


#### **Business Challenge**


The 3 day Business Challenge was held in the hall from 16-18 September. It was presented by Mark Douglas of Vision Training Ltd. and kindly sponsored by Maori Women's Development Inc. Year 12 and 13 students participated in business teams where they had to invent an innovative product or service and they learnt the skills required to get their product or service to the marketplace. Each team member had responsibility for an individual aspect of the business such as leader, research, production, sales and marketing and finance. These areas all came together when a Business Plan was created detailing all the aspects needed to start up the business for real.


There were 5 teams, all of which came up with great ideas and did the school proud with their effort and attitude. On the third day the teams had to present their ideas and Business Plan to judges made up of business leaders from the local community. The judges were highly impressed by the teams presentations and the scoring was very close with the winning team, Electro-sonic lnc. winning by just I point. Electro-sonic's idea was to develop a handheld, magnetic USB charger. This tournament took place in the Diocesan school hall, and walking in we could feel a strong sense of the schools' long heritage. Although our team tried to be friendly, not a



the early afternoon.


n that first afternoon, we walked to

experience. The following day, we got up at



n the last week of Term I we were lucky to have a travelling exhibition visit our school from the Te Tuhi Gallery in Pakuranga. 'The Maldives Exodus Caravan Show' highlights the catastrophic effect rising sea levels will have on the Maldives and the serious need for government to plan for the future. The Maldives sit below India on the world map, and they are the flattest islands in the world, approximately I.8m above sea level followed closely by Tuvalu in the Pacific.

Featuring an international selection of over 30 artists, the Maldives Exodus Caravan Show is a mobile exhibition that acts to promote environmental and political awareness. Works included range widely from art, music, to video and from performance to games.

The caravan had approximately 90 students through during the day, using art to help raise students awareness of the effects of global warming and the rising sea levels.


