

Editorial

We have again in our third year to record a rapid expansion in both our numbers and in our permanent buildings. The school roll when we re-opened in February was 624. Further enrolments in March brought the total to 641. Indications are that the roll in 1957 will be over 700. To meet this rapid expansion the Department of Education authorized the building of another wing made up of six class-rooms, a Biology laboratory and a Music Room. In addition, authority was given to build the Assembly Hall. The M wing, as the new wing is called, has been in use for two terms and the Assembly Hall is at the time of writing, almost ready to be handed over. These two additions complete the permanent buildings which were planned for this type of school. feel that with the completed building we have been liberally treated on the material side and that the challenge is to us all, staff and pupils, to show that we can use and appreciate what has been given to us.

The growing size of the school has been a matter of concern. While opinions differ as to the maximum size to which a school can grow, and at the same time be efficient, we feel that in a co-educational school a roll of 600 to 650 can give those qualities which are necessary for a good school. makes possible a good balance between junior and senior pupils; it allows a full range of courses, and ensures a reasonable standard in athletics and games. In addition, up to this number, pupils are able to know one another, and the staff can have actual teaching contact with most of the pupils. In building up the tone and qualities of a school very much depends upon the personal relationships which are developed. If many of the pupils are unknown to each other even by name, and if staff members are strangers to a large group of the pupils, it is difficult to obtain that spirit of unity and happy co-operation which is so greatly to be desired. With the establishment of Papatoetoe High School and the projected building of a High School at Manurewa, we hope that our roll will be able to be limited to 650, the number for which we have permanent buildings.

It is pleasing to record the further development of the

school in its academic and athletic activities. This year a very much increased number of candidates will be sitting the University Entrance and School Certificate Examinations. The school has also been added to the list of Accrediting Schools for University Entrance. In athletics and games our teams have been very much stronger this year and have acquitted themselves very well. The loyalty of pupils to their school teams has been a most pleasing feature of the school's growth. As we look back over the three years of our existence we realize that the period of waiting until we grow up is now almost completed. We shall, in 1957, be in a position to take our place with the older established post-primary schools of our country.

Mr C. T. McGill was appointed First Assistant Master of the Papakura High School in 1954, when the school opened. He had, before ioining the staff, built reputation for sound scholarship, teaching skill and organising ability. All of these qualities he has shown in full masure in the three years he has been with us. In addition he has shown that his convictions on what constituted, a sound educa-

tion are based on wide reading, a varied experience in teaching and above all, on mature thought.

From the beginning of his associations with Papakura High School he has given of his best to see that the school should have a good tone, and high scholastic standards, and that it should take a worthy place in athletics and games. We know that he will work as hard to build up these qualities in the school to which he goes as first Principal.

Mr. McGill's personal relations with both pupils and staff have been on a very high level. He has always been most thorough and painstaking in his efforts to see that pupils, particularly those going into the upper forms, have been given the course most suited to them. He has also been able, in many cases, to give valuable guidance and help to those who have sought his advice. With staff members he has alwo been courteous and helpful and ever ready to smooth the rough places.

As Principal I wish to say that my relations with Mr. McGill have always been of the happiest. I feel he has given much to Papakura High School. We congratulate him on his appointment to Papatoetoe High School and rejoice that he is our next door neighbour. We know we can look forward to very close relationships with his school.

Anzac Day

The customary service was held at School on the 24th of April as our tribute to those who fell for their country in the two World Wars. The School sang Kipling's "Recessional" and then the reading from Ecclesiasticus 44, "Let us now praise famous men . . ," was taken by the Head Prefect, M. Tennant. The address was given by Lieut-Col. H. G. Wooller, O.B.E., who pointed out how the spirit of the original Anzacs had been shown by the men of later generations. The singing of the National Anthem concluded the service.



The following are extracts from the Annual Report presented by the Principal:

1955 has been largely a year of consolidation. The school has now settled to a routine and this, provided it remains flexible enough to allow the introduction of any desirable changes, should make for efficiency and ease of running. Classes, subjects, courses, sporting activities and the general discipline of the school are now well established.

The school re-opened with a roll of 483, and present figures indicate a roll of close on 600 for next year. This year the Senior sections of the school increased in proportion to the total and 1956 will see us very close to the normal balance between seniors and juniors.

It is with thanks that I record the following gifts this year to the school:

I would like to speak from our experience, short though it may be, of the group of pupils who stay with us for the bare two years. With the raising of the school age and the abolition of an examination leading from the primary to the secondary school, this group has increased greatly in numbers. Only under rare circumstances today does a child fail to make its way to the post-primary school. Frequently questioning is heard whether a large proportion of these children would not be better at work—questioning which comes not only from the outside public but also from some within the teaching profession itself.

Our experience, at Papakura High School, now that the first large group of those who have had just the two years is leaving, has been a very happy one. The pupils, some of whom were social promotions from the primary school, have advanced steadily and creditably in their academic and practical work. Only on rare occasions have we felt that a pupil has lost all interest in school work and is anxious to leave. In such cases where the child had turned fifteen our policy was to free the way for the child to leave. In general social development these pupils have gained tremendously and it has been a joy to see them entering whole-heartedly into the general activities of the school, learning to recognize and to accept the responsibilities which came to them as they advanced in the school. In their classes they have formed closely knit units loyal to the larger unit, the school, and so by doing have trained themselves to be good citizens. I am able to say to these pupils as they leave that if the school has been able to help them, the school has greatly benefited by having had them as pupils. I know they leave us feeling their two years at secondary school have been happy ones.

I would say to parents, "Try to give the children at least two years with us. Even if your children are not outstanding scholars, remember there is a very important place for them to fill in our country. Society does not require that every one of its members shall be a brilliant scholar but it does ask that each one shall be a worthy citizen. Our experience, short though it is, does show that for these short term pupils, the two years in what is a conditioned social milieu is extremely

valuable.''

In making these statements I must add that the co-operation of the headmasters of the contributing primary schools has been most valuable to me. The headmasters have always been willing to discuss individual cases and give helpful information on the pupils. It is also evident to me that they follow with keen interest the pupils' adjustment to the High School subjects and general life.

I wish to thank my Board of Governors for their help throughout the year. It certainly adds strength to the school to know that the members of the Board of Governors are willing to do all they can to assist the school in every way.

I also wish to pay tribute to the work done by the staff during the year, work in the class-room and in the sports fields. Teaching is an exacting task and one which takes toll of the teacher's nervous energy. The staff have not spared themselves and have put in a very hard year's work.

Lastly I wish to express my best wishes for the future to those pupils who are leaving this year. While it is with regret that we see you go it is also with the assurance that you will worthily uphold the name of the school in the office or workshop to which you are going.






Boys' Cross-Country Run



Equal Pay for Men and Women

"Should women be paid as much as men?" This question always brings nods of assent from all females present, and loud denials from the masculine section. Being part of the former section of the community, I am naturally prejudiced. But, on taking an unbiased point of view, I can see many points in favour and against this "equal pay" question.

If a factory girl, for example, works a forty-hour week in the same job, under the same conditions, and perhaps at the same conveyor belt as a man worker, she is still paid less. This is the case even though the woman might work much better and faster than her male co-worker. The position, considered in the light of these facts only, is obviously unfair.

But the man may have a family to feed and clothe, while the girl worker might have to pay for her own keep and clothing only. But nowadays many mothers go to work to help eke out the weekly wage, and there are also widows and divorcees who have to work to keep their children. Surely it would be only fair to pay the women equally as much as the men in such cases as these It must be rather embarrassing for a young married man to have his wife earning more than he does. This is often the case, especially in the "promotion" type of job where a man gradually works up to a better wage rate, while his girl friend or wife usually earns a stipulated and rigid amount per week.

A man does like to keep his feeling of superiority over his wife, and he likes to think he is the "breadwinner" of the family. It must hurt his ego to see his wife's fat pay envelope even though it helps pay household bills as much as his does.

In Russia, the Soviet system caters very well for this "equal pay" question. Every worker is paid according to his or her ability, and the value of the work in which they are employed. By this method a first-class ballet dancer, who serves the state by amusing the people and developing Russia's arts, receives about the same amount of money as an efficient, skilled factory worker who is engaged in mass production of goods. I think this method of paying by ability is far ahead of and far more modern than that of paying men more than women regardless of their efficiency.

Women nowadays boast of "equality of the sexes", and this has gone even to the extent of men losing all vestige of courtesy and manners where women are concerned. Men today do not bother to stand in a bus when women have no seat. When rebuked, they (for the most part), smile smugly and say, "Women have their equality of the sexes." But have we? We have the right to vote, to enter universities and law courts, but we cannot have complete equality until we have equal pay. After all, in some countries, the United States for example, women possess 60 per cent of the capital in assets and shares. So why should we in a supposedly democratic and equal society be inferior in wages to our male co-workers?
