understated fashion.

Aorere College was their toughest opposition, she felt, and Papakura won both games against them, 35-25 and 49-36 to seal the championship. No side got within seven of them, even though most ran full or longer benches.

Centre Malakai was a top rebounder who seldom missed a lay-up. She was the glue for this tight group.

Coach Abraham Warren was assisted by Papakura High Sports Co-ordinator Kieran Gutry.

"It was hard to see the other teams have so many subs and we had only one, so it was about trying to keep the girls safe so they wouldn't get tired. They were tired, but stubborn, and didn't want to leave the floor. But they did well," said Warren.

Some of the motivation for the team came from the sudden death of Papakura year 10 student Sione Nau, a student of Warren's. They wore black armbands in his honour.

The experienced trio of Malakai, Smith and Hura was vital, but they also brought the requisite aggression against taller, harder opponents.

"I've got a couple of girls here who are gentle. Sometimes the coach would yell at them and tell them to get their heads in the game. But I see that as my role, to keep encouraging the girls," added Warren.

"I trained the girls, as soon as they were in the key, never mind bouncing the ball, just shoot and focus on the backboard." Those tactics paid dividends, and there was some hot scoring, notably in the 61-14 crushing of St Kentigern College.

Warren knows what is required for Papakura to be competitive next year with the big guns of Counties Manukau schoolgirl basketball.

"It's going to take a bit more work. Obviously other teams will take note, so they use their height, weight and aggression against us. If I can get my girls to regularly come to training, we'll give them a run for their money. It would be nice, though, to have more height." And more players.

Hura would often bring the ball up the floor. She said there was not necessarily a staunch commitment to win the competition at the start of the season from what appears to be a laidback side, especially with the lack of depth. "We just wanted to get the best out of how we wanted to play. To come out on top was quite a surprise."

What a year for Outdoor Education! This year saw the addition of a year 13 class alongside the continuation of the year 12 course from last year. Each class was put through their paces, experiencing one challenging but exciting trip after another. This year students were able to experience camping, tramping, rock climbing, sea kayaking, orienteering and the year 13's had to endure a survival camp. The first overnight camp for the year 12 class really pushed all of the students to their limits, completing a 16km walk in one day. There were high points and low points to this first camp, and all students really had to



dig deep in order to keep not only themselves going, but also their peers. They were almost ready to leave the teacher behind, but just when we thought we would never make it, there were cries and whoops of joy as the head of the group let all of us know we had finally made it. I think we set the record for setting up camp and getting dinner cooked, needless to say there were some really tired



students and teachers alike. The last trip of the year was a bit more relaxing, but it also still had its own unforeseen challenges. We ventured up to Mahurangi Regional Park on a day where the weather was not on our side. Students were undeterred as it became a competition as to who would return first to the finish having found all the markers and have bragging rights as the best team. Off they went, unsteady at first with all heading off in the wrong direction, but calm heads prevailed and the maps were looked at and they were soon all on track. All three groups spent more time slipping and sliding their way along the course than they did on their feet, but they all had a blast as they could

The year 13 course was also challenging, instead of doing a single night camping they had to tramp for up to three days and camp out for two nights. This first three day camp had to be cut short, unfortunately due to poor weather. But the second three day camp was amazing; we had the perfect weather and came across the most stunning views. This camp took us out into the Waitakere Ranges where we climbed up above Piha and completed a 13km trek before we reached out final campsite. We had a few injuries, and had to really push to get through



some tough parts but the group came together and supported each other in order to get to camp on



time. At the campsite there was a welcome stream for everyone to have a swim in as well as ease some aching muscles.

Our final trip was going to be interesting as it was all based around surviving in the bush if stranded. So we arrived at the campsite at Waharau where everyone piled out of the vans, with the first objective being to find a place to sleep for the night in a group; so three groups ventured out in to the campground in search of a comfortable looking patch of ground on which to build their shelters for the night. Once they found a spot, each group was given a $1.2 \,\mathrm{m} \times 1.8 \,\mathrm{m}$ tarpaulin and $10 \,\mathrm{m}$

of rope to help with the construction of their sleeping quarters; to ensure they stayed warm they all needed to find natural materials for bedding and to act as walls or windbreaks. The girls (Tamanya, Ngaro, Laekin, Camille, Ngamira and Destiny) by far made the best shelter – it actually looked like a hut and had a door and everything! The boys, well lets just say their shelters left a lot to be desired, but I will give them credit as they kept them dry and warm in the end, so their monstrous constructions somehow worked. Next on the list was for everyone to build and light a fire, some

were awesome and really took off, others well lets just say they were named the 'Bogan Fire' and there were a few. Some students did manage to get the art of building and keeping a fire going with kudos going to Tevita who earned his fire badge. 
noose snare, but she also managed to set a working spring snare, which looked awesome!!
