People went to bed when they felt like it; some about 7.30 . p.m exhausted. Everyone else by 11.00. Everyone slept well. most got up by 8 and began to cook breakfast. Getting the fires started again always took time and breakfast lasted 1-12 hours. By the time everything was prepared and cleaned up again. Tuesday we tramped in the other direction along the river. It was another fine day, but cloudy in the morning. A few simple lessons on survival were taught along the way. How to make a stretcher, where to shelter if lost, what action to take if become lost. We had to cross the river (Whirinaki) in pairs and miraculously only got wet up to our thighs. Then we climbed scrub and heather. We saw deer tracks and smoke from the camp in the distance. To have lunch we had to descend, re-cross the river and find a sunny area on the river banks so we could boil a billy, make soup and sleep in the sun.

On Wednesday we went up Stoney Greek again, out alot

further than on Tuesday.

On thursday we climbed 'The Mountain' it the back of the camp and met Mr Boston shivering in a bivuoac at the top. He had climbed from the other side. At camp in the afternoon people bathed in the freezing river. In the evening we ate what was left of the food, sang, and talked for hours.

On Friday morning a tired, but happy group left Okui camp at eight for the road where we were met by a new N.Z.R. bus. We travelled to Rotorus where we stopped for a few minutes. We read the news of the week - the Pope hai been dead for days, and we didn't know: Gary Hurring had been disqualified in the Commonwealth Games. We ate some civilized food - pies, chips, Kentucky Fried Chicken. Then we travelled non stop back to school and arrived jastbefore three o'clock - and looking forward to a bath!

It was a reat trip - we made lots of new friends and would love to go again. The teacher-pupil roles and titles were forgotten and the whole camp was marked by a true spirit Thanks everyone!! of friendship.





NETBALL 1978

















SWINCING SFORTS 1978






This year the P.H.S. tennis championships were held on two consecutive days early in March. It was felt that this way of running the championships was better for two main reasons.

HOUSE SYSTEM

A history of the Houses by N.H. Thornton.

How the Houses were Formed and Named.

When I arrived at Papakura High School in 1963 I found a very keen, sporting student body. In order to put an edge to their enthusiasmand competitiveness, I felt that an inter-house competition would create interest. Consequently the school was divided into four houses, equal in numbers and with no particular system of selection.

A major problem was that of naming the houses. A competition was held but little was forthcoming until someone suggested that the names of prominent Governors-General be used. This was agreed upon and the four names now used, Bledisloe, Cobham, Fergusson, and Freyberg, were chosen. A magazine article a few years ago was written outlining the family history in each case, but briefly the reasons for choice were as follows.



Bledisloe: Lord Bledisloe served a double term as Governor-General in the early 1930's during the great depression. He was a man of the people whose sympathy for those in difficulty and his affection for New Zealand was widely recognised. He had a particular interest in farming. His generosity is shown by his gift to the country of the historical area of land at Waitangi where the treaty house stands.



Cobham: Lord Cobham had visited the school a year or two earlier. Like Lord Bledisloe he too had made a great impact on the community. He was a gifted speaker and what he said was listened to by all, with admiration.



Fergusson: Sir Bernard Fergusson was the third member of his family to have held the office in New Zealand. His military record in Burma was well known and much admired and while in New Zealand his forthright manner and his interest in the Maori people was widely recognised.



Freyberg: Sir Bernard Freyberg, New Zealand born, won the Victoria Cross in World War One and commanded the 2NZEF in the Middle East in World War Two. His achievements were much admired and it was a logical choice that he became Governor-General after the second World War.

Mr F. Graham designed and had constructed the house badges on display at the rear of the school assembly hall. Each shows the family crest of the Governor-General.

Colours were chosen at random, but the school colour of green was avoided as this embraces all houses.

It was hoped that the house system would embrace all types of activities both on the sports field and indoors e.g. debating. In varying degrees this has from time to time happened, but the main development has been in athletics, swimming and cross country.


I shall never forget the hours dyeing boys singlets prior to sports day to ensure that house representatives were easily distinguishable by their supporters.
