

EDITORIAL

The school opened in 1954 with a roll of 320 pupils. By the beginning of this year, 1957, the roll had grown to 700. This rise in numbers in our own school is typical of the growth of post-primary education throughout New Zealand. With the opening of Papatoetoe High School the school boundary was shifted from Redoubt Road in the north to the Mahia Stream just south of Manurewa. This meant that the bulk of the pupils from the Manurewa and Homai Schools enrolled in the new school. Judging from the rolls of the primary schools from which we now draw our pupils it is possible that our roll will remain around 700 for two years, but after that another rapid increase is to be expected.

The nation wide development of post primary education has brought, as could be expected, many and varied problems in its train. First the task of providing new school buildings at a time when the building industry was fully expended in other directions, had to be faced. This work is now well within sight of completion and those of us who are fortunate to get our education in the bright, airy and excellently equipped new schools have much for which to thank the Minister of Education and the Department of Education. We hope that our own school will not require any further additions but another wing may yet be required.

No sooner was the task of providing new buildings on the way to completion than another and much more serious problem faced the Department of Education—the question of how to staff the many new classes which had come into being. The very serious shortage of post-primary school teachers, particularly in Mathematics and Science can have a grave effect upon the quality of work done in the schools. This shortage of teachers is one which cannot be overcome easily as the minimum time required to train a post-primary teacher is four years after leaving from the upper Sixth Form. Fortunately we have been able this year to keep a full staff of highly qualified teachers, but it appears that in the future we along with most other schools, will have to make adjustments to meet the shortage of teachers.

New Zealand has always been proud of the quality of its post-primary school education and scholars from our schools have been able to compete favourably with those from other countries. To keep up the standards that have been established will throw a heavier burden on both teachers and pupils. We trust that the pupils of this school will realise that they can help greatly by making full use of the opportunities given. There will be no place, because of the shortage of teachers, for those who are not prepared to give of their best.

MISS W. M. TOMBS

At the end of 1956 Miss W. M. Tombs, who had been senior assistant mistress of the school, was appointed head mistress of Whangarei Girls' High School. Miss Tombs, who had been appointed to the staff in 1954 when the school was opened, was made responsible in large measure for all matters relating to the girls in the school. In a spirit of co-operation with the girls she was able to develop high standards in behaviour, dress and sport.

Miss Tombs came to Papakura High School from a position at Auckland Girls' Grammar School, where she had established a reputation of being an outstanding teacher of French and Latin. This reputation was fully justified in the work she did at Papakura High School.

By her friendly and gracious manner Miss Tombs won the respect and admiration of the girls. She was always willing to give help where it was necessary and by her understanding of the young mind was able to handle with sympathy the problems that were brought to her. We were all sorry to learn she was leaving us, but she left with the very best wishes of both staff and pupils of Papakura High School.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The following are extracts from the Annual Report presented by the Principal at the Prize Giving:

1956 saw a rapid increase in roll numbers from 483 in March, 1955, to 640 in March, 1956. For the first and second terms the school was short staffed and until the new wing was opened in the middle of the second term two new "pre-fabs" units had to be used to house the additional classes.

With the growth in age of the school, external examinations have increased in importance. In 1955, 2 pupils passed the University Entrance Examination, 27 passed the School Certificate Examination, and a larger number of passes were gained in the Chamber of Commerce and Public Service Examinations in Commercial subjects. The school was placed this year on the Accrediting List for University Entrance.

The Board has added considerably this year to the equipment of the school. Out of revenue it has been able to purchase a 16 mm Debrie film projector and a further supply of up-to-date maps, charts and filmstrips. The boys have built an implement shed which enables us to house the tractor and mowers. The Parent-Resident-Teacher Association with voluntary labour built a dressing shed and shower room.

The grounds are in excellent condition and it means much to the school to have ample room for all the major sports to be played. Under Mr Cornwell's direction, Mr Titchmarsh as groundsman has done excellent work in developing and keeping in order our extensive playing fields.

On the playing fields the pupils have done very well this year. In football the First XV won all of their games—both competition and inter-school. The boys' Hockey First XI won their section in the Auckland Secondary Schools' Hockey Association. In the Auckland Ladies' Hockey Association, the Girls' First XI won the Junior A Championship and the Carnival Cup in the Seven-a-side Tournament. The Second XI tied for the Championship in the B Grade. In Basketball the seniors won the second section of the Papakura Basketball Association Senior Grade, and the B team won the Intermediate Championship and Knock-out Cup. The Cricket First XI is this year playing in the open Franklin Competition. In Athletics and Swimming the school has held its own in competition with others.

It is my pleasing duty on behalf of the pupils and the staff to thank the Honourable Minister and the Department of Education for this Assembly Hall in which we are at present. We were kept waiting for it for a little while, but it is certainly a part of the school well worth waiting for and a part which we shall value highly. Parents and teachers realise that in the matter of Assembly Halls you are one of our strongest advocates and we know that it gives you great joy to be here to open one of the first to be built as a part of one of the newer schools. I also wish to thank the Ministry of Works and Mr Christopherson, the architect, and Mr McEntee, the builder, for the valuable parts they took in its erection.

I sincerely hope that now that the school is a completed unit we shall not have to ask for any more buildings. It is with some trepidation that I see our Papakura High School growing so rapidly. While I am willing to grant to the larger schools that their numbers perhaps allow greater elasticity of courses and more ease in grading pupils, I am loth to lose the benefits of the school of round about 600. Here we are able at present to know one another. The staff can become a friendly unit and this co-operation and friendliness reaches out into the classrooms. A reasonably-sized staff prevents the specialist teacher from becoming too much the specialist. It is said that the person who is a specialist in only the price of wheat will create a dust bowl. We don't want "dust bowls" in our classrooms. Again in a school of this size it is possible for the Principal to know the quality and tone of every clas; to give time to parents who visit him; to get to know the pupils who require guidance and help. Further opportunities for leadership can be given in large measure to the pupils, leadership in the classroom, in the playing fields and in pupil administration. At present we are a close knit social unit with our aims and ideals within and part of the wider district unit. It is because I feel these qualities can be more easily attained in a school of 600 to 650 that I say I hope we shall not have to ask for any more buildings. We have welcomed the wisdom shown by the Department of Education in building Papatoetoe High School, and its intention to open a High School at Manurewa in the future. We look forward to the time when Papatoetoe High School, Manurewa High School, Papakura High School and Pukekohe High School with their common basis and their distinctive qualities will be along with Wesley College and St. Stephen's College a matured part of New Zealand's post-primary system.

ANZAC DAY SERVICE

On Wednesday, the 24th April, the school met in the Assembly Hall to pay tribute to those who fell for their country in the two World Wars. Following an introduction by Mr Campbell, the school sang: "Once to Every Man and Nation," and then the reading from Ecclesiasticus 44, "Let us now praise famous men. . . " was taken by the Head boy, Ross Palmer. The address was given by the Rev. I. Kemp, who recalled the glory the Gallipoli campaign and emphasised the need for a deep trust in God in a troubled world." The singing of Kipling's "Recessional," followed by the National Anthem brought the service to a close.

On the 25th April the Head Prefects, Margaret Jolly and Ross Palmer, represented the school at the public service held at the Memorial in Papakura and laid the wreath

on our behalf.

TREE PLANTING CEREMONY

Parents, friends, staff and pupils spent a very enjoyable afternoon on Saturday, July 27th, when about ninety trees were planted around the school. One further important step was taken in the development of the school and its grounds.

The programme opened with a short speech from Mr G. Wood, Chairman of the Board of Governors, who then planted the first tree, a claret ash, in the double row running along the east of the main drive. The Mayors of Papakura and Manurewa, members of the Board of Governors, their wives and a representative of the Rotary Club completed this row with melia, scarlet oak, tulip trees, magnolia, grevillea and liquid amber.

When the gathering moved to the east side of the school Mr Campbell planted a "fossil" ginkgo tree, Ross Palmer, a diospyrus virginiana, and Margaret Jolly, a catalpa bignoides. Prefects planted the line of Victorian waratah between the C-wing and M-block and a group of flowering cherries off the west end of the hall. In front of the C-wing the staff set in a block of flowering prunus and cherries. Parents and friends had a busy time planting further trees such as a row of albizzia by the basketball and tennis courts, paulownia, grey alder, golden birch, magnolia, tulip trees, oleanders, azaleas, heaths and a row of poplar on the southern boundary. Mr H. Beaumont generously presented us with some dawn redwood to go with our other "fossil" tree and taxodium distichum which were planted near the side entrances to the school.

Afternoon tea concluded a busy afternoon which seemed to have given everyone great satisfaction. We hope that even in two or three years those at school will appreciate the shade and protection from the wind and that, not only the school, but Papakura and the surrounding districts, will take pride in the beauty of the trees.

THE NEW ZEALAND PLAYERS' VISIT

The New Zealand Players' Drama Quartet visited the school on the 27th of June. The Quartet consisted of John Hunter, Bridget Armstrong, Peter Brian and George Webby.

The programme was called "The March and the Dance," and comprised some chapters of living history. Scenes were taken from several plays including "Richard III," "In Good King Charles' Golden Days," "Caesar and Cleopatra," and "Julius Caesar." Some of these scenes concerned the English monarchy, others revolution, the emanicipation of the negro people, and the signing of the Treaty of Waitangi. The visit concluded with the reading of part of Anne Franke's diary, to bring us up to the present day.

Altogether it was a most enjoyable morning. The players succeeded admirably in their task of making history live, and we must thank them sincerely and hope that they may return in the future to delight us again.

BOYS' CRUSADER UNION



"Crusaders" is an interdenominational movement, the aim of which is to show that the Christian life is worthwhile. This year was opened by a visit from Dr. Vine Martin, who showed a film on Crusader camps, and afterwards spoke. The attendance at this meeting was well over fifty but has since fallen partly.

was well over fifty, but has since fallen, partly owing to sports practices; but there are forty "regulars" on the roll.

There have been several special functions and outside speakers this year. In the first term a "squash" (social) was held, combined with the Girls' Union, in the School Hall. A Fact and Faith film, "Hidden Treasure," was screened, after which Mr Donnell spoke to the audience of over one hundred and fifty, including many parents. A combined meeting with the girls, held in the second term, was addressed by Miss Chenerton, a missionary from the Belgian Congo. She told of her work there, and showed some Bibles and other Christian literature, printed in African languages.

One of the biggest events of the year for both Boys' and Girls' Unions was the Annual Rally, held in the Auckland Town Hall. About sixty pupils from Papakura High School attended. The main speaker was Rev. Alan E. Begbie, of Sydney, chief padre for the Australian Forces. The other speaker was Mr Bruce Lumsden, General Secretary of the Crusader Movement of New Zealand. A large Crusader choir rendered musical items. A Bible quiz, in which ten Crusader Unions took part was of great interest. Papakura High School Boys' Union was narrowly beaten in the finals.

Our main activity during the year has continued to be the lunch-hour meeting held in A3 on Wednesdays, when Messrs Walls, Donnell and Owens have addressed us. From the foundation of the school the girls have been able to attend a Crusader meeting held each week at lunch-time for half an hour in A4. The aims of this Union are similar to those of the boys in that our leader, Mrs Higgins, shows how God can be a personal Saviour to every girl in school life. In this way the girls are helped to witness and live a Christian life among their fellows. About seventy attend regularly.

Guest speakers for this year included Mrs Watson, a doctor's wife, and Miss Edith Barnett, from Pukekohe. They both spoke of their experiences as nurses. Not long ago we had a visit from the Presbyterian deaconess, Sister Fiora McDonald, who gave an interesting account of her life and work amongst the families of Papakura. Men speakers for this year included both our Principal, Mr Campbell, and first assistant, Mr Donnell, and also the secretary of the Crusader movement in New Zealand, Mr Lumsden. Two visitors we had at the end of this year were Mrs Kirkpatrick from Takanini, and Miss Margaret Partridge from the Auckland University. Miss Partridge gave us an account of the University Evangelical Union, a Christian movement similar to the Crusader movement. In some of our visits and functions we have joined with the boys.

In the third term this year two girls received Crusader badges. These badges have been presented in previous years to several girls, who each gave a short testimony, telling of their conversion and recent Christian life.

At each meeting we have had two women teachers, Miss Wright and Miss Gummer, who take an active part.

Each year a thank offering is given by each Crusader, this money forming part of a Crusader missionary gift from many unions. It helps support a missionary in Malaya.





MANUKAU HEADS SIGNAL STATION

Last June my brother and I made a trip up to the Manukau Heads' signal station, where our uncle is signal master. The journey, about seventy miles, took two hours in our baby Austin. Although the road was fairly rough, the little car stood up to the trip remarkably well, and we arrived in time for lunch.

Domestic life goes by quietly at the station but Cyanide causes trouble at times. Cyanide, by the way, is a kitten. Every article and animal has a name, but not all of them are complimentary. Myrtle and Gertrude are hens, Strychnine is the dog, and the ancient car is called Gargoyle.

The wind is forever blowing, and the seeds which my uncle planted are, so he says, down at Mt. Egmont, which can be seen peeping up out of the sea.

From the sun porch, where we sat to rest after our journey, we could see the fishing boats moving up and down the harbour like small insects eight hundred feet below us. The bar, which is formed by the silt carried out by the tide to meet the stormy Tasman, is about five miles off shore. Although in a heavy sea this can be treacherous, the main hazards to shipping are the mudbanks which build up at the entrance of the harbour. These have to be sounded every six months because the channels which are left between them are forever shifting. During the day, ships are directed by radio, and at night helmsmen steer by two beacons.

While we were at the station, we changed the bulb on the front beacon. This beacon is about forty-five feet high and the icy wind whistles through the wooden framework. It is one of the beacons the ships sight on at night.

At six o'clock, morning and night, radio contact is established with the various fishing craft, and weather reports are sent out to them. The station is equipped with alarm bells, an electric generator which switches on automatically if the main power should fail, flares, an aldis lamp and a seventy-foot high metal tower with a cross-bar for hoisting code flags. Most of these are not used very often and are only safety devices. The main means of communication is radio. So that now, if a vessel obeys orders, the chance of an accident is slight.

During the two days we spent at the station we had plenty to do. Besides domestic chores there were marvellous views to look at and photograph. When we returned home we had pleasant memories of our stay at the Manukau Heads.

BAU

In the August school holidays of last year I went with my family to stay with some friends in Fiji. While we were there we visited Bau Island. This is the home of the Cakabaus (pronounced Thakambaus) who used to be the ruling chiefs of the Fijian Group, and it is necessary to obtain special permission to visit the island.

We reached Bau Island after being poled across about a mile of shallow water by an old Fijian, who used a long stout bamboo pole. Bau Island is situated off the south-eastern coast of Viti Levu, the main island in the Fijian Group. From the distance it appeared as one would imagine a tropic isle to look—a mass of green with coconut palms outlined against the blue sky. We pushed the boat up on to a tiny rocky landing place and anchored it by tying a rope around a coconut palm growing by the water's edge.

We walked through the trees to the chief's house and were welcomed and shown around the island by his son, a handsome young man, barefooted, and wearing white shorts and shirt. The island is only a few acres in area with a hill on one side. Near the top of this hill in the middle of a clearing we saw the tombs of the Cakabau family.

The village green is in the centre of the island. At practically any time except when school or church is in, children can be seen romping and playing there. The boys and girls look much alike because the girls have their hair cut short and dress very like the boys. At one end of the green is the village church where the whole community gathers on Sunday. The Fijians have beautiful singing voices and are never accompanied. An interesting feature of the Bau Methodist Church is that the baptismal font is a hollowed rock which was used for sacrificing human prisoners in heathen times. Another reminder of heathen times is a tiny island just off Bau where prisoners were fattened up before being killed and eaten.

At the other end of the green is the meeting house on a platform of coral rock brought in from the reef. This building is in the same style as the dwellings but much larger. The floor is covered with matting woven from the pandanus palm and on the floor is the kava bowl, made from a section of the trunk about eighteen inches or more in diameter. It had fourteen legs carved in one piece with the bowl.

For a kava ceremony everyone sits on the floor and the kava drink, which is made from the dried beaten roots of the kava plant soaked in water, is served in a polished half coconut with great ceremony and handclapping.

Scattered among the trees are the houses—most of which have a thatched roof and walls, but others have woven bamboo walls, thatched on the inside. Around the houses are coconut palms and bright red poinsettias, also breadfruit, banana, paw paw and mango trees. On one side of the hill are the gardens, where a variety of native foods, tapioca, dalo, egg-plant and yam grow.

We could have stayed much longer on this delightful little island where everybody was carefree and happy, but, unfortunately it was time to return to the mainland. There was the old Fijian waiting patiently to pole us back, and we had, reluctantly to join him.

THE MILE

The mile race has always been a central feature of athletic meetings in British countries, probably because it is such an exacting test of speed, stamina and sound judgment in training and racing. However, the general public only hears of the performances of national and international runners in most athletic events. But there are many, very many, other winners who have never had their names before the people. Nevertheless, they feel as though their own names stand out in the history of athletics.

I once had the same feeling. Ever since I was a very small boy I have dreamed, like many other small boys I suppose, of one day becoming a champion footballer, cricketer or athlete. I also found that I could run longer distances much more easily than many of my classmates. Gradually, and not without effort, I reached basic fitness, being placed second or third in the school sports for two years in the half-mile and the mile.

At the beginning of last season the feeling of "wanting to get really fit" overtook me and I trained hard, practically forgetting at the beginning of the school year the presence of homework. I did some, but the very bare minimum. From half an hour to an hour was spent on training almost every night, with the result that in my spare time I could not help yawning. My feelings were very mixed. I knew that my fellow competitors were fairly fit and some of my performances were very discouraging. A feeling of hopelessness crept over me.

For two days before the sports I did practically no training but rested as much as possible. The half mile had been held two or three days earlier and in that I had managed to come third. I was very pleased but wanted to concentrate on the mile. The night before was sleepless. I was extremely nervous and the thought that somebody had to come last did not improve matters.

In the morning I had very little to eat and by one o'clock was shaking like a leaf. At a quarter past one we were ordered to our marks and with the crack of the starter's gun all tension and nervousness vanished and my concentration was on the race. I had thought out my tactics dozens of times before and carried them out as I had planned.

A faster speed at the start to use up surplus nervous energy and enable breathing and blood circulation to reach their most efficient rate of working as quickly as possible, helped me to keep a good position throughout the race. A runner confident of his ability to sprint at the finish may allow others to lead, but as I am not a good sprinter I kept near the front and to the inside of the track. It is impossible to describe the thoughts which pass through one's mind in a race as long and tiring as the mile. Half way round the second lap I took the lead. My long stride was valuable here, as I managed to maintain a lead of ten to thirty yards for the rest of the race until I had crossed the tape, finding it hard to believe that I had really won! All my time and labour, spent in training had been successful! I had won! A new record had been established and, to me, my name was not much less notable than Roger Bannister's!
