# Classroom Activities

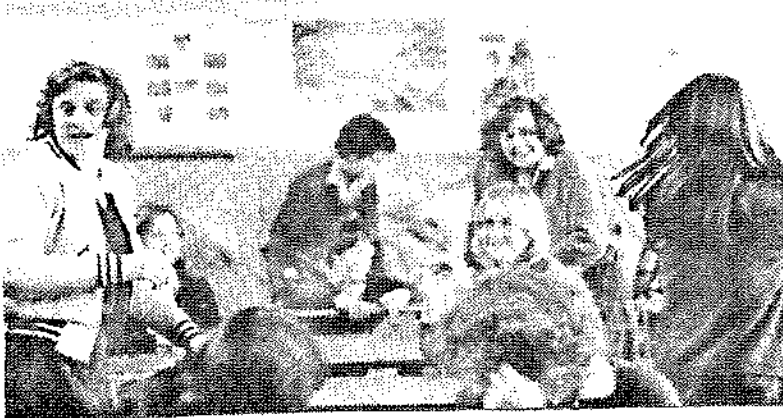


During the course of the year our magazine elective visited many classrooms around the school.

Needless to say, we had many strange encounters of the third kind. Our main task was to disprove the vicious rumour that some pupils were actually WORKING !!!

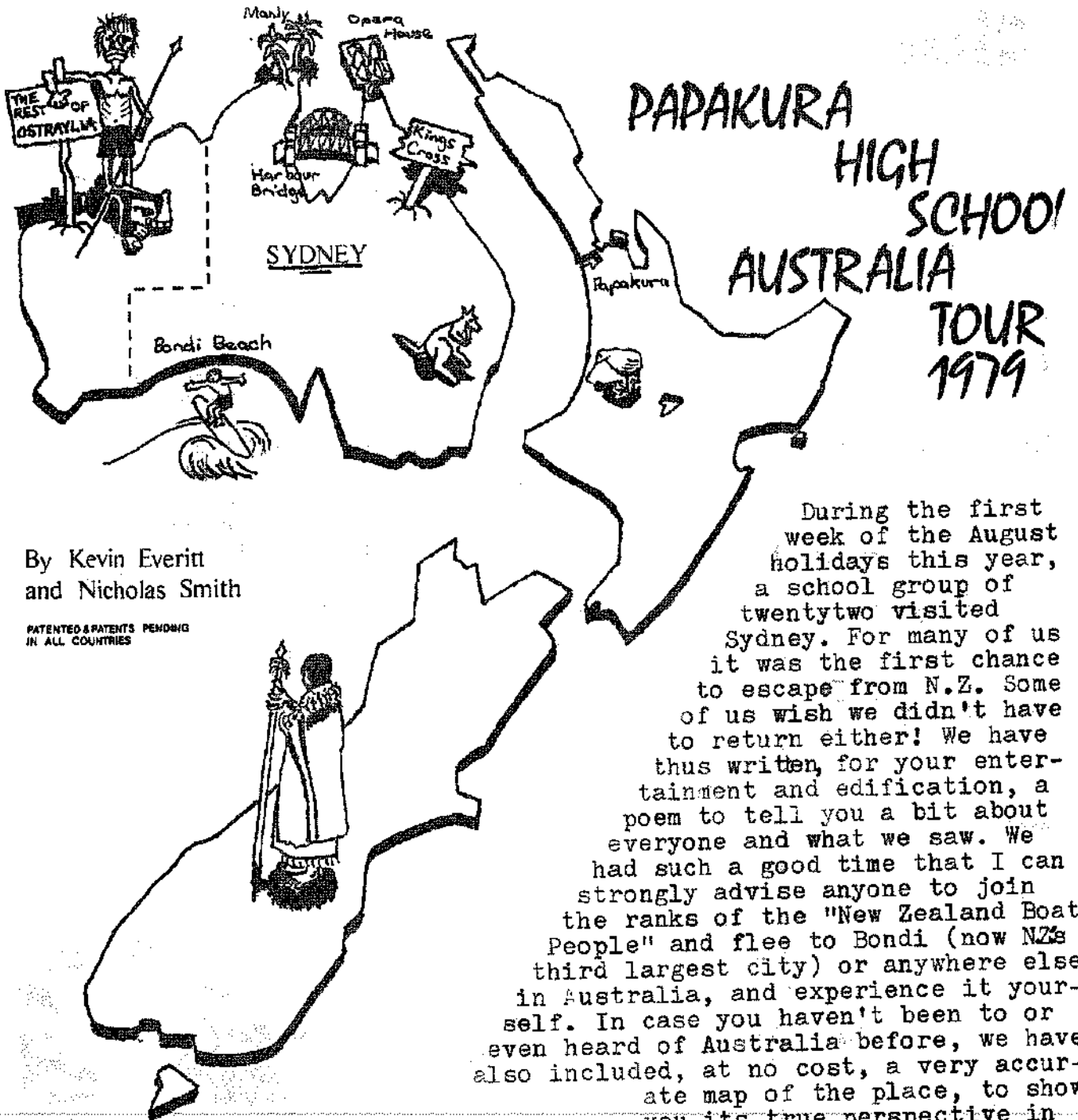

# I NEED YOUR HELP !!!

I decided it was time to talk some sense into him. I confronted him in the corridor between S Wing and the office. He wouldn't listen to me, and kept on saying "It's my life! Get the hell out of it." I finally lost my temper and slammed him into the wall and used the only language he seemed to understand:

"Don't do this to me, man, don't do this to me!" I spat those words out at him and then, without knowing why, I started punching him. I think if it hadn't been for Mr Bryant stopping me, I would have killed him. I was covered in his blood and still in a trance when my welfare officer appeared and tried to ask me what had happened. It was no use trying to explain it all to them, because they never understand anything anyway.

I forced myself to forget about Mike and threw myself into my schoolwork. I passed S.C. in three subjects and was able to go into the sixth form and decided to study law, if I got through the sixth form. It was hard work - but I didn't have Mike to distract me. He failed and dropped out of school and joined a Gang - so I heard. I didn't see Mike for seven years; I only heard about him from other people. During those seven years I attended law school and obtained a degree in criminal law, and after a year of working in a law office I started my own practice. It was highly successful and I really started to do well, financially that is. Life was good and business was good. Then one day my secretary came into my office with a nuzzled look, followed by a man wearing ripped up clothes and looking a right mess. She didn't know what to do, as this man had just demanded to see me. I told him to take a seat and asked his name. It was Mike. He said the police were after him, and asked if I would help him.

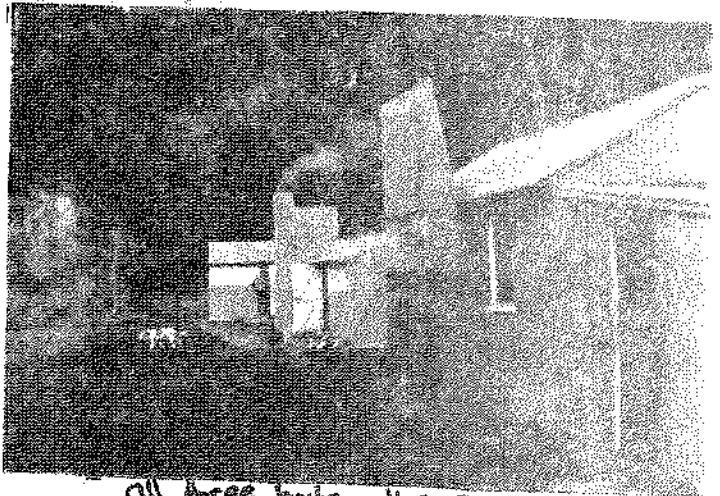
I helped Mike win his case in court, and after the hearing was over Mike turned to me and said, "You have to help me, man; I need your help."

Whatever aims or objectives are strived for at Okui, however, the most important and successful is that of learning to trying to cope with different people in a confined environment.



# SCHOOL COUNCIL

At this year's senior camp at Hunua the idea of a School Council was floated. After Mr Bryant had investigated the idea and produced a report for discussion by both the staff and students, the first meeting was held in July.

The Council does not take the place of the Prefect system but operates alongside it. Indeed, both have different functions. The main aims of the Council are:

- (a) to help pupils representing various parts of the school to participate in making decisions which affect them
- (b) to provide opportunity for individual leadership; and to improve communications between the senior and junior school.

One proposal which will be implemented in 1980 is that of senior 'guides' - prefects having pastoral oversight of each third and fourth form.

The total number on Council is twenty-three, composed of fourteen pupils selected on a proportional representation basis according to the numbers at each form level; the four Head Prefects; and the five convenors of the school committees. In addition the Deputy Principal and/or a senior staff member is in attendance.

All were democratically elected.

As well as hearing reports from the school committees the following matters have been discussed and are under investigation and action (only two meetings so far):-

- \* the varying of assembly format and type i.e. items, number per week ...
- \* the provision of more rubbish tins
- \* school socials
- \* the desire to do something with the mushroom table outside the AV block
- \* the need for another bell among the prefabs.
- \* sweatshirts with a school design for use after school and in the weekends
- \* canteen supervision

The Council has made a good start. Let's hope it really blossoms in 1980.

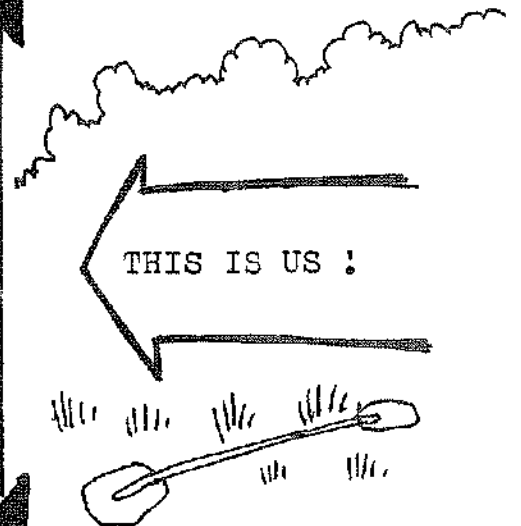
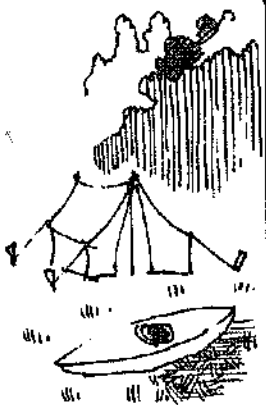
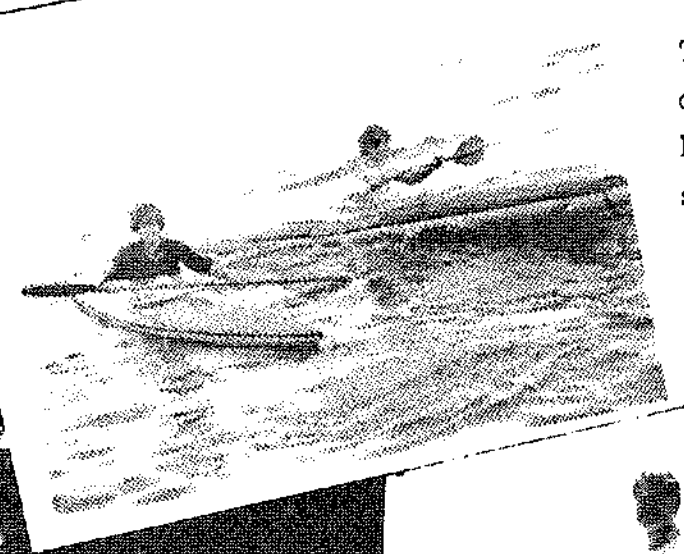
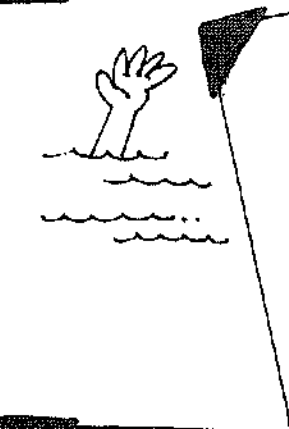
CANOEING INTENSIVE - LAKE TARAWERA

# THE MILNE PAPERS

New Zealand in the 1930's was a harsh environment for a young man looking for a job. There was no work to be found in the field of marine engineering which was what young Mr Milne had set his sights on. Aircraft engineering was the alternative suggested by his mother.

Mr Milne successfully applied for an apprenticeship with the Royal Air Force and in January 1932 arrived in England with \$9.00 in his pocket and a colonial hat. He was met by an Air Ministry official and soon commenced his training in the south of England.

It was 2½ years before Mr Milne was taken for a flight and immediately he knew he was hooked - bitten by the flying bug - in the cockpit of an Avro 504.

Mr Milne successfully transferred to flight training at Cranwell. The move meant a massive pay increase from one shilling to three shillings and sixpence a day.

At the outbreak of the war Mr Milne was attached to a Blenheim squadron which was sent to France for reconnaissance and light bombing missions. Losses were heavy from the time they arrived. 'Snowy' Milne lost many of his friends, including his Commanding Officer 'Wings' Day.

Next 'Snowy' was flying spitfires for a photo reconnaissance group. He flew many missions deep inside Germany, his hawk like gaze on the lookout for any important troop movements, and his camera at the ready to record them.

It was a clear, crisp early morning that 'Snowy' Milne crossed the Southern German border for the last time. He had lent his fast spitfire to a friend and was strapped in the seat of a slower 'spit' he'd swapped for the day.

Mr Milne's progress across enemy territory did not go unnoticed that day. His progress was marked by a 100m vapour trail, caused by water condensation at high altitude.

As he settled in for his photographic run he was unaware that a formation of German fighters were being guided to him by his tell-tale vapour trail.

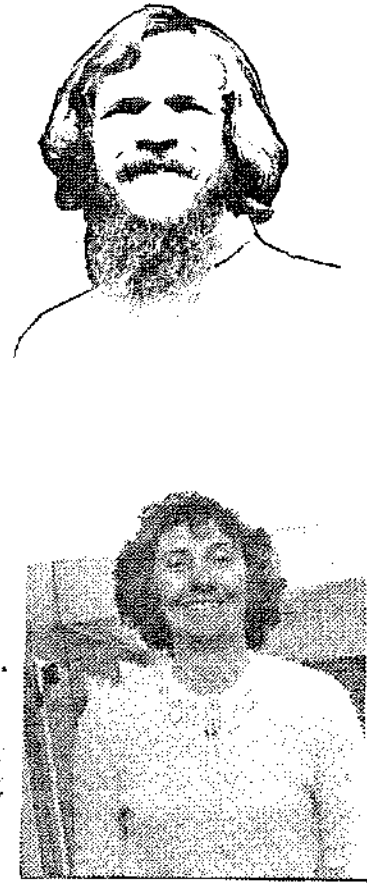
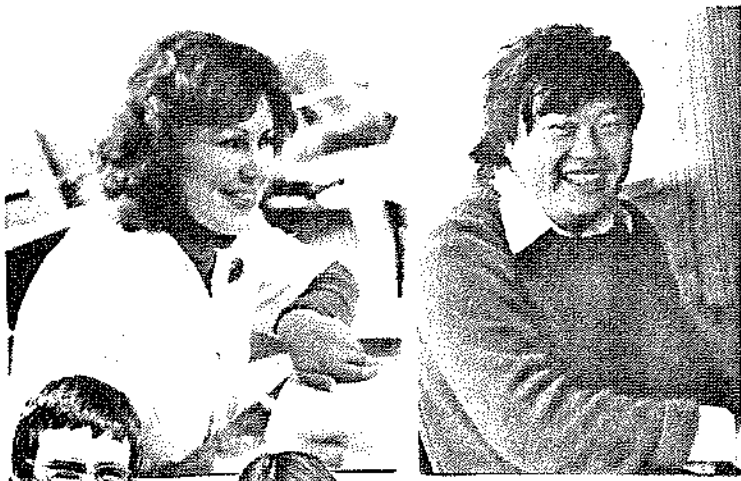
German section leader, Joe Furslough, in his newly fitted Me.109 was calmly closing in for the kill. Pilot Officer Milne had his hands full keeping his aircraft steady for his photographic run.

Suddenly a tremendous explosion rang out high above a sleeping Germany. The German flight commander's engine blew up due to over exertion of his not-yet run in engine.

The German officer was out of the action, he glided his limp machine down to his base below. Mr Milne's fate was left in the hands of an inexperienced group of enemy flyers. It was this fact that saved his life.

Out numbered and defenceless Pilot Officer Milne suffered a canon shell hit in his engine. Repeated attacks by the Germans failed to 'finish him off' - but there was no chance of 'Snowy' getting home on a dead engine.

Mr Milne baled out over the Black Forest, after putting his spitfire into a final spin to ensure total destruction on impact. Minutes after landing in a German field Mr Milne was captured and told by his German victors "for you the war is over".

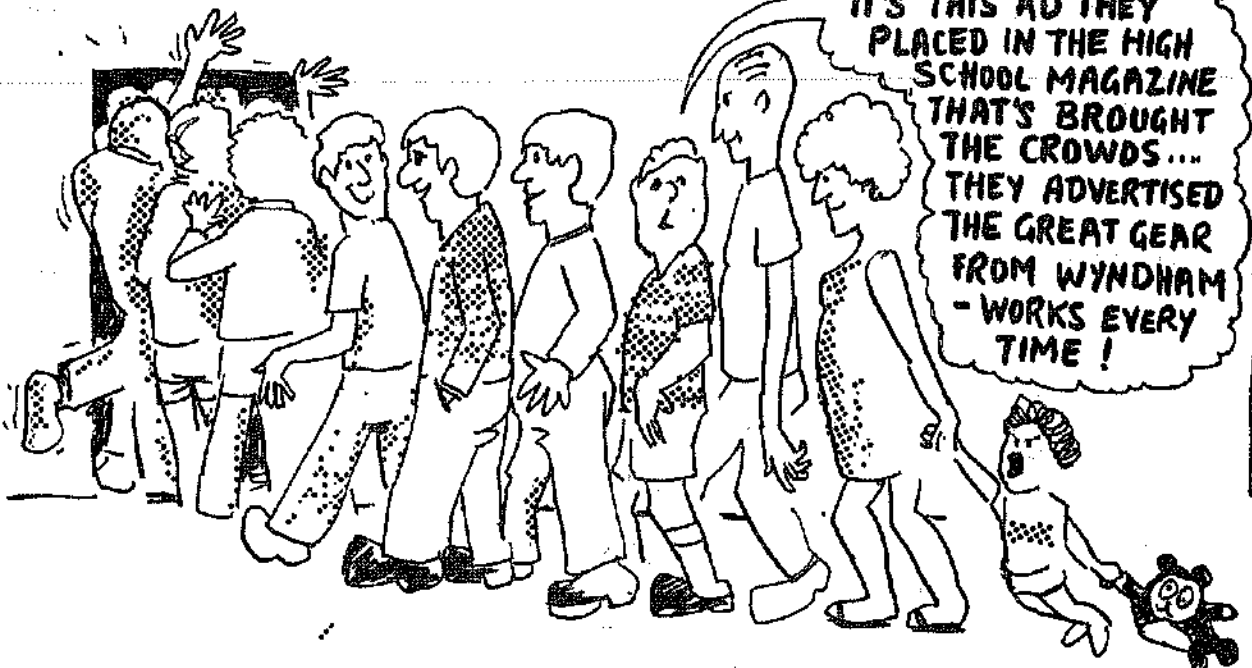

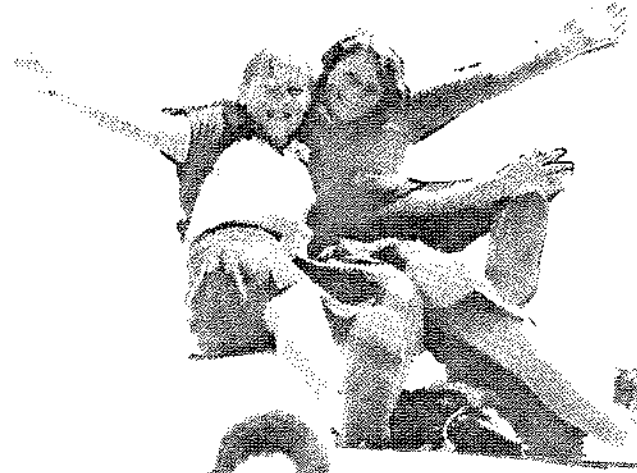
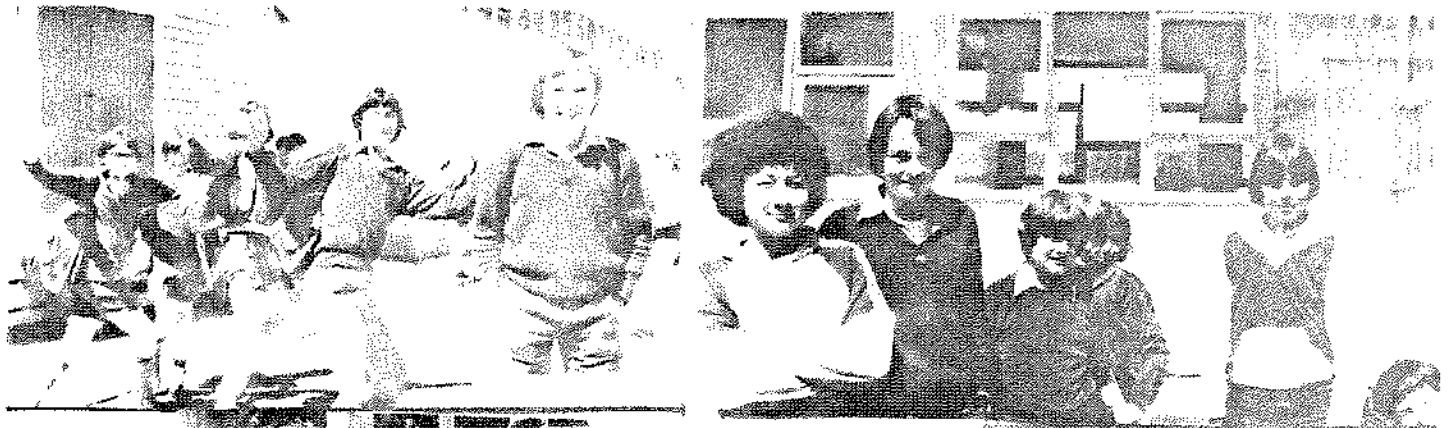
## for your guidance



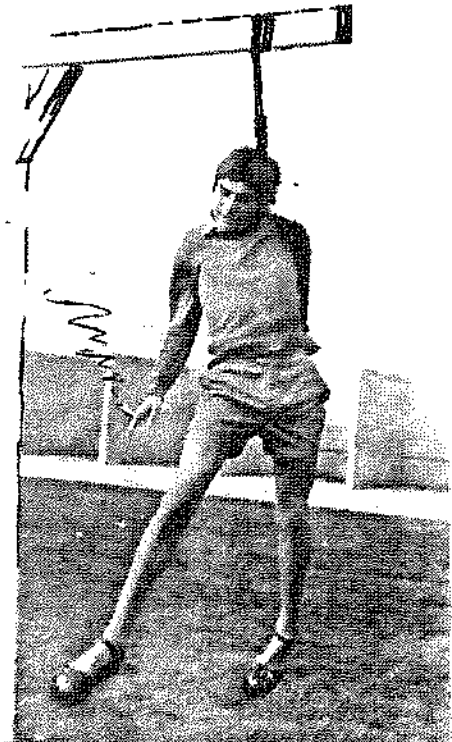

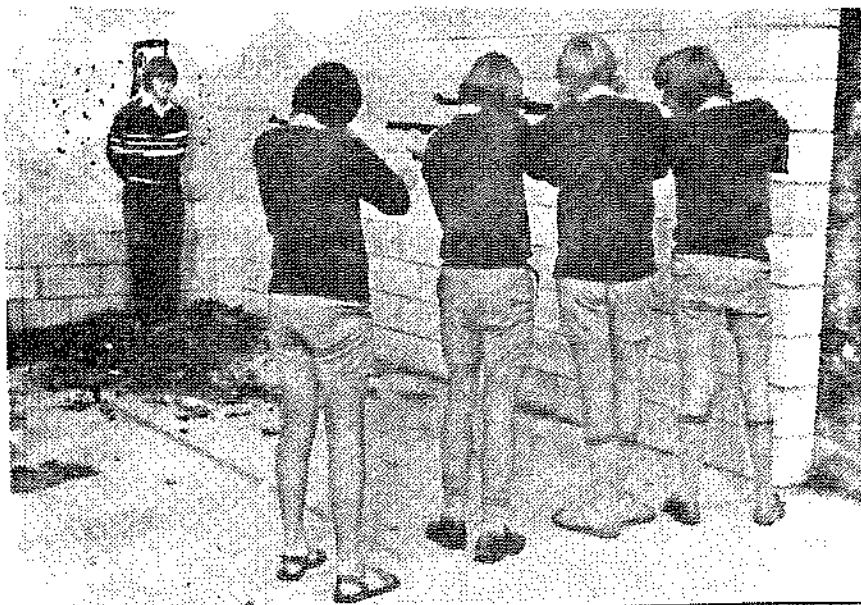
